From the Camp before Philips' urg, July 22. The 19 instant Count Startenberg began to batter the Town from his Battery; and the fame night he attacked, and after a sharp dispute, ga ued a [mall Fort or Redoubt which is before the Coun erfeare; we had on our fide about 100 kill dand wounded; and in the faid Fort we tound 80 of the French killed; fo that the Siege advances very well though we are afraid, that the overflowings of the Rbine, which begins to rife very much, will extremely incommode us. Yesterday the Imperial Army under the command of the Duke of Liveding came to Heyligenteim, within half a League from hence, and at prefent lies posted between Spire and Germersheim; from whence it will not fir till this place be taken, in the mean time, the Duke of London fortifics his Camp

From the French Camp at Selez, in Alface, July 23, We have been encamped here these two days, within five hours march from the Imperial Army, which lies posted between Germerthe m and Spire, where they have two Bri ges over the Rhine. We do not yet know when we shall remove from hence From Phil piburg we hear, that the Bessegers rock the 19 at night, small Work or Fort, which lay before the Counterscarp, and

kept it, though with confiderable loss on their fide.

Cologro, July 24. The Heer Vander Eeck, Envoy from the Prince of Orange, who came to demand of the Duke of Newburgs Ministers a farther supply of Men, is returned to the Camp before Maestricht. From Francfort we hear, that General Fermuller was returned to the Army, which it was expected would be very fud-

dealy engaged in a Battel with the French.

From the Camp before Macktricht, July 25. The 22 instant two of our Batteries began to play, the one of twelve pieces of Cannon, and the other of five; on the 23 we had a third of cannon, and the other of the 3 of the 24 we had a three Battery of eight pieces, and the 24, a fourth of fix pieces, all of them carrying 24!. Amfterdam, July 18. One of our Men of War is arrived from Gerenburg, from whence are come in her the Count Oxenft rne, and another Senator of Sueden, who are going to Nimiguencih quality of Ambassadors from that Crown. The Captain of the faid Man of War tells us, That the Sienr Guldenlien was come with his Army within three Leagues of Gottenburg. have etters from Mosco of the 23 past, which say, That the Ambassador of this State was parted thence on his return home. That on the 19 of that Month a Fire hapned in that City, which burnt several houses, and what is most to be lamented, that above 300 People were burnt or killed by other accidents That on the 12, hapned another Fire more violent than the other, burning down above 4000 houses, and destroying a great many People; so that by those frequent Fires that have hapned there of late, above half that City lies in Ashes.

Hague, July 28. The States of Holland are ftill affembled, but intend to separate about the middle of the next Week. We do not hear that a final refolution is as yet taken concerning the Equipping the Men of War designed for the Mediterranean. The Biege of Ma ftricht advances very well, the last Letters we have from thence are of the 25 instant, they give us an account, That in the Princes quarter were several Batteries, on which were planted 40 pieces of Cannon; which battered the Town very furioufly, and had ruined two Baltions, and done other confiderable execution; That the Befleged were not wanting likewife to make use of their Cannon, with great effect; That the 24, the Trenches were advanced within Piffol shot of an Out-Bastion, there having been that night about 30 killed; That hey were running several Lines, to discover the Mines of the Besseged; And that in a day or two, it was believed some of the Outworks would be stormed; That the 25, his Highness, as he was coming out of the Trenches, whither he had led his own Regiment of Guards, received a Musket shot in the right Arm, which paffing only through the fleshy part without touching the Bone, made a wound of little confideration, and did not hinder him from being on Horseback most part of that day. The Rbinegrave was likewife wounded in the (heek, but very lightly. The Major of Colonel Fenn els R giment, who was faid in our lack to have been killed, is still alive, but very dangerously wounded.
