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An Account of the Coronation of Gustavus the Third, King of Sweden, on the 29th Day of May, 1772.

THE Ceremony began by the Ringing of Bells in all the Churches of Stockholm, at Eight o'Clock in the Morning, a Lane being first formed by the Horse and Foot Guards, by the Regiment of Upland, and by several Companies of Burghers, both Horse and Foot.

Immediately upon this, the Senators assembled in the Council Chamber, in their Senatorial Habits; and those who were of the Order of Seraphim wore their Collars over their Mantles; the other Knights of this Order, who were not Senators, wore the Collar and the Mantle of the Order.

At the same Time the States of the Kingdom came in Procession to the Royal Palace, in the following Order, viz. First, the Order of Peasants; next, the Burghers; and then the Clergy, with their respective Speakers at their Head; and lastly the Land-Marshal, at the Head of the Order of Nobles, having before him two Heralds as usual.

When all Things were ready, the King's Marshal of the Court, Baron Ralamb, gave Notice of it to the Grand Marshal of the Court, who announced it to the King; upon which the Procession began in the following Manner, viz.

1. Two Companies of the Regiment of Horse Guards, preceded by a Kettle-Drummer and four Trumpeters.
2. Two Heralds of the Court on Foot.
3. The Marshal Baron Ralamb, carrying the Marshal's Staff in his Hand, and after him Half the Officers of the Court, and the Extra Capita three a-breast, the other Half being left for the Queen's Procession; with them marched the Deputies and Council from Pomerania and Wismar: These all on Foot.
4. The States of the Kingdom came next, also on Foot; viz. The Order of Peasants, with their Speaker Joseph Hansson; the Order of Burghers, with their Speaker Burgomaster Sebaldt; the Clergy, with their Speaker Bishop Forfenius: Then came the Land-Marshal Baron Gabriel Axel Leyon Hufwud, preceded by Two Heralds, and followed by the Order of Nobles.
5. A Kettle Drummer, and Six Trumpeters of the Court, on Horseback.
6. Field Marshal Count Axel Fersen, who officiated for the Day in the Office of Grand Master of the Horse of the Kingdom, on Horseback, attended by one of the King's Footmen, and one of the King's Grooms.
7. Four Heralds on Horseback.
8. Senator Count Sinclair on Horseback, who officiated in the Office of Grand Marshal of the Court, in the Absence of Count Lieven, with the Grand Marshal's Staff in his Hand.
9. The Senator and President of the Chancery, Baron von Duben, on Horseback, carrying the Royal Mantle.

10. Senator Count von Walwyth, on Horseback, carrying the Key.

11. Senator Baron Funk, on Horseback, carrying the Globe

12. Senator Baron Reuterholm; on Horseback, carrying the Sceptre.

13. Senator Count Kalling, on Horseback, carrying the Sword.

14. Senator Count Horn, on Horseback, carrying the Royal Crown.

15. The King, in his Robes as Prince Royal, with the Prince's Coronet on his Head, mounted on a very fine white Horse, which was a Present to his Majesty from the King of Denmark: When his Majesty mounted; his Horse was held by Count Axel Fersen, in Quality of Grand Master of the Horse of the Kingdom, and his Stirrup by Mr. Wattrang. his Majesty's First Equerry, who walked on the Right Side of his Majesty during the whole Procession, as Count Charles Fersen, the Grand Huntsman, did on the Left.

His Majesty rode under a Canopy borne by the Presidents Hopken, -Stromfelt, Lilgenberg, and Cronstedt, by Baron Rudbeck, Grand Governor of the City of Stockholm, the two Lieutenant Generals Stackelberg, and Spens, and Baron Bunge, Chancellor of the Court: These were assisted by Eight Captains. On each Side of the Canopy walked the Commanding Officers of the Drabants, and Guards, and the King's Aides de Camp; as also Twelve Extra Capita, led by two Colonels on Foot. The King's Train was borne by the Grand Chamberlain, Baron Frederic Ridderstolpe, on Foot, supported by two Chamberlains.

