The Apprehensions of the Plague being in the Army at Bender, or in the Ukraine, are at an End. That fatal Distemper never reached either of those Places. What gave Rise to the Report was, that a Spotted Fever raged in several Places, which had the Appearance of the Plague.

We have Advices from Poland, that the Misery and Diffress of the Inhabitants of that Kingdom have added greatly to the Numbers which have died of the Epidemical Diforder they had amongst them.

Vienna, January 5. On New Year's Day, which was kept with the usual Solemnity, their Imperial Majesties received, in the Morning, the Compliments of the Ambassadors, Foreign Ministers, and Principal Nobility; and in the Evening there was an Apartment in Grand Gala.

The Military Promotion, declared that Day, is a very numerous one: It confilts of 4. Generals of Foot, (of which Prince Poniatowski is one) 18 Lieutenant-Generals, 49 Major-Generals, and 19 Colonels, 12 Lieutenant-Colonels, and 1 Major.
