The French incommode these Countreys extremely with their incursions.

Liege, Offeb. 3. This Countrey, it feems, cannot be excufed by what it has fuffered already during this War, from new ruines and devallations; three or four dayes fince, the Governor of Machricht fent orders to the Magiltrates of Tongres, Majcycke, Vifet, St Tron and of other places, forthwith to demolish the Fortifications they had left, on pain of military execution and at the fame time commanded those of Vifet and Tongres, to bring all their Hay, Striw, and Corn to M eft icht, where they shou'd be paid for it : Put the Count of Najfaw, General of the Horfe of the P ince of O. anges Army, arriving with 4000 Horfe and Dragoons in the Neig bothood of Tongres, hath given a contrar , com. mand to the places abovementioned, fe that those poor people know not whit they have to do. Two hundred Men of Maestricht having put themselves into the Castle of Heers, in order to the demoliflung it, the Count of Naffem invelled the faid Caftle, and made them all Prifoners of War. We have advice here, that the Marefchal de Crequi hath taken the Caffle of Bouillon, which the Governor delivered up withour the least defence, which gives fome fufpition of his having an underflanding with the French.

Nimeguen, Octob. 2. We expect to fee this place in a fhort time better filled than it is at prefent, for we are affored that the Affembly will be opened, and the Conferences begun the first of the next month, which will be very neceffary, for otherwile the French Ambaffadors begun to speak of teturning home, having been above five months here, without entring upon any businefs.
