AT the Court at St. James's, the 8th Day of November, 1771,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to oblige Ships more effectually to perform their Quarantine, and for the better Preventing the Plague being brought from Foreign Parts into Great Britain or Ireland, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man," It is among many other Things Enacted, That all Ships and Vessels arriving, and all Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes whatsoever, coming or imported into any Port or Place within Great Britain or Ireland, or any of the Isles aforementioned, from any Place from whence His Majesty, His Heirs, or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, shall judge it probable that the Infection may be brought, shall be obliged to make their Quarantine in such Place and Places, for such Time, and in such Manner, as has been, or shall, from Time to Time, be directed by His Majesty, His Heirs, or Successors, by His or Their Order or Orders made in His or Their Privy Council, and notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette; and that until such Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes, shall have respectively performed, and be discharged from, such Quarantine, no such Person, Goods, or Merchandizes, or any of them, shall come or be brought on Shore, or go or be put on Board any other Ship or Vessel in any Place within His Majesty's Dominions, unless in such Manner, and in such Cases, and by such Licence, as shall be directed or permitted by such Order or Orders made by His Majesty, His Heirs, or Successors, in Council as aforesaid: And that all such Ships and Vessels, and the Persons or Goods coming or imported in, or going or being out on Board the same, and all Ships, Vessels, Boats, and Persons, receiving any Goods or Persons out of the same, shall be subject to such Orders, Rules, and Directions concerning Quarantine, and the Prevention of Infection, as have been or shall be made by His Majesty, His Heirs, and Successors, in Council, and notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette as aforementioned, under such Pains and Penalties as are inflicted by the said Act.

And whereas Information has been received, that the Plague hath broken out, and now rages at Moscow, and other Parts of Russia; and His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth thereupon judge it probable, that the Infection may be brought into this Kingdom, or the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from Archangel, Petersburg, Narva, Riga, or some other Port or Place in the Dominions of Russia;— His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, That all Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes, now ar-

rived, or that shall hereafter arrive, in any Port of this Kingdom, or the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from Archangel, Petersburg, Narva, Riga, or from any other Port or Place in the Dominions of Russia, do make their Quarantine for Forty Days, which is to commence and be computed from the Day each Ship or Vessel shall come to Anchor in the Place appointed for performing Quarantine, and not before.

That the Place for performing Quarantine by such Ships and Vessels (not having the Infection on board) as are bound to the Rivers of Thames and Medway, be Standgate Creek, and by such as are bound to any other of the Ports of Great Britain, be such Places as shall be appointed by the Officers of His Majesty's Customs in the said Ports; who are hereby impowered and required to appoint proper Places for the same. And that the Places for performing Quarantine, within any Part of the said Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, be such Places as shall be appointed by the respective Governors of the said respective Isles, who are hereby impowered and required to appoint proper Places for the same.

That no Pilot shall go on board any Ship or Vessel obliged to perform Quarantine, in order to conduct the same into any Port or Place, but shall perform such Service in some other Boat or Vessel, which Boat or Vessel shall keep as much to the Windward of the Ship or Vessel so to be conducted as possible; and if any Pilot, or other Person, shall go on board such Ship or Vessel, such Pilot, or other Person, shall perform Quarantine, in like Manner as any Person coming in such Ship or Vessel shall be obliged to perform the same.

That all Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, liable to Quarantine as aforesaid, shall be opened, unpacked, and aired, unless His Majesty shall think fit, by His Order in Council, to direct otherwise, and so remain a Week; other than Hemp, and Flax, Paper, and Books, Silk raw, thrown, or wrought, Linnen, Cotton Wool, Cotton Yarn, or manufactured, Wool raw, or any wife wrought, Feathers, Grograin, or Mohair Yarn, Human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmenia Wool, Carpets, Camblets, Burdets, or other Manufactures of Silk and Cotton, Kid Skins, and Skins in the Wool or Hair, Spunges, Wine and Oil in Chests, Thread-stockings, all Goods packed with Straw or Cotton, Straw Hats, and Brushes, Matting, and Artificial Flowers; which Goods and Merchandizes, so as aforesaid enumerated, are to be opened, unpacked, and aired, unless His Majesty shall think fit, by His Order in Council, to direct otherwise, and so remain for the Space of a Fortnight.

That all Goods imported by such Ships and Vessels as are to be bound for the Rivers Thames and Medway, be aired on board a floating Lazaret, which is appointed for that Service in Standgate Creek; and that the Places for airing Goods that shall be imported in Ships bound to any other Ports of Great Britain, be such as shall be appointed by the Officers of His Majesty's Customs; and that the Places for airing the Goods imported into any of the said

said Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, be such Places as shall be appointed by the Governors or Commanders in Chief of the said respective Isles upon the Spot, who are hereby empowered and required to appoint proper Places for the same.

