

21. Immediately after their Royal Highnesses followed, on Horseback, the two Senators, who had no particular Office in the Ceremony, viz Baron Sparre, and Baron Falkenberg.

22. The Deputies of the Army, called the Krigs Befal, on Foot.

23. Then came the Procession of the QUEEN, preceded by two Kettle-Drummers, and four Trumpeters, on Horseback.

24. Two Heralds, on Foot.

25. Baron Manderstrom, Marshal of the Court, on Foot, leading the remaining Half of the Extra Capita, and Officers of the Court, with the Marshal's Staff in his Hand.

26. A Kettle Drummer, and Six Trumpeters of the Court, on Horseback.

27. The Ladies of her Majesty's Court, in four Coaches, each drawn by Six Horses.

28. Her Majesty's First Lady of the Bed-Chamber, the Countess Hjarne, alone in a Coach drawn by Six Horses, preceded by Two of the King's Grooms on Horseback.

29. Lieutenant General Baron Stierneld, on Horseback, officiating as Grand Master of the Horse, having on his Right Hand one of His Majesty's Footmen, and on his Left a Groom of the Royal Stables.

30. Two Heralds on Horseback.

31. Senator Baron Ehrenscrona, in a Coach drawn by Six Horses, officiating as her Majesty's Grand Marshal, with the Grand Marshal's Staff in his Hand.

32. Senators Counts Gyllenstierna, and Beckfries, in their Coaches drawn by Six Horses, being appointed to conduct her Majesty into the Church.

33. Senators, all in their Coaches, carrying the Queen's Regalia, viz. Senator Arnell, carrying the Mantle; Senator Baron Wrangel, carrying the Globe; Senator Baron Charles Ridderstolpe, carrying the Sceptre; and Senator Baron Christopher Falkengren, carrying the Crown.

34. The Queen, in the Coronation Coach, magnificently adorned, and drawn by Eight most beautiful dappled Danish Horses; the Horses were led by Eight Captains on Foot: On the Sides of her Majesty's Coach walked the Lieutenant Colonels of the Horse, Foot, and Gragoon Guards, and other Lieutenant Colonels and Majors, the Grand Chamberlain, Count Gyllenstolpe, with two Chamberlains in waiting, Baron Uggla and Count Hamilton, also Twelve young Nobles Extra Capita, conducted by Two Colonels, Count Poffe and Baron Duvall.

35. Her Majesty's Pages on Foot.

36. Sixteen Drabants conducted by their Officers, and after them Twelve of her Majesty's Footmen, Six on each Side; all on Foot.

37. The Coach of the Princess Sophia Albertina, empty, drawn by Six Horses.

38. Two of the Queen's Grooms on Horseback.

39. Senators Ladies, in their own Coaches drawn by Six Horses, attended by their own Footmen.

40. The rest of the Court Ladies in Court-Coaches with Six Horses, and their own Footmen on each Side.

The Procession was closed by two Companies of the Regiment of Horse Guards.

They went into the Church in the same Order in which they arrived, the Queen being conducted by two Senators, under a Canopy borne by Eight Presidents, assisted by Eight Captains, in the same Manner as the King's Canopy was borne.

On the Procession's entering the Church, the Musick began, and continued playing 'till all were placed.

The King was received by the Archbishop in his Cope, having the Anointing Horn in his Hand, and being attended by the other Bishops in their Copes.

Upon his Majesty's entering the Church, the Bishop of Lindkioping pronounced the Words, *Blessed be he, who cometh in the Name of the Lord*; whereupon the Bishop of Scara read a Prayer.

The King placed himself on his Throne.

The Archbishop, with Half of the Bishops, went into the Choir, the Archbishop before the Altar, and the Bishops on the Sides; while the Bishop of Lindkioping, and the other Half of the Bishops, received the Queen at the Church Door.

Her Majesty being entered, the Bishop of Lindkioping pronounced the Words, *Blessed be she, who cometh in the Name of the Lord*; after which the next eldest Bishop read a Prayer.

Her Majesty being seated on the Throne prepared for her, all the rest of the Bishops went into the Choir.

A Chair of Silver was placed before the Altar, and before it a Stool, on which the Bible was laid.

The Senators, who carried the Regalia, placed themselves close by the Thrones.

The Senator, who carried the Standard of the Kingdom, stood on the Right Hand of the King, and the Princes on his Majesty's Left Hand.

The other Senators were seated in the Choir upon Chairs with red Covers, and their Ladies opposite to them.

When first the Musick ceased, Cushions were placed before their Majesties, who kneeled on them to say their Prayers; which being over, the Senators, who carried the Regalia, went up and laid them upon the Altar.

When this was done the Service began, and, after singing a Psalm, the Bishop of Lindkioping preached a Sermon, taking his Text from the 9th Verse of the First Chapter of Joshua; this was succeeded by chaunting the Creed and the Litany; and then the Coronation Musick began again, during which the two Princes conducted the King from his Throne to the Altar.

His Majesty being seated in the Silver Chair, and surrounded by all the Senators, and the Standard of the Kingdom being placed behind the Chair,

The Grand Chamberlain, assisted by the other Chamberlains, took off the Mantle of Prince Royal, which the King wore, and it was laid upon the Altar; at the same time the Archbishop, and the President of the Chancery, took the Royal Mantle from the Altar, and put it upon the King's Shoulders; upon which his Majesty kneeled before the Stool on which the Bible was laid: The Musick ceased, and the Bible was opened by the Archbishop, at the First Chapter of Joshua.

The King then, laying three Fingers on the Bible, took his Coronation Oath, which was read by the President of the Chancery, Baron von Duben, and delivered to him by the Chancellor of the Court, Baron Bunge: This ended, the Archbishop took the Anointing Horn, and, the King kneeling, he anointed his Majesty's Forehead, Breast, Temples, and both Hands, repeating at the same Time the Prayer usual on this Occasion.

The Anointing being finished, the King rose, and seated himself in the Chair: Then the Senator Count Horn assisted the Archbishop to take the Royal Crown from the Altar, and to place it on the King's Head, the Archbishop reading the Form of Prayer for this Ceremony.

After which the Senator Baron Reuterholm took the Sceptre from the Altar, which he, together with the Archbishop, delivered to the King, and another Prayer was read.
