You may be assured of my representing you to His Majesty with Truth, and of my doing Justice to the Loyalty and Affection of His faithful Subjects of this Kingdom.

Dublin Castle, June 2.

This Day his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, with the usual Solemnity, and, the Commons being sent for, gave the Royal Assent to the following Bills:

An Act for continuing two several Acts, one passed in the Twenty-seventh Year of his late Majesty King George the Second, and the other in the Third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for making the River Lagan navigable, and opening a Communication by Water between Loughneab and the Town of Belfast; and for enabling the Commissioners therein named to raise Money by Assignment of said Duties, for the more effectual carrying on the said Work.

An Act for the Relief of poor Infants who are or shall be deserted by their Parents.

An Act for preventing the spreading of Fires, and for appointing of Watches in Cities and Towns Corporate.

An Act for the remitting of Prisoners with their Indictments by the Justices of His Majesty's Court of King's Bench, to the Places where the Crimes were committed.

An Act to prevent burying dead Bodies in Churches.

An Act to enable the Corporation for promoting and carrying on an Inland Navigation in this Kingdom, to erect and make a Lock, adjoining to the Long Dock of the Old Kay, in the City of Limerick.

An Act for explaining and amending an Act, made in the Eighth Year of the Reign of her late Majesty Queen Anne, intitled, An Act for explaining and amending an Act, intitled, an Act to prevent the further Growth of Popery, so far only as the same makes a Provision for the Maintenance of Popish Priests converted to the Protestant Religion.

An Act for the Relief of several Insolvent Debtors, named in the annexed Schedules.

An Act for the making of narrow Roads through the mountainous unimproved Parts of this Kingdom.

An Act for amending an Act for the better Regulation of Partnerships, to encourage the Trade and Manufacture of this Kingdom.

*An Act to encourage the reclaiming of unprofitable Bogs.*

*An Act for preventing the Erecting of Lime Kilns in the City of Dublin, or the Suburbs thereof.*

*An Act for the better paving, cleansing, lighting, altering, and improving the New Street called Sackville-Street, and the Mall, in the City of Dublin, and the Lanes and Avenues leading into the same; as also the Street called Marlborough-Street, running parallel thereto on the East Side, with the Lanes and Avenues leading into the same.*

*An Act for badging such Poor as shall be found unable to support themselves by Labour, and otherwise providing for them, and for restraining such as shall be found able to support themselves by Labour or Industry, from Begging.*

*An Act for erecting Parochial Chapels of Ease in Parishes of large Extent, and making such Chapels, and those that are already erected, Perpetual Cures; and for making a proper Provision for the Maintenance of Perpetual Curates to officiate in the same; and also, in like Manner, for making Appropriate Parishes Perpetual Cures.*

*An Act for regulating the Journeymen Taylors and Journeymen Shipwrights of the City of Dublin and the Liberties thereof, and of the County of Dublin.*

*An Act for enabling certain Persons to carry on and compleat the Grand Canal.*

*An Act for establishing an Infirmary in the South Suburbs of the City of Corke, and to vest an House and Front Lot of Ground in the South Suburbs of said City, (or any other House or Grounds that may be taken) in certain Trustees for ever; and to give such Trustees such Power as may be necessary to promote and execute the Purposes of an Infirmary in the South Suburbs of the City of Cork.*

*An Act for allowing further Time to Persons in Offices or Employments to qualify themselves, pursuant to an Act, intituled, An Act to prevent the further Growth of Popery.*

*An Act for reviving and continuing several Temporary Statutes that have lately expired, and for continuing others that are near expiring.*

*An Act for rendering more effectual the several Laws for the better enabling the Clergy, having Cure of Souls, to reside upon their Benefices, and to build on their respective Glebe Lands, and to prevent Dilapidations, and for the Encouragement of Protestant Schools within this Kingdom of Ireland.*

*An Act for the further preventing Delays of Justice by Reason of Privilege of Parliament.*

*An Act to empower Agmondisham Vesey, Esq; to inclose that Part of the old Road, which lies on the West Side of the little River called the Griffin, upon laying out such other Road as in this Act is mentioned.*

*An Act for better regulating the Foundling-Hospital and Work-house in the City of Dublin, and increasing the Fund for the Support thereof; also, for making a Provision for appointing a Locum Tenens in Case of the Death or Absence of the Lord Mayor, or the President of the Court of Conscience.*

And to Six Private Bills.

And then his Excellency was pleased to make a Speech, to both Houses of Parliament, which was printed in the last Gazette.

Stockholm, May 26. The States have been assembled in Pleno every Day since Tuesday last, except Sunday,

In the Plenum of Wednesday, the Electors were ordered to make three Presentations to fill up the Vacancies in the Senate, Messieurs Lagerbielke, Gyllenstierna, and Hermelin having declined to resume their Places.