The Equerry followed immediately his Majesty, on Foot, carrying the Cover of the Royal Saddle.

16. Then followed, on Foot, the Pages of the Back Stairs, with Half the other Pages, and Twenty-four Drabants with their Officers

17. Sixteen of the King's Footmen, in rich Liveries, on Foot.

18. Senator Baron Ribbing, on Horseback, carrying the Standard of the Kingdom.

19. His Royal Highness Prince Charles, on Horseback, in his Robes as Prince, and with his Coronet on his Head.

On the Right Side of his Horse walked two of his Aides de Camp, and the Corporal and Vice-Corporal of the Drabants, and on the Left a Lieutenant of the Horse Guards, with his Royal Highness's two other Aides de Camp, followed by his Pages, Running Footmen, and Lacqueys.

20. Prince Frederick Adolphus, on Horseback, in his Robes, with his Coronet on his Head, attended by his four Aides de Camp, by a Vice-Corporal of the Drabants, and a Lieutenant of the Foot-Guards, all on Foot, and followed by his Pages, and Livery-Servants.

The Trains of Prince Charles, and Prince Frederick, were borne by their Chamberlains.

21. Immediately after their Royal Highnesses followed, on Horseback, the two Senators, who had no particular Office in the Ceremony, viz Baron Sparre, and Baron Falkenberg.
22. The Deputies of the Army, called the Krigs Befal, on Foot.
23. Then came the Procession of the QUEEN, preceded by two Kettle-Drummers, and four Trumpeters, on Horseback.
24. Two Heralds, on Foot.
25. Baron Manderstrom, Marshal of the Court, on Foot, leading the remaining Half of the Extra Capita, and Officers of the Court, with the Marshal's Staff in his Hand.
26. A Kettle Drummer, and Six Trumpeters of the Court, on Horseback.
27. The Ladies of her Majesty's Court, in four Coaches, each drawn by Six Horses.
28. Her Majesty's First Lady of the Bed-Chamber, the Countess Hjarne, alone in a Coach drawn by Six Horses, preceded by Two of the King's Grooms on Horseback.
29. Lieutenant General Baron Stierneld, on Horseback, officiating as Grand Master of the Horse, having on his Right Hand one of His Majesty's Footmen, and on his Left a Groom of the Royal Stables.
30. Two Heralds on Horseback.
31. Senator Baron Ehrenscrona, in a Coach drawn by Six Horses, officiating as her Majesty's Grand Marshal, with the Grand Marshal's Staff in his Hand.
32. Senators Counts Gyllenstierna, and Beckfries, in their Coaches drawn by Six Horses, being appointed to conduct her Majesty into the Church.
33. Senators, all in their Coaches, carrying the Queen's Regalia, viz. Senator Arnell, carrying the Mantle; Senator Baron Wrangel, carrying the Globe; Senator Baron Charles Ridderstolpe, carrying the Sceptre; and Senator Baron Christopher Falkengren, carrying the Crown.
34. The Queen, in the Coronation Coach, magnificently adorned, and drawn by Eight most beautiful dappled Danish Horses; the Horses were led by Eight Captains on Foot: On the Sides of her Majesty's Coach walked the Lieutenant Colonels of the Horse, Foot, and Gragoon Guards, and other Lieutenant Colonels and Majors, the Grand Chamberlain, Count Gyllenstolpe, with two Chamberlains in waiting, Baron Uggla and Count Hamilton, also Twelve young Nobles Extra Capita, conducted by Two Colonels, Count Poffe and Baron Duvall.
35. Her Majesty's Pages on Foot.
36. Sixteen Drabants conducted by their Officers, and after them Twelve of her Majesty's Footmen, Six on each Side; all on Foot.
37. The Coach of the Princess Sophia Albertina, empty, drawn by Six Horses.
38. Two of the Queen's Grooms on Horseback.
39. Senators Ladies, in their own Coaches drawn by Six Horses, attended by their own Footmen.
40. The rest of the Court Ladies in Court-Coaches with Six Horses, and their own Footmen on each Side.
- The Procession was closed by two Companies of the Regiment of Horse Guards.
- They went into the Church in the same Order in which they arrived, the Queen being conducted by two Senators, under a Canopy borne by Eight Presidents, assisted by Eight Captains, in the same Manner as the King's Canopy was borne.
- On the Procession's entering the Church, the Musick began, and continued playing 'till all were placed.

