Lisbon, March 7.

THEIR most Faithful Majesties and all the Royal Family are returned to this City from Salvaterra.

Berlin, March 21. The Queen of Sweden, accompanied by the Princess her Daughter, went to Potzdam the Beginning of this Week, as did also Prince Henry of Prussia and Prince Frederick of Brunswick. Yesterday the Dutchess of Brunswick went to that Place, and his Majesty entertained his Royal Guests at the New Palace of Sans Souci. They are to stay six Days, during which there will be Operas, Plays, and other Amusements. They will then all, except his Majesty, return to this City, where Preparations are making to receive them, suitable to their high Rank.

The Weather, which for this last Fortnight has been remarkably severe, is now very fine; and the Apprehensions of a third bad Year, which would inevitably have caused a Famine, are now, in a great Measure, at an End.
