AT the Court at St. James's, the 8th Day of November, 1771,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to oblige Ships more effectually to perform their Quarantine, and for the better Preventing the Plague being brought from Foreign Parts into Great Britain or Ireland, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark; or Man," It is among many other Things Enacted, That all Ships and Vessels arriving, and all Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes whatsoever, coming or imported into any Port or Place within Great Britain or Ireland, or any of the Isles aforementioned, from any Place from whence His Majesty, His Heirs, or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, shall judge it probable that the Infection may be brought, shall be obliged to make their Quarantine in such Place and Places, for such Time, and in such Manner, as has been, or shall, from Time to Time, be directed by His Majesty, His Heirs, or Successors, by His or Their Order or Orders made in His or Their Privy Council, and notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette; and that until such Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes, shall have respectively performed, and be discharged from, such Quarantine, no such Person, Goods, or Merchandizes, or any of them, shall come or be brought on Shore, or go or be put on Board any other Ship or Vessel in any Place within His Majesty's Dominions, unless in such Manner, and in such Cases, and by such Licence, as shall be directed or permitted by such Order or Orders made by His Majesty, His Heirs, or Successors, in Council as aforesaid: And that all such Ships and Vessels, and the Persons or Goods coming or imported in, or going or being put on Board the same, and all Ships, Vessels, Boats, and Persons, receiving any Goods or Persons out of the same, shall be subject to such Orders, Rules, and Directions concerning Quarantine, and the Prevention of Infection, as have been or shall be made by His Majesty, His Heirs, and Successors, in Council, and notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette as aforementioned, under such Pains and Penalties as are inflicted by the said Act.

And whereas Information has been received, that the Plague hath broken out, and now rages at Moscow, and other Parts of Russia; and His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth thereupon judge it probable, that the Infection may be brought into this Kingdom, or the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from Archangel, Peterburgh, Narva, Riga, or some other Port or Place in the Dominions of Russia;— His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, That all Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes, now arrived, or that shall hereafter arrive, in any Port of this Kingdom, or the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey,

Alderney, Sark, or Man, from Archangel, Peterburgh, Narva, Riga, or from any other Port or Place in the Dominions of Russia, do make their Quarantine for Forty Days, which is to commence and be computed from the Day each Ship or Vessel shall come to Anchor in the Place appointed for performing Quarantine, and not before.

That the Place for performing Quarantine by such Ships and Vessels (not having the Infection on board) as are bound to the Rivers of Thames and Medway, be Standgate Creek, and by such as are bound to any other of the Ports of Great Britain, be such Places as shall be appointed by the Officers of His Majesty's Customs in the said Ports; who are hereby impowered and required to appoint proper Places for the same. And that the Places for performing Quarantine, within any Part of the said Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, be such Places as shall be appointed by the respective Governors of the said respective Isles, who are hereby impowered and required to appoint proper Places for the same.

That no Pilot shall go on board any Ship or Vessel obliged to perform Quarantine, in order to conduct the same into any Port or Place, but shall perform such Service in some other Boat or Vessel, which Boat or Vessel shall keep as much to the Windward of the Ship or Vessel so to be conducted as possible; and if any Pilot, or other Person, shall go on board such Ship or Vessel, such Pilot, or other Person, shall perform Quarantine, in like Manner as any Person coming in such Ship or Vessel shall be obliged to perform the same.

That all Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, liable to Quarantine as aforesaid, shall be opened, unpacked, and aired, unless His Majesty shall think fit, by His Order in Council, to direct otherways, and so remain a Week; other than Hemp, and Flax, Paper, and Books, Silk raw, thrown, or wrought, Linnen, Cotton Wool, Cotton Yarn, or manufactured, Wool raw, or any wise wrought, Feathers, Grograin, or Mohair Yarn, Human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmania Wool, Carpets, Camblets, Burdets, or other Manufactures of Silk and Cotton, Kid Skins, and Skins in the Wool or Hair, Spunges, Wine and Oil in Chests, Thread-Stockings, all Goods packed with Straw or Cotton, Straw Hats, and Brushes, Matting, and Artificial Flowers; which Goods and Merchandizes, so as aforesaid enumerated, are to be opened, unpacked, and aired, unless His Majesty shall think fit, by His Order in Council, to direct otherways, and so remain for the Space of a Fortnight.

That all Goods imported by such Ships and Vessels as are to be bound for the Rivers Thames and Medway, be aired on board a floating Lazaret, which is appointed for that Service in Standgate Creek; and that the Places for airing Goods that shall be imported in Ships bound to any other Ports of Great Britain, be such as shall be appointed by the Officers of His Majesty's Customs; and that the Places for airing the Goods imported into any of the said Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, be such Places as shall be appointed by the Governors or Commanders in Chief of the said respective Isles upon the Spot, who are hereby impowered

powered and required to appoint proper Places for the same.

That whatsoever Ship or Person shall receive any Men or Goods from on Board any Ship or Vessel under Quarantine, shall be compelled to perform the like Quarantine.

