**T**HE States were only once assembled in Pleno last Week; and nothing of Consequence was transacted; except that the House of Nobles took into Consideration the Petition of Count Taube, Governor of the Town of Gothembourg, for Leave to sell his Place. After a short Debate the House resolved, that he should enjoy the Privilege of other Military Governors, to sell their Places in the Manner directed by the Laws.

It is reported that Senator Duben, who is in the Country, and has not been at Stockholm this Winter, was Yesterday unanimously made President of the Chancery, by the Secret Committee.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in Writing and Dropping the said threatening Letter, is hereby pleased to promise His most Gracious Pardon to any of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
