WHEREAS an anonymous Letter hath been received by the Right Honorable the Lord Mayor, and by him transmitted to the Earl of Suffolk, representing, that the Writer thereof would make some important Discoveries concerning the late Fire at Portsmouth Dock, if he were assured of His Majesty's Pardon; which Letter hath been humbly laid before the King: His Majesty is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to the Writer of the said Letter for the Offences therein mentioned, provided Information shall be given to one of the Principal Secretaries of State, upon which the Parties concerned may be apprehended and brought to Justice.

Hamburg, February 9. In a late Assembly of the Burghers of this City, they came to a Resolution of granting a Tax of one Quarter per Cent. on all their Capitals and Estates, in order to raise Supplies sufficient for the extraordinary Expences incurred by the Inundation.—The Gardens are not free from the Water yet; and the only Passage over the Lands continues to be in Boats. The charitable Contributions raised in the Churches on the Fast-Day, upon this Occasion, amounted to Twenty-seven Thousand Three Hundred and Forty Marks (1826 l. Sterling) and the British Factory made a Donation of One Thousand Six Hundred and Sixty-nine Marks (1111 s. 4 d. Sterling.)

Kaminoi Ostroff, July 23. We have these two Days past had Storms of Thunder and Lightning so violent, that many Persons here, who have been in the East and West-Indies, assure us they have never seen the like.

Yesterday the Lightning struck upon the Galieren Haven, and occasioned three Fires, by which Twenty-Six Gallies were entirely consumed, and a Magazine of Pitch, Masts, and Cordage, belonging to the Gallies, was burnt.

The Grand Duke has had a very good Night, and all Symptoms have this Day been so favourable, that there is now the best Foundation for expecting that his Imperial Highness will recover very fast, to which the late Change in the Weather, which had been for some Time uncommonly sultry, will greatly contribute.

Berlin, August 10. We have had almost constant Rains here for these three Weeks past, which have done incredible Damage in these Parts.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to the King, by Information upon Oath, that on the 10th Day of this Instant Month of August, about Eight of the Clock in the Morning, in Great Yarmouth in the County of Norfolk, a written Letter, unsealed, directed to Mrs. Le Grys at Browston, dated the 27th Day of July last, was found in the Seat of a Market-Cart, the Property of the said Mrs. Le Grys; which Letter contains a Threat to murder John Ramey, of Great Yarmouth aforesaid, Esq; one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Norfolk, and His Majesty's Receiver-General of the said County, as he shall pass from his House in Great Yarmouth to his House in Ormesby, and a Declaration that the Authors of the said



said Letter have laid Wait on the first Wednesday in June last, on the Road to Ormesby, to take away his Life; and that, on the 7th Day of June last, they laid in a Straw House of the said John Ramey in Ormesby, and had then a Design to set the same on Fire; and that they did attempt to rob the House of the said Mrs. Le Grys, in Browston in Suffolk, and now threaten to break open and rob the same; and threaten to lay Wait for Edward Holden, of Barsbam in the County of Suffolk, Clerk, one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Suffolk: And whereas it hath been also represented to the King, that on or about the Month of September 1769, the said Mrs. Le Grys's Dwelling-House in Browston was attacked in the Night, but the Family being alarmed, the Offenders made off; and that on the 5th Day of November last, about Six o'Clock in the Afternoon, the new-built Tower or Summer-House, in the Garden or Pleasure-Ground of the said Mrs. Le Grys in Browston, was wilfully set on Fire, and with the Furniture therein entirely consumed: His Majesty, for the better discovery and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in writing and leaving the said Letter, is hereby pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Warwick, August 12, 1771.

Notice is hereby given, That the Deputy Lieutenants of the County of Warwick, (in the Absence of the Lord Lieutenant) at a General Meeting held this Day at Warwick in the said County, for putting the Militia Laws into Execution, have ordered that the Militia of the said County shall be trained and exercised this Year, by Regiment, for Twenty-eight Days together; and that the said Militia shall assemble and meet at Warwick for that Purpose, on Saturday the 14th Day of September next; and all Militia Men of the said County are required to attend at the Time and Place of Exercise appointed as aforesaid: And if any Man (not labouring under any Infirmity incapacitating him) does not appear at the Time and Place aforesaid, every such Militia-Man who shall be convicted thereof, upon Oath before one Justice of the Peace, forfeits the Sum of Twenty Pounds, which if not immediately paid, the said Justice is, by the Laws aforesaid, directed by Warrant to commit such Militia Man to the Common Goal of the said County, there to remain, without Bail or Mainprize for the Space of Six Months, or until he shall have paid the Penalty aforesaid.
