

An Act to continue and render more effectual, an Act passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty, for repairing the Road from the North Queen's Ferry, through the Towns of Inverkeithing and Kinross, to the Town of Perth; and also the Road from the said Queen's Ferry, to the Towns of Dumfermline, Torryburn, and Culross; and also the Road from the said Queen's Ferry, through Inverkeithing, to Bruntisland and Kirkcaldie.

An Act for repairing and widening several Roads, leading through the County of Lanerk; and for building a Bridge over the River Clyde, at or near a Place called The Howford, in the said County.

An Act for repairing and widening several Roads, from Aldermaston, in the County of Berks, to Basingstoke, and from Aldermaston aforesaid to the Turnpike Road from Basingstoke to Andover, at or near Worting, and to the Turnpike Road leading to Winchester, at Popham Lane, in the County of Southampton.

And to Forty-three Private Bills.

**W**HEREAS His most Excellent Majesty George the Third, by the Grace of God, of Great-Britain, France and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, &c. by His Letters Patent, under the Great Seal of Great-Britain, bearing Date the 24th Day of October, 1761, constituted and appointed us, or any Three or more of us, amongst other Things, to take into our special Care the Direction and Government of all Things appertaining to the Out-Pensioners belonging to the said Royal Hospital.

And whereas His Majesty has been graciously pleased to signify to us, by Letter from His Secretary at War, bearing Date the 27th of March last, that it is His Royal Will and Pleasure, that the Out-Pensioners and Lettermen belonging to the said Royal Hospital, residing in the Province of Ulster in Ireland, shall appear personally before Major General Gisborne, at such Places, and at such Times, as shall be appointed by his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, &c.

In Pursuance, therefore, of the Power and Authority so granted to us as aforesaid, we do hereby direct, require, and command, all and every Out-Pensioner and Letterman, residing in the aforesaid Province of Ulster in Ireland, comprehending the following Counties, viz. Antrim, Armagh, Cavan, Donegal, Down, Fermanagh, Londonderry, Monaghan, and Tyrone, to appear personally before the said Major General Gisborne, at such Places, and at such Times, as shall be appointed by the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, and receive and obey such Directions, Orders, and Instructions, as may be given by the said Major General, upon Pain of being struck off the Out-Pension, in Case of Disobedience.

The Post-Boy carrying the Mail from Huntingdon to Chatteris was attacked and robbed about Ten o'Clock last Friday Night, between St. Ives and Somersham-Heath, of the Mail containing the Letters from hence of the 19th Instant, for Wisbich, Chatteris, and

Marsh; and also the Bye Letters from the North for Lynn, Wisbich, Chatteris, and Marsh.

The Person who committed this Robbery is described to be about Five Feet Six or Seven Inches high, wore a large Hat, slouched, a Great Coat which hung down to his Heels, and has a very strong, rough Voice.

Whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS, agreeably to an Advertisement from hence of the 27th of January, 1770, for apprehending Mail Robbers in general, over and above the Reward by Act of Parliament for apprehending Highwaymen. Or if any Person, whether an Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery whereby the Person who committed the same may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer will, upon Conviction of the Person who committed this Robbery, be entitled to the said Reward of FIFTY POUNDS, and will also receive His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