The King was received by the Archbishop in his Cope, having the Anointing Horn in his Hand, and being attended by the other Bishops in their Copes.

Upon his Majesty's entering the Church, the Bishop of Lindkioping pronounced the Words, *Blessed be he, who cometh in the Name of the Lord*; whereupon the Bishop of Scara read a Prayer.

The King placed himself on his Throne.

The Archbishop, with Half of the Bishops, went into the Choir, the Archbishop before the Altar, and the Bishops on the Sides; while the Bishop of Lindkioping, and the other Half of the Bishops, received the Queen at the Church Door.

Her Majesty being entered, the Bishop of Lindkioping pronounced the Words, *Blessed be she, who cometh in the Name of the Lord*; after which the next eldest Bishop read a Prayer.

Her Majesty being seated on the Throne prepared for her, all the rest of the Bishops went into the Choir.

A Chair of Silver was placed before the Altar, and before it a Stool, on which the Bible was laid.

The Senators, who carried the Regalia, placed themselves close by the Thrones.

The Senator, who carried the Standard of the Kingdom, stood on the Right Hand of the King, and the Princes on his Majesty's Left Hand.

The other Senators were seated in the Choir upon Chairs with red Covers, and their Ladies opposite to them.

When first the Musick ceased, Cushions were placed before their Majesties, who kneeled on them to say their Prayers; which being over, the Senators, who carried the Regalia, went up and laid them upon the Altar.

When this was done the Service began, and, after singing a Psalm, the Bishop of Lindkioping preached a Sermon, taking his Text from the 9th Verse of the First Chapter of Joshua; this was succeeded by chaunting the Creed and the Litany; and then the Coronation Musick began again, during which the two Princes conducted the King from his Throne to the Altar.

His Majesty being seated in the Silver Chair, and surrounded by all the Senators, and the Standard of the Kingdom being placed behind the Chair,

The Grand Chamberlain, assisted by the other Chamberlains, took off the Mantle of Prince Royal, which the King wore, and it was laid upon the Altar; at the same time the Archbishop, and the President of the Chancery, took the Royal Mantle from the Altar, and put it upon the King's Shoulders; upon which his Majesty kneeled before the Stool on which the Bible was laid: The Musick ceased, and the Bible was opened by the Archbishop, at the First Chapter of Joshua.

The King then, laying three Fingers on the Bible, took his Coronation Oath, which was read by the President of the Chancery, Baron von Duben, and delivered to him by the Chancellor of the Court, Baron Bunge: This ended, the Archbishop took the Anointing Horn, and, the King kneeling, he anointed his Majesty's Forehead, Breast, Temples, and both Hands, repeating at the same Time the Prayer usual on this Occasion.

The Anointing being finished, the King rose, and seated himself in the Chair: Then the Senator Count Horn assisted the Archbishop to take the Royal Crown from the Altar, and to place it on the King's Head, the Archbishop reading the Form of Prayer for this Ceremony.

After which the Senator Baron Reuterholm took the Sceptre from the Altar, which he, together with the Archbishop, delivered to the King, and another Prayer was read.

All the other Regalia were brought to his Majesty in the same Manner.

The Ceremony of crowning the King being finished, the Senator Grand Marshal of the Court gave Notice to the Heralds, appointed for that Purpose, to proclaim, That Gustavus the Third was now crowned King of Sweden and Gothland, with the Provinces thereunto belonging: He and No Other.

