St. James's, August 31, 1771.

HIS Majesty was graciously pleased, in the Month of June last Year, to direct, that the Ensigns of the most Honorable Military Order of the Bath should be sent to the East-Indies, for the Investiture of Colonel Eyre Coote, Major-General in the East-Indies, by one of the Princes of that Country; and the same were accordingly sent by Captain Dent, Commander of His Majesty's Ship the Dolphin; but as Colonel Coote set out from thence, on his Return to England, before the Arrival of the Dolphin, the Ceremony was not performed till Yesterday, when His Majesty was graciously pleased to invest Colonel Coote with the Ensigns of the said Order, in the following Manner:

The Sovereign having put on the Ribbon, with the Symbol of the Order hanging to it, Mr. Hill, the Gentleman Usher, bearing the Scarlet Rod, and habited in the Mantle of the Order, introduced Colonel Coote, Mr. Whitehead, Register and Secretary of the Order, (in the Absence of Mr. Horsley, Bath King of Arms) carrying the Ribbon on a Cushion, a Gentleman Usher Daily Waiter carrying the Sword of State, which was delivered to the Sovereign by the Right Honorable the Earl of Rochford, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, (there not being a Knight Companion of the Order present;) Colonel Coote kneeling, was knighted with the Sword of State: Then the Earl of Rochford, having received the Ribbon, with the Badge of the Order, from Mr. Whitehead, presented the same to the Sovereign, who put the Ribbon over the new-made Knight's Right Shoulder: Then he had the Honour of kissing His Majesty's Hand; which done, he rose up and retired.

The Ceremony was performed after the Levee, in His Majesty's Closet.

The King has been pleased to direct Letters Patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the Kingdom of Ireland, for granting to Robert Gorges, Batchelor of Law, the Deanry of the Cathedral Church of Kilmacduagh, alias Duach, alias St. Colman, in the Diocese of Kilmacduagh, or Clonfert and Kilmacduagh, in the Kingdom of Ireland, void by the Death of William Nethercoat, Clerk, late Dean thereof.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to the King, by Information upon Oath, that on the 10th Day of

this Instant Month of August, about Eight of the Clock in the Morning, in Great Yarmouth in the County of Norfolk, a written Letter, unsealed, directed to Mrs. Le Grys at Browston, dated the 27th Day of July last, was found in the Seat of a Market-Cart, the Property of the said Mrs. Le Grys; which Letter contains a Threat to murder John Ramey, of Great Yarmouth aforesaid, Esq; one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Norfolk, and His Majesty's Receiver-General of the said County, as he shall pass from his House in Great Yarmouth to his House in Ormesby, and a Declaration that the Authors of the said Letter have laid Wait on the first Wednesday in June last, on the Road to Ormesby, to take away his Life; and that, on the 7th Day of June last, they laid in a Straw House of the said John Ramey in Ormesby, and had then a Design to set the same on Fire; and that they did attempt to rob the House of the said Mrs. Le Grys, in Browston in Suffolk, and now threaten to break open and rob the same; and threaten to lay Wait for Edward Holden, of Barham in the County of Suffolk, Clerk, one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Suffolk: And whereas it hath been also represented to the King, that on or about the Month of September 1769, the said Mrs. Le Grys's Dwelling-House in Browston was attacked in the Night, but the Family being alarmed, the Offenders made off; and that on the 5th Day of November last, about Six o'Clock in the Afternoon, the new-built Tower or Summer-House, in the Garden or Pleasure-Ground of the said Mrs. Le Grys in Browston, was wilfully set on Fire, and with the Furniture therein entirely consumed: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in writing and leaving the said Letter, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

SUFFOLK.

And, as a farther Encouragement, we do promise to pay the Sum of THREE HUNDRED POUNDS, viz. each of us One Hundred Pounds, and for Mrs. Le Grys One Hundred Pounds, to the Person who shall make such Discovery as aforesaid, (except as before excepted) to be paid on the Conviction of the Offenders, or of any one of them.
