Stockholm, December 17.

LAST Saturday the States were assembled in Pleno, but the whole Day passed in dispatching Affairs of small Consequence. Before they separated, they took an unanimous Resolution, that the Last Plenum before the Holidays should be To-morrow; and the First after the Holidays, on the 8th of January. A great Number of the Members of the Diet are already gone out of Town.

The King will go into the Country on Friday for Fourteen Days, and his Majesty has invited several Gentlemen and Ladies of the First Distinction in Sweden, to the Number of about Forty, to pass the Holidays with him at Eckholmfund.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That John Perrin, of Rotherfield Grays in the County of Oxford, Blacksmith, went from Home on Friday the 9th of November last, to Henley upon Thames, where he staid some Hours, and was seen there between Nine and Ten in the Evening, but has not been since heard of; therefore there is great Reason to suspect that the said John Perrin has been murdered: If any Person will give Intelligence where the said John Perrin now resides, (if alive) he shall receive a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS, on Application to Mr. Newell, Town Clerk of Henley upon Thames: And, if it shall appear that the said John Perrin is murdered, His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in such Murder, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually committed the said Murder) who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices in the same, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
