*St. James's, October 25.*

**T**HIS Day being the Anniversary of the King's Accession to the Throne, who entered into the Twelfth Year of His Reign, there was a numerous and brilliant Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment His Majesty upon the Occasion. At Noon the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired; and in the Evening there were Illuminations, and other Publick Demonstrations of Joy throughout London and Westminster.

*St. James's, October 25.*

The King has been pleased to appoint Thomas De Grey, junior, Esq; to be a Groom of His Majesty's Bedchamber.

*Stockholm, October 8.* Yesterday being Prince Charles's Birth-day, the King gave a great Supper to the Princes, the Senators, and other Persons of Distinction; but there was no Court for the Foreign Ministers.

The Grand Deputation having, in their last Assembly, gone through all the Articles of the King's Assurances, they are met this Day in order to expedite them to the Senate for their Consideration, that they may be laid before the next Plenum.

*Munich, October 13.* The States of Bavaria have come to a Resolution to grant the Proprietors of Land a Diminution of near one Fourth of their former Assessment, on Account of the late unfavourable Season.

The Court returned last Week from Nymphenburg. Yesterday the Elector's Name-day was celebrated here with great Splendor; and this Day the Electoral Family will remove to Cling, and soon after to Haag, two Hunting Seats about twelve French Leagues from hence.

*Ostend, October 23.* Orders having been sent hither from the Court of Bruxelles for the Erection of a Fanal or Lighthouse for the Benefit of Navigation on this Coast in general, and of that to this Port in particular, (there being no Lighthouse on all this Coast, from the Island of Schouwen in Zealand to the Gaskets) the said Lighthouse was some Days ago begun to be erected in a Redoubt near the West Side of the Entrance of the Harbour. It is to be a Square Column of 104 Feet high, with a Fire Light on the Top, to burn from Sun-set to Sun-rise all the Year round; to be seen three or four Leagues at Sea; and will be compleated next Summer.

General Post-Office, October 14, 1771.

Yesterday Morning about Four o'Clock the Post-Boy driving the Mail-Carriage with the North-Road Mails from this Office, was attacked and robbed by two Men on Foot near Houndsfields, about Seven Miles and an Half from London on the Road to Busfield, who presented a Pistol to the Boy, and ordered him to drive into an inclosed Field some Distance from the Road, where, after binding his Hands and Legs, and leaving him about Thirty Yards from the Carriage, they cut and broke open the Roof of it, and stole thereout the whole North Mail except the St. Ives Bag; and in the Afternoon the greater Part of the Bags were found unopened in a Ditch not far from the Place where the Robbery was committed, and were immediately forwarded from hence by Express, but the following Bags of Letters are still missing, viz.

The Persons who committed this Robbery are described to be, one of them a middle-aged Man about Five Feet Seven or Eight Inches high, wore his Hat stopped all round, and had on a light-coloured Great Coat; the other middle-aged also, about Five Feet Six or Seven Inches high, wore a cocked Hat, and a Blue Great Coat.
