Stockholm, June 16.

THE East-India Company has ordered the Cargo of the Ship, which arrived the 31st of May at Gottenburg, from Canton, to be sold by Auction on the 17th of August next.

Yesterday the King knighted all those Gentlemen, upon whom he had bestowed his Orders of the Sword, and of the North Star, on Occasion of the Coronation.

Lieutenant-General Count Spens is appointed to carry the late King's Order of the Black-Eagle to Berlin, and Major-General Baron Horn to carry his late Majesty's Order of the Elephant to Copenhagen.

A few Days ago died Major General Wallensterna, by which the Post of Captain of the Drabants, or Yeomen of the Guards, becomes vacant.

Warsaw, June 23. The Russian Ambassador here has received Dispatches from Field Marshal Count Romanzow, confirming the Account of the Conclusion of the Armistice between the Russians and Turks at Giurgewo, on the 30th of last Month.

St. James's, July 2.

The King has been pleased to order Letters Patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the Kingdom of Ireland, containing a Grant unto Richard Johnston, of Gilford in the County of Down, Esq; and the Heirs Male of his Body lawfully begotten, of the Dignity of a Baronet of the said Kingdom.

St. James's, July 4.

The King has been pleased to grant unto Montague Burgoyne, Esq; the Office of one of the Chamberlains of His Majesty's Exchequer, in the Room of Sir John Miller, Bart. deceased.

Dublin Castle, June 25.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased, as a Mark of His Royal Acceptance of the good Services performed by Sir George Macartney, to nominate him to be one of the Knights Companions of the most Honorable Order of the Bath: And His Majesty having been pleased to signify His Royal Pleasure, that George Lord Viscount Townshend, Lord Lieutenant-General, and General Governor, of His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland, should invest him with the Ensigns of the said Order, and that the said Investiture should be performed in such publick and distinguished Manner, as may both shew the Respect due to the King's Order, and be a Testimony of His Majesty's Sense of the Merit of the Gentleman, on whom that signal Mark of His Royal Favour was conferred: The Ceremony was performed this Day in the following Manner:

About Noon a Procession was made from his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant's private Apartments in the Castle, to the Presence Chamber, as follows:

- Battle Ax Guards Two and Two.
- His Excellency's Footmen Two and Two.
- State Pourfuivants.
- Grooms of the Chambers Two and Two.
- Yeomen of the Stirrop.
- Athlone Pourfuivant at Arms.
- Pages Two and Two.
- Gentlemen at large Two and Two.
- Private Secretary.
- Ulster Secretary.

In this Manner the Procession was made to the upper End of the Presence Chamber, where his Excellency stood under the Canopy of State. On his Right Hand stood a Table, upon which was placed, on a Velvet Cushion, the Sword of State, and on another Cushion, upon the same Table, were placed the Ribbon and Golden Medal, being the Ensigns of the Order. His Excellency being thus prepared for the Function, and several of the Nobility, and Principal Persons of Distinction in this Kingdom, being present, Athlone Pourfuivant was ordered to call in Sir George Macartney, who waited in the Anti-chamber; which being done, he was introduced between two Baronets, viz. the Right Hon. Sir Archibald Acheson, Bart. and the Right Hon. Sir Henry Cavendish, Bart. and made his first profound Obedyance to his Excellency, at the Entrance of the Presence-chamber, the Second in the Middle of the Chamber, and the Third when he approached his Excellency, who returned the several Bows, and received him standing. His Excellency then ordered a Letter, written by the Earl of Rochford, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, to his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, signifying His Majesty's Pleasure that he should invest Sir George Macartney with the Ensigns of the Order of the Bath, to be read; Sir George then kneeling, his Excellency took the Ribbon and Medal, which were presented to him by Ulster King of Arms, and invested the Knight therewith, placing the Ribbon so as to hang from his Right Shoulder to the Left Side; his Excellency then made a Sign to Sir George Macartney to arise.

Sir George Macartney was afterwards entertained at Dinner by his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, together with many of the Nobility, and principal Persons of Distinction.