In the mean Time the Senator and Grand Court-Marshal gave the Signal for the Firing to begin; upon which the Guns were fired from the Artillery and Admiralty, 112 Cannons from each; after which all the small Arms of the Regiments, and of the Burghers of Stockholm, were also fired.

A Second Firing followed immediately in the same Order, and then the Heralds proclaimed, *Long live King Gustavus!* The Organs and Musick began, and a Psalm of Thanksgiving was sung by the Bishop of Wexio. Afterwards the Bishop of Abo chaunted a Prayer at the Altar, with the Blessing, and then the Musick began again.

Immediately after the Blessing the King left the Chair, and went to his Throne, clothed in the Coronation Mantle, with the Crown on his Head, the Sceptre in his Right Hand, and the Globe in his Left.

The King being seated on the Throne, the Senators, who had carried the Regalia of the Kingdom, placed themselves before his Majesty.

The Princes then went to conduct the Queen, and her Majesty was placed in the Silver Chair.

The Princes, having conducted her Majesty to the Coronation Chair, and assisted her to kneel, and to rise after the Anointing, returned to their Chairs.

The Senators, who had accompanied the Queen in the Procession, surrounded her Majesty, and the Standard of the Kingdom, borne by the Baron Ribbing, was still behind the Chair.

Senator Arnell, with the Archbishop, took the Queen's Royal Mantle from the Altar, and put it upon her Majesty's Shoulders, in which they were assisted by the Ladies of her Majesty's Bed Chamber: After which her Majesty, kneeling down before the Bible, was anointed on the Forehead and Hands, a Prayer being read by the Archbishop as before. The Queen being again placed in the Chair, the Archbishop, assisted by Senator Falkengren, took the Crown from the Altar, and placed it on her Majesty's Head, repeating a Prayer as before.

All the other Regalia were brought in the same Manner to the Queen, as they had been before to the King; after which the Senator Ehrensrona directed the Heralds to proclaim, That Sophia Magdalena was crowned Queen of Sweden and Gothland: She and No Other.

The same Senator, as executing the Office of Grand Marshal for the Day, ordered the Signal to be given for the Firing for the Queen, which was performed with Ninety Cannons of the Artillery, and the same Number of the Admiralty; which was followed by the small Arms, as before.

A second Firing followed immediately in the same Order; and then the Heralds proclaimed, *Long live Queen Sophia Magdalena!*

Then the Bishop of Gottenburg read a Form of Prayer for the Occasion, and having given the Blessing, the Musick began again; during which her Majesty returned to her Throne.

As soon as the Queen was seated on her Throne, his Majesty returned to the Silver Chair, which was turned towards the Congregation, and then a Herald summoned the two Princes of Sweden to come forth, and take their Oath to his Majesty; upon which their Royal Highnesses left their Places, and, kneeling before his Majesty, took their Oath, which was read by the President of the Chancery.

When the Princes were returned to their Chairs, the President of the Chancery first, and the other Senators afterwards, were also summoned by the Heralds, and took their Oath in like Manner, kissing his Majesty's Hand before they returned to their Places.

This being done, his Majesty returned to his Throne as before, and the Princes went and saluted the Queen on her Cheek; after which the Senators kissed her Hand. A Psalm of Thanksgiving was sung, and, during the Musick, which succeeded it, the Procession began to move out of the Church in the same Order in which it had entered.

As soon as they were returned to the Palace, the King's Rent-Master, accompanied by Twelve of the Horse-Guards, threw out Money to the Populace, and, when the Coaches and Horses were gone Home, the Firing began again, first with 222 Cannons, and then with 180.

Several Hogheads of Wine, and an Ox roasted whole, were at the same Time distributed among the Populace.

About Nine o'Clock their Majesties supped in Publick, in the Great Hall of the Kingdom, which was richly ornamented, and magnificently illuminated. There were two Tables, one for their Majesties, the other for the Princes: Senator Count Horn presented the Water to the King, and Senator Sparre the Napkin, to wash his Hands.

The Senators Counts Gyllentjern and Beckfries performed the same Offices to the Queen.

