His Excellency's Answer.

My Lords,

I Return you my sincere Thanks for this your very kind and obliging Address. The favorable Opinion which you are pleased to express of me affords me the greatest Pleasure. It has been, and will be, my Endeavour to deserve it. You may rely upon my faithful Representation to His Majesty in every Thing which concerns you and this Country; and I flatter myself that, through the Harmony which subsists between us, our joint Endeavours will be effectual to promote the Publick Welfare, which I have much at Heart.

Whitehall, March 15.

Complaint having been made to His Majesty, supported by Depositions upon Oath, of the supposed ill-Treatment of a Dutch Ship stranded near Deal on the 12th of January last; His Majesty was pleased to order an Advertisement in this Paper of Saturday the 23d of February last past, offering a Reward for the Discovery of the Persons accused of such atrocious Crimes; and farther, to direct the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports to make all possible Enquiry into the Fact: His Lordship has accordingly transmitted to His Majesty's Secretary of State the voluntary Depositions of several Persons that were upon the Shore at the Time, and previous to the said Ship's being stranded; by which it appears, That one Thomas Mercer, a Boatman at Deal, of known Courage and Ability, offered, for the Sum of Six Guineas, to carry the said Captain on board his Ship, and to assist him in cutting away her Masts; which, in the joint Opinion of all the Sea-faring People present, was the only possible Means by which the Ship could have been preserved; but his Assistance was refused.

That Thomas Sayer, Gentleman, Serjeant of the Admiralty of the Cinque Ports, and several of his Deputies, attended, and offered (they being the proper Officers for that Purpose) his and their Assistance to the said Captain, which he particularly

futed; and they, against the Consent of the Captain, saved the Lives of the Crew, in great Hazard of their own, and procured them Refreshments and Apparel: That within five Minutes after the last Person of the Crew was got on Shore, the Ship broke to Pieces, and Part of her Cargo, consisting of Lemons and Oranges, which were soon spoiled by the Sea-Water, and the Severity of the Weather, were seen floating for a long Way down the Coast soon after the Ship went to Pieces.

That the Magistrates used all possible Precautions, though not applied to by the Captain, that what might be saved of the Wreck or Cargo might be preferred for the Benefit of the Proprietors, upon Payment of reasonable Salvage.

That the Captain refused to appoint an Agent for the said Ship, which is usual upon such Occasions, though it was proposed to him by John Iggulden, Esq; one of the Justices of the Peace for the Town of Deal.

That, on the 14th of January, the Captain executed a regular Bill of Sale to Abraham Walker and others, of all the Wreck of the said Ship, with all and singular her Anchors, Cables, Masts, Bowsprits, Sails, Sail-Yards, Rigging, Cordage, Boats, Windlasses, and all other Materials, and all Goods, Monies, and other Effects whatsoever, and all Provisions to be saved out of, or any ways now or heretofore belonging to the same Ship, for the Sum of Twenty-six Pounds Five Shillings.

It has been thought proper to publish this Account, in Justification of the Magistrates and People of Deal, who have been traduced and falsely accused by the Depositions of the said Captain.
