N Wednesday night last a Vessel belonging to
Fyale, laden with Wine, Sugar, and Brezilewood, was by the violence of the florm forced upon a Banke of Sand, about ten miles from this place, and at the third Tyde split in pieces, the Men, all of them Portuguese were saved, their confidence of getting off their ship, was the occasion of the loss of the greatest part of their lading, which by the affistance timely offered them, might otherwise have been preserved.

On Friday night last was driven into this Harbor, the Exchange of Boston, in New-England, laten with Tobacco, Sujar, and some Beaver, much damaged by ill wea-

ther.

Andaluzia, Novemb. 9. Of the eight ships ordered to py upon the Coasts of Portugal, six of them were forced to return after three or four daies itay only at Seaswhere they have received much damage by ill weather. The Admirel having his Masts lamed, and two of the others springing so many leakes, that they were rendred unable any longer to keep at

The Golden Cup of Amsterdam of 32 Guns rich'y laden, is lately arrived at Gadiz, having been forc't to come about by the North, to avoid the hazards of the Channel: There are likewise arrived two St. Malo's Men in 21 daies, they came out with more Company, which were forc't by ill weather to put back, and fince is arrived a larger thip from the fame place

Malaga, Novemb. 9. Yesterday set sail to the Westward, an Hamburger of thirty Guns, and another of twelve. A Venetian of 18 guns, with two Genouese ships, that are bound fr Gales, and a French ship for Nantes, some of them have attended long for Company, having great apprehensions of the Turks, who from Algiers are at Sca with 22 fail of Men of War.

Venice, Nevemb. 19. We have advice from the Levante, that a Squadron of our Ships have in their Crufing lighted on a Turkith Convoy of Veffels laten with Provisions, and Ammunitions bound for Canca, but were happily p evented and all of them taken, but they proving to be a Convoy fent from Smyrna, and the ships belonging to several Countries pressed by the Turks for this service, the Admiral of the Squadron took out all the Aumunition and Provisions, taking away with them all the Turks they found aboard them, and dismilt the ships for the service of the owners. We are like-wise informed of several other Convoys designed by the Turks for the same place, which we hope may, by the diligence of

our Commanders, meet with the like diversion.

Signior Ballarino, Ambassador from this Republique to the Ottoman Court, grown old in the service of his Courtry, and tyred out with his long journey towards Thebes, at Saloziche, a place some few duies jonrney diftent from thence, feil fick of an Aithma, to which he had been frequently subject, of which he dyed, being a retion of known abilities and integrity, and frequently imployed by this Republique in the affaires of greatelt importance; his charge of Grand Chancellor conferred on him in his absence, is in Testimony of the merits of the Father, by the Counfel conferred upon lis Son. His Kinsman Padavino, who was present and affisting to him in his employment, whilft he lived, is to succeed in the charge now made void by his death, to whom the Re-Publique bath ordered a rich prefent as an encouragement to him in their future service, which is to be speedily sent to him by a Convoy of seven ships that by again to the srmus, with a supply of Provisions and Ammunition.

The Grand Viller continues where he was at Thebes, with his Army, but the great fickness that rages amongst them, has confumed a great number of them, and makes us less apprehensive then formerly of his Intentions.

Two Turkish Vessels with a false Banner of St. Marke, made several attempts upon some of our Gallies and armed Barques, in falling unexpectedly upon them, by which some of them have been much damnified, though none yet taken or funk. One of our armed Ba ques has lately had a Brisque' encounter with a Feluque of Lepanto, who was likewise well armed and manned, but the Barque after a long dispute, gave the Turks chace, and with some loss to her felf, killed of the Enemy about twenty Men.

His Excellency Moresini designed Governor General to the Armara, is providing for his departure, and is fitting up for himself the Bastard Gally, a stout Vessel somerly commanded by the late Captain General Marcello.

Three of our Men of War are come home to be repaired, and will suddenly be refitted and returned to the Armata: From Candia we are informed of the death of two of our ablest Ingineers, of whom one waskilled in a Duell, the other by a Mu quet shor, as he was observing the forti-fications of Candia. The Turks of Canea have lately taken the field with three pieces of Canon, to leavy contribution in the Country, and have fet their Guards upon the Sea

Ccasts to hinder informations.

Rome, Novemb. 20. The Duke de Bracciano, cheif of the Family of the Orfini; has lately received very obliging Let-ters from the King of France, with a yearly Penfice of 20000 Livres, which is to be charged upon the accounts of the Chancery, which is here thought to proceed from some design that King may have entertained upon the Kingsoms of Naples and Sicily, with the Dutchy of Milan, &c. in case it e King of Spain should die, being willing upon that account to oblige the Court of Rome, and make his interests in as many persons as he can.