That whatsoever Ship or Person shall receive any Men or Goods from on Board any Ship or Vessel under Quarantine, shall be compelled to perform the like Quarantine.

That such Persons as, after Quarantine performed, shall be employed in the Hold of any Ship or Vessel, for the taking any Goods not liable to retain Infection, from the Goods and Merchandizes before enumerated, shall be obliged to perform a new Quarantine.

That the Captains of every of His Majesty's Ships of War, who shall meet any such Ship or Vessel coming to any of the Ports of Great Britain, or Ireland, or of the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, shall take due Care to prevent the landing any Goods, Seamen, or Passengers, from on Board the same, until they shall be put under the Direction of the Officers of His Majesty's Customs.

That the Commissioners and other Officers of His Majesty's Customs do use their utmost Diligence and Care, that the Quarantine, before directed, be duly performed.

That the Commanders of His Majesty's Ships of War, as likewise the Commanders of His Majesty's Forts and Garrisons lying near the Sea Coasts, and all the Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Chief Magistrates, Constables, Headboroughs, Tything-Men, and all other Officers and Ministers of Justice be aiding and assisting to the said Officers of His Majesty's Customs, and to all others that shall be concerned in stopping all such Ships as aforesaid, and in bringing them to the Places appointed for the Performance of their Quarantine, and in due Performance thereof.

And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the said respective Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Stockholm, October 29. nation of a new Chancellor of Justice: 2dly, The Illegalities committed by some Officers of the Crown in the Elections of the Order of Peasants: 3dly, The Inhibition of giving away the Government of Westeras, and the Places of Fiscals of the Courts of Justice, which were vacant, till the States had finished their Deliberations upon those Articles: 4thly, The new Instruction for the Committee of Expedition; and, lastly, The second Article of the Instruction for the Secret Committee.

The Queen Dowager's Journey being fixed for next Monday, her Majesty will come to Town Tomorrow to take Leave of the Reigning Queen.

Dublin, November 5, 1771.

Yesterday being the Anniversary of the Birth of King William the Third of glorious Memory, in the Morning the Flag was displayed on Birmingham Tower; at Noon there was a splendid Appearance of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction, at the Castle, to compliment his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant; after which his Excellency, attended by the Nobility and Gentry, and escorted by a Squadron of Horse, went in Procession round the Statue of King William, the Regiments on Dublin Duty lined the Statue on each Side; and, after his Excellency's Return to the Castle, the Great Guns at the Salute Battery in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn up in College Green: In the Evening there was a Ball given by his Excellency for the Entertainment of the Ladies; and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.

Lottery-Office, Exchequer, November 13, 1771.

THE Managers and Directors of the present Lottery think proper to warn all Persons who might otherwise be drawn in to be Adventurers in any private Lotteries here or in Ireland, That by Acts of the 8th Year of His Majesty King George the First, and of the 12th and 26th Years of His late Majesty King George the Second, some or one of them, All and every Person and Persons who shall print, advertise, or publish Schemes or Proposals for advancing Sums of Money to be decided by the Chances of the Prizes of any publick Lottery or Lotteries established or allowed by Act of Parliament, or deliver out Tickets to the Persons advancing such Sums, to entitle them to a Share of the Money so advanced, according to such Scheme or Proposal, or publish any Scheme or Proposal of the like Nature and Kind, under any Denomination, Name, or Title whatsoever; and any Person who shall sell any Chance in the present State Lottery, or receive any Money whatsoever in Consideration of the Re-payment of any Sum or Sums of Money, in case any Ticket in the said Lottery shall prove fortunate; all and every such Persons, being convicted on the Oath or Oaths of one or more credible Witnesses or Witnesses, by two or more Justices of the Peace, will forfeit the several Sums of Five Hundred Pounds and Two Hundred Pounds, as in the said Acts is expressed, over and above all former Penalties; and all and every Person or Persons, who shall be Contributors to, or Adventurers in, any such Sales, Lotteries, Proposals, or Schemes as aforesaid, will be liable to pay the Sum of Fifty Pounds, and all other the Penalties by Act of Parliament inflicted: And the said Managers and Directors do hereby give Notice to all Persons whatsoever, that all Offenders against the said Acts will be prosecuted with the utmost Severity; and, for the Information of the Publick, they here insert two Clauses out of an

Act of Parliament passed in the 8th Year of His present Majesty, viz.