Their Majesties sat at Table with their Crowns on their Heads, and the Royal Mantle on their Shoulders.

The Senator Count Beckfries performed the Office of Carver, and the Dishes were brought to the Table by Colonels.

When Supper was over, and the Ceremony of Washing repeated, the Senators Reuterholm and Fünk delivered the Sceptres and Globes again to their Majesties, who went out of the Hall in Procession, as they had come into it.

The Musick began as soon as their Majesties appeared in the Hall, and continued playing all the Time their Majesties remained there.

After the Royal Supper was ended, Two Tables were served for the Senators, and their Ladies, and one for the Foreign Ministers, at which Baron Duben did the Honours as President of the Chancery, and was assisted by Senator Falkenberg, Counsellor of the Chancery, and his Lady, and also by Baron Bunge, Chancellor of the Court.

The Deputies of the States were at the same Time entertained in different Apartments of the Palace.

On Sunday Te Deum was sung in the King's Chapel, and in the Evening there was a Court.

On Monday June 1. the Grand Ceremony was performed, of the States taking the Oath of Allegiance to the King, in a great Amphitheatre built for that Purpose in one of the Courts of the Palace, which was so well contrived, as to afford one of the finest Sights imaginable.

The same Evening there was a Ball in the great Hall of the Kingdom.

Stockholm, June 5. The King of Sweden has, on the Occasion of his Coronation, instituted a new Order, called the Order of Vasa. There are three Classes; Four Great Crosses, who are to wear a watered Green Ribbon, from the Right Shoulder to the Left, with an Oval Ornament hanging to it, in which is a Wheat-Sheaf; and the Words inscribed on the Oval are, *Gustavus the 3d Institutor, 1772.* They are also to wear a Silver Star with Eight Points; Twelve Commanders, who are to wear the same Ribbon, without the Star; Fifty Knights, who

who are to wear it about the Neck, as the Golden Fleece is worn.

This Order is intended to be conferred for the Encouragement of Arts, Sciences, and Agriculture, not for Civil or Military Services.

Three of the Great Crosses are named, but not the others.

Baron Rozir, who was Chancellor of Justice since the last Dyet, is made President of the Court of Justice, or Parliament, of Stockholm, in the Room Mr. Friedenstierna, lately deceased.

His Majesty has also made Mr. Berch, the Counsellor of the Chancery, a Commander of the Order of the North Star, and has created above an Hundred Knights of the Order of the Sword.

In the London Gazette of June 6, 1772, for Ensign Weld, *superseded*, read Ensign Weld, *who does not accept*.

St. James's, June 20, 1772.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That by an Act of Parliament made in the Seventh Year of His Majesty's Reign, for dividing of the Haute Huntre, Eight Hundred, or Holland Fen, and certain other commonable Places adjoining thereto, in the Parts of Holland in the County of Lincoln, Commissioners were empowered to divide the said Fen amongst the several Townships, Places, and Persons, which had Right of Common and other Interest therein, who did divide the same accordingly; but that divers malicious and evil-minded Persons, in order to obstruct and hinder the Execution of the said Act, have, at several different Times, shot Balls into several Dwelling-houses with an Intent to commit Murder, particularly on the 21st Day of November, in the Year 1770, between Eight and Nine in the Evening, some Person or Persons unknown maliciously shot in at the Window of the Dwelling-house of John Woods of Swineshead, Farmer, and wounded the said John Woods, then sitting by his Fireside, under the Left Ear, and upon the Throat; of which Wounds the said John Woods instantly died: And likewise on the 14th of December, in the same Year, Mr. Thomas Wilks, of Brothertoft, was dangerously wounded in his left Cheek, as he was sitting by his Fireside; and have also killed, wounded, poisoned, and destroyed many Horses, Beasts, and Sheep, and set Fire to several Stacks of Hay and Corn; His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in such Felonies, is hereby pleased to promise His most Gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Persons who actually fired the Guns into the Windows of John Woods, and Thomas Wilks, beforementioned) who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
