Ruremond, July 10. On Monday last the Troops which have lay'n for some time in this Neighborhood marched towards Maestricht, to be employed in the Siege of that place, where the Prince of Orange arrived the 7th inflant, and the Duke of Ofnabrug the next day. Count Horne, General of the Artillery, is not as yet passed by here with the Cannon designed for that Siege, but is expected this evening or to morrow. Great numbers of Pioneers have been sent from row. Great numbers of Pioneer's have been fent from all these parts to the Camp; and a considerable numper is likewise sent from the Countreys of the Duke of Number, and from Numper; so that it seems the Stege will be carried on with all vigor possible. We are told; that the Garison in the place consists in Good Men.

Int Liebe, And 12. There is now no farther doubt of the Confederates design to believe Meestraht. I he 9th instant passed by this place down the Mense, a Bridge of Boats from Names regerner with several other small vessels lades with Ammunition and Provisions. The Prisite of Orange has taken his observers at Smeer-Maes. Prince of Orange has taken his quarters at smeer-Maes, and the Duke of Ofnabrug his at set lerre. The Line of Circumvallation is almost fihished, and in a day or two the Balteries will be likewise so, and then the Trenches will be opened. The Besieged in the mean time, fire very furioufly with their Cannon; but hitherto have not made any fallies. The Prince of Orange has written to our Magistrates to affure them of his good intentions towards this City, and to defire they will permit his Commissaries to buy up Provisions here at moderate rates, which they have granted. The Spaniards of Charlemont have had a delign to furprize Dinant, and accordingly 300 Men were fent out, who went so far as to get into the Suburbs of Dinant, but the design succeeded not, and they were repulsed. We hear that several of the Burghers of Maestricht have been seized, upon the discovery of a conspiracy to let in the Enemy.

Hague, July 14. The Sieur Alemonde is arrived

here from the Balrick, and hath given an account in the Affembly of the States of the late actions with the Suedes. It is faid he is appointed by the States to command the ships they intend to fend into the Mediterranean, to reinforce the Squadron they have already The Sieur Engel de Ruster is gone towards the Baltick, to command the Dutch Squadron there, in theroom of the Sieur Allemond. It is said the States have ordered 12000 Gilders for the making a Tomb for the late Lieutenant Admiral de Ruyter. The Siege of Maestricht being now formed, the States have commanded publication of a free Leaguer there; and accordingly Passports will be given to all persons who will carry thither any Provisions or other necessaries to fell, to exempt them from paying any impositions or charges for the same as they pass up the Meuse; by which means, and by the other care that has been taken by his Highness, it's not doubted but the Camp there will be abundantly provided with whatever they shall stand in need The 11th instant, we had advice of the arrival of 6 of our East India Ships in the Texel, the rest, being 6 more, have put into the Maes, and into Zealand.

Bruffels, July 14. Maestricht is now actually besieged, his Highness the Prince of O ange has his quarters at Smeer Mass, about half a League from the place, on the side of Ruremond; and the Duke of Osnahrug his near St Pierre, on the side towards Linge. Fresh Troops, with great quantities of all kind of Provisions arrive daily in the Camp, as also great numbers of Provincers; of which fort, 2000 were to come from the Dutchy of Inters. Major-General Farm was arrived in the Camp from Treves. and the Biflop of Munster was likewise expected in few days. On Sun lay last in the morning Monfieur de Lonvoy parted hence for Flanders, to affift, morning monitor are convey parties to the councel, who at present folely commands our Army there, under the Duke of Orleans.

The Mareschal d'Humières is made Governor General of all him Majesties Conquests in Flauders, with a Pention of 50000 Livres per annum. The most considerable news we have at present in Town is, of the discovery of a Conspiracy at Macfirith, formed by some of the principal Inhabitants, who, it's faid had made a Mine under the place, where is kept all the powder and other stores of the Garison, and that the design was to have blown it up, and while the Governor and the principal Officers were in the surprize and disorder that wouldbe occasioned by that accident, the Conspirators were to open one of the Gates of the place, and let in the Enemy. It is farther faid, that the Garison, after the faid Plot had been difcovered, and most of the chief contrivers of it secured, had made a Sally upon the Buemy, and had killed many of them; of which our next Letters from Flanders will give us a certain account, which seems yet wanting. We have Letters from Mase of the 10th, when the Duke of Luxomburg was encamped at a place called Vierge, without receiving any dissurbance from the Enemy, who seem wholly intent upon the siege of Philipsburg, having sinished their Batteries, on which they have 80 pieces of Canson, which they had for some days employed without any intermission against the Besieged, who hithertowant nothing necessary for their defence, and are sult of reasonation to defend the place; so that we doubt not but they will give the Besiegers work enough. The Duke of Lorquin continues encamped at Weissemburg, having so fortisted his Camp, which is beside guarded by the small Rivet Laster that passes before it, that he is secured against all attempts. The affair of Madam Bimvilliers continues to give the suggesta of which our next Letters from Flanders will give us a certain account, which feems yet wanting.
