present we find it to have been without any ground, nor can we as yet hear that any of the Munster or Lunenburg Troops are on their march. It would have been very well for the Confederates that the said report had been true, so that reinforcement would have come very opportunely to the Urique, of Orange, who we are told wants Infaintry to supply what he hath lost in the Siege of Maestricht, which we hear is raised; to the great trouble of the Inhabitants of the Country of Futiers, as well as this Diocess, who will now be called to an account for their Contributions. We are surprized to hear that Philipsburg holds out still, and may do so some longer, notwichstanding the Governor is not in any expectation of relief.

Nimeguen, Aug. 29. On Wednesday last Count Oxensterne, one of the Suedes Ambassadors for this Treaty, arrived here from Aernheim intognito; and having given orders for the fitting his House, returned again to Aernheim, where he will continue till it is ready. Yellerday Colonel Slangenburg was brought hither, being wounded before Maestricht; from whence we hear, that the 26 inft. Mareschal de Schomberg arrived with the French Army at Congres; that that afternoon a great affault was made by the Besiegers upon the Hornwork, but without fuccess; that thereupon a Councel of War was held; and according to the resolutions there taken, the Siege was raised the next morning, The People of this Province are particularly troubled hereat, because of the Contributions fet upon them by the Garison of Maestricht.

Hague, Sept. 1. You will doubtless have already heard of the raising the Siege of Maestricht; which the more surprizes us, for we had all along believed that the Confederates were strong enough to have gone on with the Siege, and with a separate Army to have covered it, but it appears otherwise; and that the great loss which was fullained during the Siege, had so weakned the Prince's Army, as wholly to break the measures that had been taken, and to oblige them to abandon an Enterprise in which they were advanced fo far. We have Letters this day of the 30 past from Bruffels, and of the 31 from Antweep, they onely fay, That the Confederate Army was retired towards Diest, without that any action had passed between them and the Enemy fince the quitting the fiege.
