*Naples, February 11.*

**H**IS Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester, who continues extremely well, intends to set out from hence on Sunday or Monday Se'nnight, in order to spend the last Week of the Carnival at Rome.

*Vienna, February 19.* On Sunday last his Imperial Majesty was pleased to honour Prince Charles of Lichtenstein with the Ensigns of the Order of the Golden Fleece.

*Madrid, February 21.* Last Week arrived here from Barcelona the Conde de Ricla, to take Possession of his Employment as Minister of the War Department.

*Bonn, March 2.* We are informed from Eyenem, a Village about two Miles Distance from Ober-Olm, that the Shock of an Earthquake had been felt there on the 9th of February, at Ten at Night, but we do not as yet hear of any Damage having been done by it. And from Ober-Olm we have received the following very extraordinary Relation of an Event which happened in that District, between the 10th and 14th of February, when a Vineyard, 500 Paces long, and from 75 to 100 broad, was removed from an Eminence into the Valley below, and by the Force of its Fall raised the adjoining Plain, with the Trees growing on it, in several Places, to the Height of twenty Feet; and that the Earth continued in Motion when the Letters came away. The Damage could not be at that Time ascertained; but there were at least 15 Acres of Vineyard ruined, each of which is computed to be worth 160 Florins. The Road which goes through the Vineyard is so filled up, that it will take above a Month to make it passable. The Ground where the Vineyard was is now entirely a Bed of Clay. This extraordinary Event is supposed to have been caused partly by the subterranean Waters, and partly by those which descend in great Quantities from the Mountain Klopberg; and probably the great Rains which have fallen for several Years past have contributed to it.