"And be it further enacted, by the Authority aforesaid, that no Person or Persons shall sell the the Chance or Chances of any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery, or any Share or Shares of any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery, for a Day or Part of a Day, or for a longer Time less than the whole Time of drawing the Lottery then to come, or shall receive any Money whatsoever in Consideration of the Re-payment of any Sum or Sums of Money, in Case any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery shall prove fortunate, or shall lay any Wager relating to the Time of such Ticket or Tickets being drawn, or whether such Ticket or Tickets be drawn fortunate or unfortunate; and all and every Person and Persons, who shall offend in any of the said Matters, shall forfeit and pay treble the Sum and Sums of Money which shall have been received by such Person or Persons contrary to the true Intent and Meaning of this Act, to be recovered by Action of Debt, Bill, Plaint or Information, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster; in which no Essoin, Protection, Privilege, or Wager of Law, or more than one Imparance shall be allowed; one Moiety whereof to be for the Use of His Majesty, His Heirs, or Successors, and the other Moiety to be paid to the Person or Persons who shall sue for the same; and every such Wager, Sale, or Contract, and every Agreement relating thereto, shall be, and is hereby declared null and void."

"And be it enacted, by the Authority aforesaid, that if any Person or Persons shall keep any Office or Offices, or shall print or publish any Scheme or Proposal for receiving any Sum or Sums of Money in Consideration of any Interest to be granted for the same, in any Ticket or Tickets in the said Lottery, whereof such Person or Persons shall not then be actually possessed, or in Consideration of any Sum or Sums of Money to be repaid, in Case any Ticket or Number of Tickets in the said Lottery, which shall not be in the actual Possession of such Person and Persons, shall prove fortunate or unfortunate; all and every such Person or Persons shall forfeit and pay the Sum of Five Hundred Pounds, to be recovered by Action of Debt, Bill, Plaint, or Information, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, in which no Essoin, Protection, Wager of Law, or more than one Imparance shall be allowed; one Moiety whereof to be for the Use of His Majesty, His Heirs, or Successors, and the other Moiety to be paid to the Person or Persons who shall sue for the same, and also shall suffer three Months Imprisonment without Bail or Mainprize."

Custom-House, London, November 15, 1771.

Whereas by an Act made in the 14th Year of the Reign of King Charles the Second, for preventing Frauds, and regulating Abuses in His Majesty's Customs, it is enacted,

That if any Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes shall be shipped or put on board, to be carried forth to the open Sea, from any one Port, Creek, or Member in this Kingdom, to be landed at any other Place of this Realm, without a Suffrance or Warrant first had and obtained from the Officers of His Majesty's Customs, all such Wares and Merchandizes shall be forfeited and lost; and that the Master of every Ship or Vessel that shall take or take in any such Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes, shall, before the Vessel be removed or carried out of the Lading-Port, take out a Cocquet or Cocquets, and become bound to His Majesty, with good Security, in the Value of the Goods, for the Delivery thereof in the Port or Place for which the same shall be entered, or in some other Port or Place within Great Britain, and to return a Certificate thereof in Six Months from the

Date of such Cocquet or Cocquets, to the Officers to whom such Security hath been given.

And, by another Act passed in the 14th Year of His present Majesty's Reign, to continue the Prohibition of the Exportation of Corn, Grain, Meal, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, and Starch, it is by the said Act enacted, that the said Act shall not extend to prohibit any Person or Persons to ship or put on board any of the Commodities aforesaid, to be carried Coastwise from any Port, Creek, or Member of Great Britain to any other Port, Creek, or Member of the same respectively, having such like Coast-Cocquet or Suffrance for that Purpose, and such or like Security being first given for the landing and discharging the same in some other Port, Member, or Creek of the said Kingdom, and returning a Certificate in Six Months, as is required by Law in Cases where Goods, which are liable to Duties on Exportation, are carried Coastwise from one Port of Great-Britain to another.

And whereas several Masters of Coasting Vessels have lately taken on board great Quantities of Corn and other Grain at some of the Out-Ports of this Kingdom, which have exceeded the Quantity for which any Suffrances have been granted, or any Security given, pursuant to the Direction of the Acts before-mentioned; which Practice thereby affords an easy Opportunity to export the said Corn, &c. to Foreign Parts, contrary to the Intent of the said last recited Act.

The Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, that no Person may pretend Ignorance in this Case, do hereby give Notice, that all Corn and other Goods which shall be shipped, to be brought Coastwise, without such Suffrance, and before such Security is given, will be seized and prosecuted according to Law.
