PROCLAMATION,
 For Encouraging Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War.

WHEREAS it is Our Royal Intention to give the said Encouragement to all such Landmen, who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service; We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and We do hereby promise and declare,

That all such Able-Bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five Years, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; fit for Our Service, who shall, on or before the Thirty-first Day of December next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve on Board Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as shall be employed for raising Men for the Service of Our Navy, shall receive, as Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Twenty Shillings each Man; such Sum to be paid them by the respective Clerks of the Checque residing at the Ports or Places where the Ships, into which they shall be entered, shall

shall be, immediately after the Third Muster of such Men. And for Prevention of any Abuses by any Persons leaving the Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on Board any other Ships or Vessels in order to obtain the said Bounty-Money; We do hereby declare and command, That such Men, belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on Board any other of Our said Ships or Vessels in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerits.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Thirtieth Day of November, 1770, in the Eleventh Year of Our Reign.

AT the Court at St. James's, the 9th Day of December, 1770,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 30th of last Month, to direct, that the Quarantine then subsisting upon all Ships and Vessels coming from Hamburg and Bremen, should be taken off; and that all such Ships and Vessels should be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings, without opening, unpacking, and airing, and without performing any Quarantine, provided that they have no Rags or Cotton-Wool on Board, and that the Master, or other Person taking Charge of such Ship or Vessel, do first make Oath before the Custom-House Officer or Chief Magistrate, on their Arrival at the Place where they are bound to, that they did not touch at any Place from whence Quarantine is required to be performed, nor had Communication with any Ship or Vessel subject thereto during the Voyage, and that the Crew are all in Health. And whereas His Majesty hath received Information, that Hemp, and Flax, and Human Hair, and Feathers, are frequently brought on board Ships coming from Hamburg and Bremen, which Goods are likewise more especially liable to retain Infection;—His Majesty, for the better preventing the Infection now raging in some Parts of Poland from being brought into this Kingdom, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that all Ships and Vessels coming from Hamburg or Bremen, and having Rags, Cotton-Wool, Hemp, or Flax, or Human Hair, or Feathers, on board, that are already arrived, or shall hereafter arrive, in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, do make their Quarantine for Forty Days, and do likewise strictly conform themselves, in all Respects, to the Rules and Regulations now in Force, and required to be observed by Ships and Vessels subject to Quarantine.—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief, for the Time being, of the said respective Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

IT is unnecessary in these Proposals to point out minutely the particular Excellence of the Dictionary which we propose to reprint, since it has been for near a Century admired by all Europe, and its extreme Scarcity universally regretted. A Work which for so long a Period has met with general Approbation, and has been sought with such Avidity by Men of every Rank and Profession, must, certainly, have a real and intrinsic Merit, to which no Commendation can add, and from which no Censure can detract.

It may not however be improper to subjoin a few Arguments in Favour of this Work, and demonstrate its peculiar Usefulness in facilitating the Attainment of the Persian (a Language of great Importance to the Honourable East-India Company) more especially as those who are unacquainted with the Subject might possibly imagine that a Dictionary including the ARABICK and TURKISH as well as the PERSIAN, was not necessary for those who wish to acquire a Knowledge of the PERSIAN only.

The Dialects of Arabia and Persia were extremely different in their Origin; but they were entirely united and blended together when the Arabs spread over Asia their Arms, their Religion, and their Learning. The conquered Nations received with Eagerness the Literature of their Conquerors: They considered it as a Mark of Erudition and of Elegance to use Arabick Words and Expressions, and to fill their Writings with Allusions to the Arabian Poems and Proverbs: Besides, from a Principle of Piety, they adopted the Language and even the Letters of their Koran. The Ottoman Conquests in After-times diffused their Dialect over half the East; it became even the Language of the Court of Persia, where it is still spoken, and made its Way into many Parts of India; thus, by Degrees, the Idioms of those Tongues were almost changed, and became Dialects of one vast Language, which mutually enrich and illustrate each other; like a Number of little States, retaining their private Laws, and concurring to form one extensive Empire.
