New-Caftle, Decemb. 12.

He Coal Fleet with their Convoy are yet here, having upon a misinformation, lost a sair opportunity of purting to S-a; the occasion of it thus, among it the 150 sail that on Fiday was sevennight went from hence, was one Tinn with a hip belonging to Ipswich, who for want of a Mainmalt, was fired to make use as he could, of two Jury Masts 5 by which means being unable to keep company with the Fleet, lying the behind, he was off Humber, overtaken by 11 fail of other laten C lifets, who though they had met with contrary Winds, would not be perswaded to return with the rest of their Company and Convoy for this Borr, but kept the Sea, whom this Tinn discovering, and mistaking for Hollanders, in a great fright, got into the Boat, and fled into Humber, with a report, that 13 States Men of Warr were upon the Coasts, and had: ken their ships; which salle noise being immediately spread into the Countryes, slew likewise hither, and prevented the fayling of the Fleer.

Alborough, Decemb. 13. About 150 laden Colliers, hwe in few daies p iled by this place to the Southwards, we have neither feen nor heard of any Caper of late upon these

Cails, to give them any disturbance.

Danizick, Novemb. 24. Eisenour, Novemb. 28. Two Gilliots are here arrived with part of the Rigging and Men belonging to Admiral Helts Ship, which by ill weather was forced upon a Rock at the entry of Fleckery in Normay, the Vessel carrying six y

Gins, and 160 Men.

Ostend, Decemb. 22. The Fleet designed for Spainthat went lately out of this Harbor in the Road, met with a floring which forced them into the Bielings, where they are, expedling a fair wind. Several Bilianders also outwardsbound, were by storm driven back again hither, one vene of them wanting, which is supposed to be lost. Their Convoyer in his return, standing off and on for high water, with his Spanish colours out, rescued a Billander that had been taken by a French Caper of 5 or 6 Guns. The Caper afterwards thanding Westwards, seiled a ship from Amsterdam, bound with English Prisoners and Goods for England; but a Spanish ship coming from Biscay with Soldiers for this place, fortunately met them, and haling the prize, commanded bet back into this Port: The Caper in fear of another ship to Windward of him with a Red Flag, which tis supposed to be English, followed likewise in, where he is under Arrest for Goods raken out of the Billander.
