THE following Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens of the City of Dublin, having been transmitted by his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland to the Lord Viscount Weymouth, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has by him been presented to the King: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens of the City of Dublin, in Common Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE Your Majesty's most dutiful, loyal, and affectionate Subjects, the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens of Your faithful City of Dublin, in Common Council assembled, beg Leave humbly to approach Your Majesty with the most sincere Assurance of our steady Attachment to Your Majesty's Illustrious Person and Family, and our ardent Wishes that Your Reign over us may be long and as transcendently distinguished as Your Virtues.

Emboldened by our Experience of that Attention which Your Majesty affords to every Part of Your Subjects, permit us, most Gracious Sir, to represent, at the Foot of Your Throne, that from some Defects in the present Laws relative to Corn, Flour, and other Necessaries of Life, in the Laws affecting the Police of this City, and from the Expiration of several temporary Statutes, a Situation in which we most humbly conceive we can only be relieved by the Meeting of Parliament, Your faithful Subjects of this Metropolis experience many and great Difficulties, and apprehend yet greater.

Pardon, most Gracious Sovereign, that we presume further to submit to Your parental Goodness, that certain public Works, necessary to the Commerce of this City, which were begun and promoted by National Bounty, must be indebted to the same Bounty for their Completion; and that Your Subjects of this Metropolis, who, by large Importations of the Manufactures of Great Britain, have provided for their domestic Consumption, which in every alternate Year encreases in Proportion to the Number assembled for National Business, do already feel a Decay of their Trade and Credit, even from a temporary Decrease of Inhabitants.

Grateful for the many Blessings derived to us from Your Majesty's parental Affection, and conscious that relieving the Wants of Your People succeeds to the Knowledge of them, we presume to obtrude our Cares upon Your Majesty's more weighty Concerns; and humbly beseech Your Majesty to take these our Circumstances into Your Royal Consideration, and to grant us such Relief as Your Majesty in Your Royal Wisdom shall think fit.

In Testimony whereof we have caused the Common Seal of the said City to be hereunto affixed, this Twenty-ninth Day of October, in the Year of our Lord, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy.

A P R O C L A M A T I O N,
For Encouraging Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War.

G E O R G E R.

WHEREAS it is Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all such Landmen, who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service; We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and We do hereby promise and declare, That all such Able-Bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five Years, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service, who shall, on or before the Thirty-first Day of December next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve on Board Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as shall be employed for raising Men for the Service of Our Navy, shall receive, as Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Twenty Shillings each Man; such Sum to be paid them by the respective Clerks of the Cheque residing at the Ports or Places where the Ships, into which they shall be entered, shall be, immediately after the Third Muster of such Men. And for Prevention of any Abuses by any Persons leaving the Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on Board any other Ships or Vessels in order to obtain the said Bounty-Money; We do hereby declare and command, That such Men, belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on Board any other of Our said Ships or Vessels in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerits.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Thirtieth Day of November, 1770, in the Eleventh Year of Our Reign.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this Day read at the Board, the humble Petition of several Merchants of London, trading from Hamburgh and Bremen, setting forth, amongst other Things, That His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 1st instant, to direct, that all Ships and Vessels, coming from the said Places, should perform a Quarantine of Forty Days, which is a very great Inconveniency and Burthen upon their Trade

Trade in particular; that there doth not appear to be the least Symptom of an Epidemical Distemper within several Hundred Miles of either of those Places; that the Linnens imported by the Petitioners are all manufactured in different Parts of Germany, where there are not the least Signs of any Infection; and as all the Princes of the Empire, through whose Territories these Linnens must pass, have taken all possible Precautions to cut off the Communication with infected Places, the Petitioners humbly pray, That all Ships from Hamburgh and Bremen, that have no Rags or Cotton-Wool on Board, be not obliged to perform Quarantine;—His Majesty, having taken the said Petition into Consideration, and being desirous to remove all Restraints upon Trade, so far as may be consistent with the Safety of His Subjects, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, That the Quarantine at present subsisting upon all Ships and Vessels coming from Hamburgh and Bremen, be taken off; and that all such Ships and Vessels be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings, without opening, unpacking, and airing, and without performing any Quarantine, provided that they have no Rags or Cotton-Wool on Board, and that the Master, or other Person taking Charge of such Ship or Vessel, do first make Oath before the Custom-House Officer or Chief Magistrate, on their Arrival at the Place where they are bound to, that they did not touch at any Place from whence Quarantine is required to be performed, nor had Communication with any Ship or Vessel subject thereto during the Voyage; and that the Crew are all in Health.—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief, for the Time being, of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Hague, November 30. Whereas it appears, by the Certificate of Three of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace acting within the Parts of Holland in the County of Lincoln, that some Person or Persons unknown, on Wednesday the 21st Day of November last past, between Eight and Nine in the Evening, did maliciously shoot in at the Window of the Dwelling-House of John Woods, of Swinshead in those Parts, Farmer, with a Gun loaded with Shot, and with the said Gun so loaded did wound the said John Woods, then sitting by his own Fire-Side with his Wife, Servant-Maid, and a Boy about Nine Years old, in the Room, under the Left Ear and upon the Throat; of which Wounds he the said John Woods instantly died: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in so cruel a Murder, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually shot the said John Woods) who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof; and also a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be paid by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of one or more of the Criminals.
