AT the Court at St. James's, the 8th Day of July, 1772,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to oblige Ships more effectually to perform their Quarantine; and for the better Preventing the Plague being brought from Foreign Parts into Great Britain or Ireland, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man," It is among many other Things Enacted, That all Ships and Vessels arriving, and all Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes whatsoever, coming or imported into any Port or Place within Great Britain or Ireland, or any of the Isles aforementioned, from any Place from whence His Majesty, His Heirs, or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy-Council, shall judge it probable that the Infection may be brought, shall be obliged to make their Quarantine in such Place and Places, for such Time, and in such Manner, as has been, or shall, from Time to Time, be directed by His Majesty, His Heirs, or Successors, by His or Their Order or Orders made in His or Their Privy-Council, and notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette; and that until such Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes, shall have respectively performed, and be discharged from, such Quarantine, no such Person, Goods, or Merchandizes, or any of them, shall come or be brought on Shore, or go or be put on Board any other Ship or Vessel, in any Place within His Majesty's Dominions, unless in such Manner, and in such Cases, and by such Licence as shall be directed or permitted by such Order or Orders made by His Majesty, His Heirs, or Successors, in Council as aforesaid; and that all such Ships and Vessels, and the Persons or Goods coming or imported in, or going or being put on Board the same, and all Ships, Vessels, Boats, and Persons, receiving any Goods or Persons out of the same, shall be subject to such Orders, Rules, and Directions concerning Quarantine, and the Prevention of Infection, as have been or shall be made by His Majesty, His Heirs, and Successors, in Council, and notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette as aforementioned, under such Pains and Penalties as are inflicted by the said Act.

And whereas upon Information received of the Plague breaking out in divers Parts, several Orders have been heretofore made by His Majesty at this Board, requiring Quarantine to be performed by all Ships and Vessels coming from or through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, or from Archangel, Petersburg, Narva, Riga, or any other Port or Place in the Dominions of Russia; and also by all Ships and Vessels whatsoever having Cotton-Wool on Board, (except Ships and Vessels from America, or the West Indies, with that Commodity on Board, the Produce of those Parts.)

And whereas notwithstanding it appears by the Accounts received from His Majesty's Ministers Abroad, that the Sickness, which raged last Year at Moscow, and in other Parts of the Dominions of Russia, has very much subsided during the Winter; yet, as the same may be liable to break out again, and is more apt to rage in the Summer-Months, it is Matter of the highest Importance, that every Precaution should be observed; and His Majesty doth still judge it probable, that the Infection may be brought into this Kingdom, or the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from Archangel, Petersburg, Narva, Riga, or some other Port or Place in the Dominions of Russia; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, That all Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes, now arrived, or that shall hereafter arrive, in any Port of this Kingdom, or the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from or through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, or from Archangel, Petersburg, Narva, Riga, or from any other Port or Place in the Dominions of Russia, do make their Quarantine for Forty Days, which is to commence and be computed from the Day each Ship or Vessel shall come to Anchor in the Place appointed for performing Quarantine, and not before.

That all Ships and Vessels whatsoever, having Cotton-Wool on Board, (except Ships and Vessels from America, or the West Indies, with that Commodity on Board, the Produce of those Parts) now arrived, or that shall hereafter arrive, in any Port of this Kingdom, or the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, do make their Quarantine for Forty Days, which is to commence and be computed from the Day each Ship or Vessel shall come to Anchor in the Place appointed for performing Quarantine, and not before.

That the Places herein after named, shall be, and are hereby appointed to be, the Places, wherein such Ships or Vessels (not having the Infection on Board) shall respectively perform Quarantine, that is to say, all such Ships or Vessels, which are or shall be bound to the Port of London; or any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, or to the River Thames or Medway, shall perform their Quarantine in Standgate Creek: All such Ships or Vessels, which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Ipswich, Yarmouth, Boston, Hull, Newcastle, or Berwick upon Tweed, or any of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, shall perform their Quarantine in Whitebooth Road, between Hull and Grimsby: All such Ships or Vessels, which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Carlisle and Chester, or either of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, or to any Part of the Isle of Man, shall perform their Quarantine in a Place called Highlake near Liverpool, at the West End thereof: All such Ships or Vessels, which are or shall be bound to the Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol, Bridgewater, or any of them, or any Member or Creek of them, or any of them, or to Padstow or St. Ives, being