The Arch Du chess of Austria and Inspruck, Datchess Dowager and Regent of Mantua, having sately felt dangerously ill, the Gentlemen of four semili sof the House of Gonzague, dwelling in the City of Mantua, leised upon the Gates and Castle, under a pretence of Jecusia, the inverest of the young Duke, against the ill defigns of the French and others, during his minority: Putting likewife the Marque's de Canoffa, cheif Minister of State, to the Arch-Dutcheis, her other Officers out of their charges, which is variously interpreted by divers persons, as to proceed rather from some Foreign Interests, then that of the young Duke: And 'cis believed, that either the Cardinal d'Este, and his Brother-in-law, the Duke of Guaftalia, have underhand fomented this work, to oblige the Fru ct., or elfethe Governor of Milan, with the Count de Finditsgratz have had fome influence upon them to a wance the Interest of the House of Austria. What ever the defign is, the Arch-Dutchels is in a much better condition then formerly, and great hopes there are of her recovery; which when perfected, the reasons of their actings will be better lifted.

Vienns, Novemb. 24. Several violencies have lately been done about this Town, by strangers and other people, that by reason of the approaching solemnity, are drawn hither from all paris; but for the future prevention of fuch accidents, double guards and watches are let in all places, and four Gallows erected in several parts of the Town, and order given for immediate execution of the next offender.

Danizick, Novemb. 27. The ninth instant, the Polish Diet began at Warlaw, where after a long contest for its Murshal or Speaker, they at last agreed upon Obersity, Starosta of Lyasky; which shows the prevalency of the King in the Diet, that person having been no friend to Lubsmiriki. At his Election they imposed on him a new Oath, not to take Bribes, or adhere to any faction, bur to act faithfully for the I:terest of his Countrey, and not to violate their Priviledges. All they have yet done, is to vote, that no more Copper money be minted, and to appoint Commissioners to treat with the Army about their arrears, amongst whom, they much apprehend a new Confederation.

Rege, formerly Counfellor and Steward to the Queen, being lately returned from his Embessie into France, is made Vaywood of Lublin, and has lately in the Lords House in a framed speech, highly extolled the French Court, which was

not over-pleasant to the greater part of the Auditors. The Swedes Envoye Exteatrainary is returned from Liefland to Warsam, having affished in the Treaty with the Muscovite, which is now wholly concluded: But 'tis ill taken here by the Poles, that the Swedes should conclude without them, whose Treaty is broken off; and the Cossacks and Crim Tartars joyn'd in Alliance, whether with or against the Poles, is not yet certain.

Heidelberg, Decemb. 2. The Treaty at Haylbrun goes stayly forward, and we fear the Ambassadors of the two Kings feem to favor the interest of the Elector of Mayence. However it be, Lis Highness, our Elector, is very inclinable

to preferve the peace upon any reasonable satisfaction.

Paris, Decemb. 11. His Majesty Eath obliged the younger Brothers, both in the Guards and in other Companies of the Army, to life themselves in the Muster-Rulls as Soldiers, and not to serve as Voluntiers. And 'tis said, he intends to change the penalty of the Martial Law, (by which, all those that run from their Colours, are to be put to death.) intending for the future to condemn them for ever to the Gillies.

The Court of Aydes has Registred his Majesties Declaration concerning the Priviledges, he is pleased to give to those

Persons that have many children.

The cheif President of Bretagne has lately made an humble complaint to the King, That by reason of the continuance of the War with England, that Province is not able to pay their Taxes, being wholly ruined by the interruption of

His Majesty having seised on his Demessies in Provence, and made inquiry into the new Nobility, order is now given to enquire farther, what persons take upon themselves the Titles of Esquires, who are very numerous in that County; and ris said, are to be taxed at 1000 Livres a man.

His Majesty likewise ordered, That the Pamphler be torn and burnt by one of the Ushers, and himself prohibited the their number being put into other places.

Rosserdam, Dec. 9. The Admiralties Colledg of Amsterdam, has this week dispatcht a great number of Carpenters to Helvoctfluys, to repair their ships. The Land-souldiers that Helvoctsluys, to repair their ships. were the lait year at Sea, are not suffered to return totheir former companies, but are kept together, being thought more fit for Sea employment, then others not accustomed to that Service: Many of the Seamen leave the service of the States, for Employment they find in Flanders.

Edonburgh, Decemb. 4. The late defeat of the Rebels, has put an end to their defigns, and our disturbances, they being so fully broken and scattered, that scarcely two of all that Crew are any where found together: Several of them have been picked up by the Countrey people, and the Lord Anandalismen, to the number of 40 that are prisoners in one picce, and twenty five or thisty in another; every day discovering more

of them.

On Munday last, a Council was held by the Lord Commissioner, in order to the speedy Tryel of the Fomenters and Ringleaders of them, whereof two of them, one Adfonch Corson, and Hugh Machel, were put to the Tottere of the Boot. Ten of the Principals in the Rebellion were sentenced to be executed as Traytors on Thurlday last, and as many more on the Munday following. The Lord Commissioner with a confiderable part of the Army, intending freedly to march into those parts where this Robellion had its birth, the better to settle the peace of these Counties, and to bring the Authors of their disturbance to a speedy Tryal.