Accordingly the following Presentations were made, after a long Debate amongst the Electors, and presented the next Day for the Approbation of the Plena; viz.

First, President Count Cronstedt; Baron Von Hopken, President at Wismar; Baron Melchior Falkenberg. Second, Major General Baron Cron-

stedt; Colonel Corfitz Beckfries; Lieutenant Colonel Peter Schonstrom. Third, Baron Ehrencrona, Marshal of the Court; Mr. Hagelberg, Counsellor of the Parliament of Stockholm; Baron Kurck, Auditor General.

The first of these Presentations having been laid upon the Table in the House of Nobles, on account of a Doubt, which arose there, If Baron Hopken was a Swedish Nobleman born in Sweden; and Messrs. Hagelberg, Beckfries, and Schonstrom, having declined, the Electors met again, and put in Governor Nackrey in the Place of Mr. Hagelberg, Colonel Baron Ulric Sparre in the Place of Mr. Beckfries, and Lieutenant Colonel Baron Charles Otto Wrangel in the Place of Mr. Schonstrom; but these two new Presentations were also laid upon the Table.

The Plena being met again next Day, Major General Baron Cronstedt declined; upon which the Electors put Colonel Baron Bror Cederstrom in the General's Place. But this Presentation was laid upon the Table in the House of Nobles, on account of some Objections against Baron Wrangel; on the other Hand, the Doubt about Baron Hopken was cleared up, and the Presentation, upon which he stood, approved by the House of Nobles; but the Order of Burghers having notified, that they had laid this Presentation on the Table, on account of the same Doubt about Baron Hopken, the Nobility stopped the second Presentation also, by laying it on the Table; so that nothing more could be done that Day.

In the fourth Plenum, which was last Saturday, the Nobility approved the Presentation upon which Baron Wrangel was placed, but Governor Nackrey having declined, and Baron Hopken being excluded by the Orders of the Clergy and Burghers, the Electors were ordered to compleat the Presentations; and in the mean Time it was proposed in the House of Nobles, to send up to the King the second Presentation, which was ready, His Majesty being come to Town for that Purpose; but after some Debate, this Question was laid upon the Table, and a Message dispatched, to acquaint His Majesty, that no Presentation could be made to him that Day.

A strong and warm Debate arose also among the Electors, who were assembled till Nine o'Clock at Night, when the Numbers of the two Lower Orders put Baron Germund Charles Cederhielm in the Place of Mr. Nackrey, and President Silverkiold in the Place of Baron Hopken, to which the Members of the Nobility would not agree: However, the Electors being met again Yesterday Morning, the Nobles thought proper then to agree with the two other Orders; and the Presentation, being approved by the Plena, were sent up to His Majesty, who was pleased to nominate Baron Falckenberg upon the First, Baron Ehrencrona upon the Second, and Colonel Baron Sparre upon the Third Presentation; after which His Majesty was also pleased to nominate Senator Falckenberg to be Counsellor of the Chancery.

The Three Presentations, as they stood after all the Amendments, were as follows: First, President Count Cronstedt; President Silverkiold; Baron Falckenberg. Second, Baron Ehrencrona, Marshal of the Court; Baron Kurck, Auditor-General; Baron Germund Cederhielm. Third, Baron Bror Cederstrom; Colonel Sparre; Baron Charles Otto Wrangel.

The Senate being now compleated, the following is a List of the Senators; viz.

Count Lieven, Marshal of the Court; Count Hoorn; Count Kalling; Count Wallwyk; Baron Reuterholm; Baron Funck; Baron Ribbing; Baron Duben, President of the Chancery; Count Schwerin; Count Sinclair; Baron Falckengren; Baron Ridderstolpe; Baron Wrangel; Mr. Arnell; Baron Ehrencrona; Baron Sparre; Baron Falckenberg, Counsellor of the Chancery.

The King has been pleased to appoint Senator Lieven to be Grand Marshal of the Court, in the Room of Count Bielke, and Senator Sinclair to execute

cute the Office at the Coronation, in the Absence of Senator Lieven.

*Berlin, May 30.* His Prussian Majesty arrived here from Charlottenburg on Wednesday the 20th, and the Three following Days reviewed the Garrison of this Place, and the Regiments in the Neighbourhood, the Whole making a Body of near Twenty-four Thousand Foot, and Four Thousand Horse. Saturday his Majesty returned to Potsdam; and on Sunday went to Magdebourg, to review the Troops in that District. Early this Morning, his Majesty set out for Pomerania; from whence he intends to go to Marienwerder: The Prince of Prussia accompanies the King in these Journeys.
