Petersburgh, January 4. The Empress returned to Town on Wednesday. There has been so strong a Thaw for some Days, that it is thought the River is in Danger of overflowing its Banks. The Snow is mostly melted; a great Quantity of Provisions is spoiled; and many other Inconveniencies are apprehended from that Cause, and from the Want of Communication with the interior Parts of the Empire.

Pisa, January 14. For some Days past frequent Shocks of an Earthquake have been felt at Leghorn, which so terrified the Inhabitants, that many fled from their Houses; some went on board the Ships in the Mole, others slept in Boats on the Canals, and many in Coaches in the great Square: They were scarce beginning to recover from their Fears, when they were again alarmed by some small Shocks Yesterday, which have so much terrified them that many are come hither, and no Business is attended to.

Copenhagen, January 22. Count Ahlefeldt, late Governor of this Capital, being appointed Stadtholder of the County of Oldenburgh, his Danish Majesty has been pleased to order M. Sames, as eldest Colonel in this Garrison, to take the Command of it till the Nomination of a new Governor.

Copenhagen, January 26. Great Preparations are making for the Celebration of his Danish Majesty's Birth-day, which is intended to be performed with extraordinary Magnificence.

M. de Plessen, Knight of the Order of the Elephant, and Grand Master of the Ceremonies, died here Yesterday Morning.

Berlin, January 29. Last Thursday, the 24th, being the Birth Day of the King of Prussia, his Majesty, in order to avoid the Ceremonies usual on that Occasion, set out early in the Morning for Potsdam.

Potzdam, accompanied by the Prince and Princess Royal of Prussia. In the Evening there was a Concert of Music, a Supper, and Ball, in Honour of the Day, in the Queen's Apartments in the Palace in this City.

Berlin, January 29. Yesterday Morning at Ten o'Clock, Sir Andrew Mitchell, Knight of the Bath, His Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary at this Court, who had been for some Months past in a bad State of Health, died here greatly lamented; having, during many Years Residence, gained the Esteem of all Ranks of People.

Dresden, January 27. Preparations are making here for the Reception of her Serene Highness the Electress Palatine, who is perfectly recovered from her late Indisposition, and intends to set out from Manheim on the 5th of February.

Rotterdam, February 5. All the Fears of Inundation from the Leck, Whall, and Merwede, have at present subsided, by the Ice giving Way, and going off very gently in the Night between Thursday and Friday last. The Water runs off so considerably, that all the Persons, who were set to watch the Banks, are dismissed.