That such Persons as, after Quarantine performed, shall be employed in the Hold of any Ship or Vessel, for the taking any Goods not liable to retain Infection, from the Goods and Merchandizes before enumerated, shall be obliged to perform a new Quarantine.

That the Captains of every of His Majesty's Ships of War, who shall meet any such Ship or Vessel coming to any of the Ports of Great Britain, or Ireland, or of the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, shall take due Care to prevent the landing any Goods, Seamen, or Passengers, from on Board the same, until they shall be put under the Direction of the Officers of His Majesty's Customs.

That the Commissioners and other Officers of His Majesty's Customs do use their utmost Diligence and Care, that the Quarantine, before directed, be duly performed.

That the Commanders of His Majesty's Ships of War, as likewise the Commanders of His Majesty's Forts and Garrisons lying near the Sea Coasts, and all the Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Chief Magistrates, Constables, Headboroughs, Tything-Men, and all other Officers and Ministers of Justice be aiding and assisting to the said Officers of His Majesty's Customs, and to all others that shall be concerned in stopping all such Ships as aforesaid, and in bringing them to the Places appointed for the Performance of their Quarantine, and in due Performance thereof.

And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the said respective Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The Queen Dowager's Journey to Berlin, is fixed for the 4th of November.

Stockholm, October 25. The Disputes between the House of Nobles and the three inferior Orders, upon the Additions made by the latter to the Project of the King's Affurances, still continue, and prevent the fixing of the Day for the Coronation.

Last Wednesday M. Von Post, and Baron Von Essen, each presented a Project of a Representation to be made by the Nobility to the three other Orders upon the Subject of the Additions above-mentioned; and, upon a Division, M. Von Post's was approved by a Majority of 102 Votes, the Number being 412 of 310.

Escurial, October 24. Her Royal Highness the Princess of Asturias went to Mass this Morning, and dined in Publick for the first Time since her Lying-in; on which Occasion a Gala was ordered, and there was a very full Court.

His Catholick Majesty has instituted a new Order of Knighthood, in Honour of the Birth of the Infant of Spain. It is dedicated to the immaculate Conception of the Virgin, and is named the Order of Charles the Third. Besides all the Princes of the Blood, there are to be of this Order Sixty Great Crosses, Two Hundred Knights, a Chancellor, a Master of the Ceremonies, a Treasurer, and a Secretary. The Great Crosses will be composed of the principal Persons of the Court, and the Knights are to receive an annual Pension. Seven vacant Stalls of the Golden Fleece are likewise filled up; and the Title of Count of Castile is conferred upon General O'Reilly.

Brussels, November 5. On Sunday his Royal Highness came to Town from Marrimont for the Winter Season; and Yesterday, being his Name-day, there was great Gala at Court, when his Royal Highness received the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers upon the Occasion.

The Distemper among the Horned Cattle having made it's Appearance in French Flanders, this Government ordered a Cordon to be formed in the Neighbourhood of Bruges, to prevent all Communication with the Places infested. This Order was so rigorously observed, that the Country Farmers, who were to attend the Bruges Market with Corn, absented themselves for two Market Days; so that the Inhabitants were a Week without any Corn to be bought; upon which they, imagining the Commanding Officer to be the sole Cause of this Scarcity, went in a tumultuous Manner to his Quarters, demanding him to be delivered up to them; which being refused, they forced into the House, which they almost destroyed. By this Time a Guard of Soldiers came, who, having cleared the House, dressed the Officer in Question in a Soldier's Uniform, and by that Means saved him from the Fury of the Populace. Since this Affair General Murray has marched to Bruges with two Battalions and six Pieces of Cannon; and we hear that every Thing is quiet there at present.

Yesterday Morning about Four o'Clock the Post-Boy driving the Mail-Carriage with the North-Road Mails from this Office, was attacked and robbed by two Men on Foot near Houndsfields, about Seven Miles and an Half from London on the Road to Endfield, who presented a Pistol to the Boy, and ordered him to drive into an inclosed Field some Distance from the Road, where, after binding his Hands and Legs, and leaving him about Thirty Yards from the Carriage, they cut and broke open the Roof of it, and stole thereout the whole North Mail except the St. Ives Bag; and in the Afternoon the greater Part of the Bags were found unopened in a Ditch not far from the Place where the Robbery was committed, and were immediately forwarded from hence by Express, but the following Bags of Letters are still missing, viz.

The Persons who committed this Robbery are described to be, one of them a middle-aged Man about Five Feet Seven or Eight Inches high, wore his Hat flapped all round, and had on a light-coloured Great Coat; the other middle-aged also, about Five Feet Six or Seven Inches high, wore a cocked Hat, and a Blue Great Coat.

Whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, both or either of the Persons who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or, if any Person, whether an Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery whereb both or either of the Persons who committed the same may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer will, upon Conviction of both or either of the Parties, be intitled to the same Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, and will also receive His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