being Members of the Port of Plymouth, or to Ilfracomb or Barnstaple, being Members of the Port of Exeter; or to any other Place within the said Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol or Bridgwater, or within the said Members or Creeks, shall perform their Quarantine in King-road and Porthute Pill: All such Ships or Vessels, which are or shall be bound to the Port of Plymouth, except such Parts thereof as have been herein before mentioned, and also except Falmouth one Member thereof, or to the Port of Exeter, except such Parts thereof as have been herein before mentioned, or to the Port of Pool, or any of the Members or Creeks, or other Places within the said Ports of Plymouth, Exeter, and Pool, except as before excepted, shall perform their Quarantine in some Place between Wood End and Saltash in the River Tamer: All such Ships or Vessels, as are or shall be bound to Falmouth, a Member of the Port of Plymouth, or any Creek thereof, or any other Place therein, shall perform their Quarantine in a Place called St. Ives Pool, within the Mouth of the Harbour of Falmouth: And all such Ships or Vessels, as are or shall be bound to the Ports of Southampton, Chichester, Sandwich, or any of them, or any of the Members or Creeks thereof, or of any of them, or any other Place within the same, shall perform their Quarantine at a Place called the Mother Bank near Portsmouth: And all such Ships or Vessels, as are or shall be bound to the Eastern Coast of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Leith, Borrowstoness, Alloa, Dunbar, Kirkcaldy, Anstruther, Prestonpans, Dundee, Perth, Montrose, and Aberdeen, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine in Inverkeithing Bay: And all such Ships or Vessels, as are or shall be bound to the Western Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Port Glasgow, Greenock, Irvine, Campbeltown, Oban, Rothsay, Fort William, Air, Port Patrick, Stranraer, and Wigtown, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine at Lamlash in the Island of Arran: And all such Ships or Vessels, as are or shall be bound to the Northern Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Inverness, Zetland, Orkney, Caithness, and Stornaway, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine in Cromarty Bay in the Murray Firth: And all such Ships or Vessels, as are or shall be bound to the South-West Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Dumfries and Kirkcudbright, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall perform their Quarantine at Carlthorn, at the Mouth of the River Nith: And all such Ships or Vessels, which are or shall be bound to the Isle of Jersey, or any Port thereof, shall perform their Quarantine at a certain Place, on the Coast of the said Island, called Belle Croute, or at some Place herein before appointed for Performance of Quarantine on the Coast of England: And all such Ships or Vessels, as shall be bound to the Islands of Guernsey, Sark, or Alderney, or either of them, or any Part of them, or any of them, shall perform their Quarantine in a Place near the Island of Guernsey, called the Little Road, or at some Place herein before appointed for Performance of Quarantine on the Coast of England.

That no Pilot shall go on Board any Ship or Vessel obliged to perform Quarantine, in order to conduct the same into any Port or Place, but shall perform such Service in some other Boat or Vessel, which Boat or Vessel shall keep as much to the Windward of the Ship or Vessel so to be conducted as possible; and if any Pilot or other Person shall go on Board such Ship or Vessel, such Pilot or other Person shall perform Quarantine, in like Manner as any Person coming in such Ship or Vessel shall be obliged to perform the same.

That all Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, liable to Quarantine as aforesaid, shall be opened, unpacked, and aired, unless His Majesty shall think

fit, by His Order in Council, to direct otherwise, and so remain a Week; other than Hemp and Flax, Paper or Books, Silk raw, thrown, or wrought, Linen, Cotton-Wool, Cotton-Yarn or manufactured, Wool raw, or anywise wrought, Feathers, Grograin or Mohair Yarn, Human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmentia Wool, Carpets, Camblets, Burdets, or other Manufactures of Silk and Cotton, Kid Skins and Skins in the Wool or Hair, Spunges, Wine and Oil in Chests, Thread Stockings, all Goods packed with Straw or Cotton, Straw Hats and Brushes, Matting, and Artificial Flowers; which Goods and Merchandizes, so as aforesaid enumerated, are to be opened, unpacked, and aired, unless His Majesty shall think fit, by His Order in Council, to direct otherwise, and so remain for the Space of a Fortnight.

That all Goods imported by such Ships and Vessels respectively, shall be aired in the following Places, that is to say, All such Goods as shall be imported to the Port of London, or any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, or to the River Thames or Medway, shall be aired in Standgate Creek: All such Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Ipswich, Yarmouth, Boston, Hull, Newcastle, or Berwick upon Tweed, or any of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, shall be aired in Whitebooth Road, between Hull and Grimsby: All such Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Carlisle and Chester, or either of them, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, or to any Part of the Isle of Man, shall be aired in a Place called Highlake, near Liverpoole, at the West End thereof: All such Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol, Bridgwater, or any of them, or any Member or Creek of them, or any of them, or to Padstow or St. Ives, being Members of the Port of Plymouth, or to Ilfracomb or Barnstaple, being Members of the Port of Exeter, or to any other Place within the said Ports of Milford, Cardiff, Gloucester, Bristol, or Bridgwater, or within the said Members or Creeks, shall be aired in King-road and Porthute Pill: All such Goods as shall be imported to the Port of Plymouth, except such Parts thereof as have been herein before mentioned, and also except Falmouth, one Member thereof, or to the Port of Exeter, except such Parts thereof as have been herein before mentioned, or to the Port of Pool, or any of the Members, or Creeks, or other Places, within the said Ports of Plymouth, Exeter, and Pool, except as before excepted, shall be aired in some Place between Wood-End and Saltash, in the River Tamer: All such Goods as shall be imported to Falmouth, a Member of the Port of Plymouth, or any Creek thereof, or any other Place therein, shall be aired in a Place called St. Ives Pool, within the Mouth of the Harbour of Falmouth: All such Goods as shall be imported to the Ports of Southampton, Chichester, Sandwich, or any of them, or any of the Members or Creeks thereof, or any of them, or any other Place within the same, shall be aired at a Place called the Mother-Bank, near Portsmouth: And all such Goods as shall be imported to the Eastern Coast of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Leith, Borrowstoness, Alloa, Dunbar, Kirkcaldy, Anstruther, Prestonpans, Dundee, Perth, Montrose, and Aberdeen, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall be aired in Inverkeithing Bay: And all such Goods as shall be imported to the Western Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Port Glasgow, Greenock, Irvine, Campbeltown, Oban, Rothsay, Fort William, Air, Port Patrick, Stranraer, and Wigtown, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall be aired at Lamlash, in the Island of Arran: And all such Goods as shall be imported to the Northern Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Inverness, Zetland, Orkney, Caithness, and Stornaway, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall be aired in Cromarty Bay, in the Murray Firth: And all such Goods as shall be imported to the South-
West

West Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Dumfries and Kirkcudbright, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, shall be aired at Carlsthorpe, at the Mouth of the River Nith: And all such Goods as shall be imported to the Isle of Jersey, or any Part thereof, shall be aired at a certain Place on the Coast of the said Island, called Belle Croûte, or at such Place herein before appointed, for Performance of Quarantine on the Coast of England, where the Ships, in which such Goods are imported, shall respectively perform their Quarantine: And all such Goods as shall be imported to the Islands of Guernsey, Sark, or Alderney, or either of them, or any Part of them or any of them, shall be aired in a Place near the Island of Guernsey, called the Little Road, or at such Place herein before appointed for Performance of Quarantine on the Coast of England, where the Ships, in which such Goods are imported, shall respectively perform their Quarantine.

That whatsoever Ship or Person shall receive any Men or Goods from on Board any Ship or Vessel under Quarantine, shall be compelled to perform the like Quarantine.

That such Persons as, after Quarantine performed, shall be employed in the Hold of any Ship or Vessel, for the Taking any Goods not liable to retain Infection, from the Goods and Merchandizes before enumerated, shall be obliged to perform a new Quarantine.

That the Captains of every of His Majesty's Ships of War, who shall meet any such Ship or Vessel coming to any of the Ports of Great Britain or Ireland, or of the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, shall take due Care to prevent the Landing any Goods, Seamen, or Passengers, from on Board the same, until they shall be put under the Direction of the Officers of His Majesty's Customs.

That the Commissioners and other Officers of His Majesty's Customs do use their utmost Diligence and Care, that the Quarantine before directed be duly performed.

That the Commanders of His Majesty's Ships of War, as likewise the Commanders of His Majesty's Forts and Garrisons lying near the Sea Coasts, and all the Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Chief Magistrates, Constables, Headboroughs, Tythingmen, and all other Officers and Ministers of Justice, be aiding and assisting to the said Officers of His Majesty's Customs, and to all others that shall be concerned in stopping all such Ships as aforesaid, and in bringing them to the Places appointed for the Performance of their Quarantine, and in due Performance thereof.

And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the said respective Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

St. James's, July 18, 1772.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That on Tuesday the 26th Day of May last, the Prince Ernest Shallop, Michael Cock late Master, in the Service of His Majesty's Customs at the Port of St. Ives, being on a Cruise off the Land's End, saw at an Anchor off a Cove called Port Gavarra, in the Parish of St. Levan in the County of Cornwall, about two Miles from the Shore, a large Smuggling Vessel, about One Hundred Tons Burthen, with one Mast, Cutter rigged, an upright Stern, without a Counter, a great Rake in her Stern, deep waisted, a short Mast-head with a Vane upon it painted Black, her Sails White, with three new Pieces about ten or twelve Feet long each, in the Weather of her Main Sail about Half-Way up, and one whole new Cloth in the Lee of the same Sail, had about Thirty Men on Board, and a Six-car'd Boat; which Vessel, as soon as the Prince Ernest appeared, made Sail towards her, and, when she came within Pistol-shot, began firing upon her with Eight Carriage Guns, and also with Swivels loaded with Grape-shot, and Balls about Four or Six Pounds Weight, and with Muskets, which was continued very hot for Half an Hour, when the Master of the Prince Ernest, having no Great Guns or Swivels to make any Resistance, ran the Shallop as near as he possibly could to the Shore, without stranding her, and there brought her to an Anchor, and then he and his Crew took to their Boat, and got on Shore; during which, the said Vessel continued firing Great Guns and Small Arms at them; and about an Hour after they had got on Shore, the Boat, belonging to the aforesaid Vessel, with Ten Men in her, went along Side the Prince Ernest Shallop, cut her Cable, and let her drive, the Vessel still continuing her Fire at the Shallop's People on Shore; and after the Prince Ernest had drove out about a Quarter of a Mile, she was boarded by the People belonging to the Smuggling Vessel, who hoisted her Gibsail, ran her off about a League from the Shore, and after plundering her, it is supposed they scuttled her, as she was seen to sink about Seven o'Clock in the Evening of the said Day: — His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Offence, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
