By the KING, PROCLAMATION.

For Excouraging Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Shifs of War. GEORGE R.

THEREAS it is Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all fuch Landmen, who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service as We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Out Prov Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclar maion; and We do hereby promise and declare, That all such Able-Bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five Years, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, sit for Our Service, who shall, on or before the Thirty-first Day of December next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve on Board Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutemans of Our Shops, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as shall be employed for raising Men for the Service of Our Navy, shall receive, as Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Twenty Shillings each. Man; such Sum to be paid them by the respective Clerks of the Cheque residing at the Ports or Places where the Ships, into which they shall be entered, shall be, immediately after the Third Muster of such Men. And for Prevent on of any Abuses by any shall be, immediately after the Third Muster of such Men. And for Prevent on of any Abuses by any Persons leaving the Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on Board any other Ships or Vessels in order to obtain the said Bounty-Money; We do hereby declare and command, That such Men, belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on Board any others of Our said Ships or Vessels in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerits. Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Thirtieth

Day of November, 1770, in the Eleventh Year

of Our Reign.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS there was this Day read at the Board, the humble Petition of feveral Merchants of London, trading from Hamburgh and Bremen, letting forth, amongst other Things, That His Majesty was pleased; by His Order in Council of the 1st instant, to direct, that all Ships and Vessels, coming from the said Places, should perform a Quarantine of Borty Days, which is a wory great Inconveniency and Burthen upon their Trade in particular; that there doth not appear to be the least Symptom of an Epidemical Distemperwithin several stundard Miles of either of those perwithin feweral Hundred Miles of either of those Places; that the Lianens imported by the Peri-Germany, where there are not the least Signs of any Infection; and as all the Princes of the Empire, through whose Territories these Linnens must pass, have taken all posible Predautions to cut off the Communication with infected Places, the Petitioners hambly pray, That all Ships from Hamburgh and Bremen, that have no Rags or Cotton-Wool on Board, be not obliged to perform Quarantine; His Majety, having taken the field Petition into Confideration, and being defront to remove all Refraints upon Trade, for far as may be confident with the Safety of His Subjects, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered. That the Quarantine at present subsisting upon all Ships and Vessels coming from Hamburgh and Bremen, be taken offe, and that all such Ships and Vessels be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings, without opening, unpacking, and airing, and without performing any Quarantine, provided that they have no Rags or Cotton-Wool on Board, and that the Master, or other Person taking Charge of such Ship or Vessel, do first make Oath before the Custom-House Officer or Chief Magistrate, on their Arrival at the Place where they are bound to, that they did not touch at any Place from whence Qua-rantine is required to be performed, nor had Communication with any Ship or Veffel subject thereto during the Voyage; and that the Crew are all in Health.—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majetty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutemant-General and the reft of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Com-manders in Chief, for the Time being, of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.
