-of Mae Bricht, Yesterday be encamped at a Village cal-'led Scarbcoke, about half a League from hence, and this morning has passed the Canal, and continues his march towards Ghent, where the Duke de Villa Hermosa has been encamped two dr three dayes in expectation of himsthatfo they might march with their joint Forces to the relief of Aire; but we very much fear the place will be taken before his Excellency can arrive there, the French having already possessed themselves of the Fort St Francis: it seems the Commander in chief in the faid Fore, having withstood two Attacks of the Besiegers, and finding he havinor men enough to defend ic much langer, abandond it in the night, and retired into the Town. The Siege of Maestricht, according to our advices from thence of the 26 inflant, was so well advanced, that the Bessegers had hopes to be Masters of it in 8 or 10 dayes.

Ditto, July 31. We have Letters from Naples of the 7th inflant, which confirm the ill News we had by the preceding Polt, of the Revolt of Palermo, yet fo, as that the Spaniteds continue to keep the Castles. The Inhabitants, it's faid, had planted feveral pieces of Cannon, and would not permit the Dutch or Spaniards to come ashore from their ships. The Letters add, That the French of Messins had made an attemptupon the Fort Scaletta, but that they had been repulsed with the loss of 200 men killed and raken Prisoners. This evening we receive Letters from Ghent, which fay, That on the 29, the Duke de Villa Hermosa removed from Marackirke to Nevele near Degnse on the River Lie, where he expected the Count of Waldeck, who was to pass the Schelde yesterday at a place called Gaure. From the Camp before Macfiricht, we are told, that they continue to batter the Town very furioully; I hat the Trenches advance very well; That the 29, at night, Monsieur de Louvigny had taken by Aslault one of the Redoubts which covers the Counterscarp; and that this night the Prince intended to make a general Affault upon the Outworks. It is said that his Highness had intercepted a Letter from the Governor of Maestricht, wherein he presses for speedy relief.

Bruges, July 29. Yesterday morning the Regiment of Foot that was in Garison here, marched our rowards Ipres, leaving the guard of this place to the Burghers. Yesterday in the evening arrived here two Regiments, and this night we expect two Dutch Regiments from Sluye, who are all to march to Ipres, to expect the Duke de Villa Hermosa there in his march to the relief of Aire; his Excellency has been encamped these two days at Marickinke on this side Ghent, in expectation of Count Waldeck with the Dutch Troops. Just now we have a report, that his Excellency decamped this morning, and is marching towards Thiel in the way to Ipres. Since the Siege of dise, 160 Musketeers got into the place from 31 Omerse 50 mote attempted to do the like, but could act effect it. The French, we hear, have taken the Fort 52 Franch, that is, the Spaniards quitted it, and retired into the Town, not being strong enough to defendite

to defendit.

Ditto, Anguit, ... The Duke de Ville Hermele is an present encamped at Nevele, three Leagues from Ghent; and yesterday. Counter Wallice, Passing the Sobelde and the Lin. Hague; July in. The Equipage for the Medistrales nean, is, it's faid, finally refolved, and the Captains sa-

med for the Men of War, which will be fitted out with all possible diligence. Our last advices from the Camp before Macfiricht, are of the 29 pall; They fay, that the Siege advanged very well; That the Cannon of the Beflegers, had dismounted almost all the Cannon in the Town, and had made grea breaches in two or three Bastions; That that night, viz. of the 29, an Artack was intended on a Ravelin, and that in a day or two a general Assult would be made upon the Counterscarp; That the 26, a great Fire was seen in the Town, and lasted two kours, burning as is believed, some Magazine of Corn or Hay; whether the Fire was accidental, or occasioned by o-r shot, we know no. The 27 at night, the Besieged made a al.y, but were repu'f i wit ic nsiderable loss; the Besiegers continue to batter the place without the least intermission. The states Gene at have written a Letter to the Prince of Oruzce, to this effect; That they were very much troubled at the wound his Highness had received; but more, to perceive that His Highness evposed his illustrious Person every hour to fich immineus danger, and preyed him to be more sparing of himself for the future, considering his Person was of fuch importance to the State, that, next to the mercy and affiltance of God, it was altogether necessary to les preservation and happiness. Here is a report in Town, as it Saile was to have been delivered up as this day, to the Duke of Zell.

Pn is, August 1, The King has by an Express received advice from his ambossar'or at Rome, that the Pope dyed the 22 past, a optione in the afternoon; pronowhich, all the Cardinals that are here, are bastening away with all diligence to affile at the new Election. The Letters we have from Aface, are of the 26 past, when the Duke of Luximba g was fill encamped at Salix, having caused a great many Boaus and Carpenters. Obe provided, as if he designed to pais the Rhine; The Duke of Loria n had very strongly fortified his Camp so that it would be a difficult matter to attack him. We expect every day to hear that Aire is taken.
