St. James's, January 23, 1773.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to the King, that some Time in the Night between the 15th and 16th Instant, a Threatening Letter was left in a Necessary-House belonging to and near the Dwelling-House of the Right Honourable Lord Langdale, at Holme upon Spalding Moor, in the East Riding of the County of York, addressed to his Lordship's Steward Mr. John Occleshaw, in the Words following, viz.

For Mr. Hogglesho Steward at Holme.

Mr. Hogglesho Since you became Steward to my Lord Langdale, you have been very buissey and I suppose is still Endeavouring as much as you can to get Holme Common Inclosed; which by that means is likely to distress and ruin many poor Families; now as we perceive that it is not so much my Lord Langdales Desire and his will; but by your Persuasion; by this I absolutely tell you if the said Incloser go forward, and as soon as the Parliament grants the for Act the same; you may expect and shall be sure to meet with a fatal Stroke the first opportunity that can be met with; and yet you shall not know who hurt you; I do promise you this, that you shall not have the pleasure of seeing Holme Common Inclosed—

And that one or more Letters of the same Sort were that Night also left, and found in different Parts of the Town: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in writing and leaving the said Letters, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Persons who actually wrote the said Letters) who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a farther Encouragement, the Right Honourable Lord Langdale doth hereby promise a Reward of **TWENTY POUNDS** to any Person making such Discovery as aforesaid, (except as before excepted) the same to be paid on Conviction of the Offenders, or any of them.
