THIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord President of the Council, the Earl of Halifax, the Duke of Grafton, and several other Lords therein mentioned, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for continuing, and granting to His Majesty, certain Duties upon Malt, Mum, Cyder, and Perry, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy-one.

An Act for the better Supply of Mariners and Seamen to serve in His Majesty's Ships of War, and on board Merchant Ships, and other Trading Ships and Vessels.

An Act to amend so much of an Act made in the Ninth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intitled, An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act made in the Twenty-first Year of the Reign of King James the First, intitled, An Act for the general Quiet of the Subjects against all Pretences of Concealment whatsoever, as relates to the Prosecuting His Majesty's Right, Title, or Claim, to any Messuages, Lands, Tenements, or Hereditaments, within the Precinct, District, or Liberty, of the Savoy, in the County of Middlesex, or to any the Appurtenances to the same, therein mentioned.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act made in the Second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intitled, An Act for repairing and widening the High Road leading from the North End of Ballingdon Bridge, in Sudbury, in the County of Suffolk, to the South Gate in Bury Saint Edmund's, in the said County.

An Act to continue, and render more effectual, an Act passed in the Ninth Year of His present Majesty, for repairing the Roads leading from the Turnpike Road in Tring in the County of Hertford, through Dunstable, Hitchin, Baldock, and Royston, to the Turnpike Road at or near Bourn Bridge, and from the West End of Welbury Lane, to the Turnpike Road at the South End of Barton in the Counties of Hertford, Bucks, Bedford, and Cambridge, so far as the same relates to the Repairing the Roads in the Royston District of Roads, in the said Act particularly mentioned.

A PROCLAMATION,

For Encouraging Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS it is Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all such Landmen, who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service; We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Procla-

mation; and We do hereby promise and declare, That all such Able-Bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five Years, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service, who shall, on or before the Thirty-first Day of December next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve on Board Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as shall be employed for raising Men for the Service of Our Navy, shall receive, as Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Twenty Shillings each Man; such Sum to be paid them by the respective Clerks of the Cheque residing at the Ports or Places where the Ships, into which they shall be entered, shall be, immediately after the Third Muster of such Men. And for Prevent on of any Abuses by any Persons leaving the Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on Board any other Ships or Vessels in order to obtain the said Bounty-Money; We do hereby declare and command, That such Men, belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on Board any other of Our said Ships or Vessels in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerits.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Thirtieth Day of November, 1770, in the Eleventh Year of Our Reign.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 30th of last Month, to direct, that the Quarantine then subsisting upon all Ships and Vessels coming from Hamburgh and Bremen, should be taken off; and that all such Ships and Vessels should be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings, without opening, unpacking, and airing, and without performing any Quarantine, provided that they have no Rags or Cotton-Wool on Board, and that the Master, or other Person taking Charge of such Ship or Vessel, do first make Oath before the Custom-House Officer or Chief Magistrate, on their Arrival at the Place where they are bound to, that they did not touch at any Place from whence Quarantine is required to be performed, nor had Communication with any Ship or Vessel subject thereto during the Voyage, and that the Crew are all in Health. And whereas His Majesty hath received Information, that Hemp, and Flax, and Human Hair, and Feathers, are frequently brought on board Ships coming from Hamburgh and Bremen, which Goods are likewise more especially liable to retain Infection; His Majesty, for the better preventing the Infection now raging in some Parts of Poland from being brought into this Kingdom, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that all Ships and Vessels coming from Hamburgh or Bremen, and having Rags, Cotton-Wool, Hemp, or Flax, or Human Hair, or Feathers, on board, that

that are already arrived; or shall hereafter arrive, in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, do make their Quarantine for Forty Days, and do likewise strictly conform themselves, in all Respects, to the Rules and Regulations now in Force, and required to be observed by Ships and Vessels subject to Quarantine—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief, for the Time being, of the said respective Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

St. James's December 3.

His Majesty has been pleased to grant unto William Le Marchant, Esq; the Office of Bailiff of the Island of Guernsey, in the room of Samuel Bonamy, Esq; deceased.

St. Petersburg, November 9. Yesterday Evening her Imperial Majesty, the Grand Duke, and Prince Henry of Prussia, went to Zarsko Zelo.

A most magnificent Firework was played off; the Road from hence was decorated, at different Stations, with Representations of Buildings in transparent Scenery, illuminated with about Forty Thousand Lamps.

There was a Masquerade at the Palace, and Supper for the whole Company.

The Empress and Grand Duke had Tables in separate Rooms, and there were many others for their Court, Foreigners, and Merchants.

The British of all Ranks were, as on all other Occasions, greatly distinguished by her Imperial Majesty, and by her Court.

Stockholm, November 27. The Anniversary of the King's Orders was celebrated here Yesterday, in the usual Manner; and his Majesty was pleased to give the four vacant Blue Ribbons to the Senators Walwick, Scheffer, Beckfries, and Hermanfon.

The Commanderies of the Order of the Sword were given to General Wrede and to Vice-Admiral Pfilanderschiold; and those of the North Star to M. Rozir, the Chancellor of Justice; to M. Benzeltierna, the Postmaster-General; and to Count Creutz, the Swedish Envoy at Paris.

Rotterdam, December 7. By the Bank of the Rhine giving Way in the Night between Saturday and Sunday last, near Upheusden, the Districts of Lower Betuwe and Thielerswaard, Cuylenberg, Asperen, and Henkelom, are overflowed, and all the Country in those Parts, to the Foot of the Bank called the Dief Dyck, is under Water.

Letters from Cleves say, that the Waters of the Rhine, the Roer, and the Lippe, are so very high,

that they are in hourly Expectation of bad News from those Parts.

St. James's, December 11, 1770.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That a Number of desperate Men, armed with Fire-Arms, whose Names are at present unknown, did, on the 13th Day of October, and on the 20th Day of November last, break open the Guard-House erected at the Entrance of the Black Lead Mine near Seabwait in the County of Cumberland, and did forcibly enter into a Part of the said Mine, with Intent to take and carry away Black Lead from thence, and did also threaten the Lives of the Persons who had the Care of the said Mines: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Offences, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Fellowship of Pilots of the Trinity House of Dover, Deal, and the Isle of Thanet.

Whereas notwithstanding the late Determination of the Court of King's Bench, it has been discovered that Masters and Commanders of Ships or Vessels passing by Dover, Deal, and the Isle of Thanet, have taken upon themselves to conduct such Ships or Vessels up the Rivers Thames and Medway, whereby they have incurred the Penalties prescribed by the Statute made in the Third Year of the Reign of King George the First: Notice therefore is hereby given, that if any Master, Commander, or Owner of any Ship or Vessel passing by any of the said Places, shall proceed with the same up either of the said Rivers, without taking an established Pilot at Dover, Deal, or the Isle of Thanet, the Person or Persons so offending will be prosecuted for the Penalties directed by the said Statute.
