

and proceeded to Sea with the said Boat and Smuggling Cutter.

And whereas John Stokes, Midshipman of His Majesty's said Cutter the Meredith, together with Lucas Reeve, Brian Nowland, and Seven others of the Crew of the said Cutter, being, on the 6th of the said Month, on the Look-out, off the With Rails, with the Gigg belonging to the said Cutter, they observed a large Cutter standing in from Sea drop her Boat from a Stern near the Shore, which they gave Chace to, but could not get up with her until she was ashore; where, upon their endeavouring to seize the Goods, there came down and surrounded the Boat about One hundred Smugglers, consisting of Horsemen and Foot, who swore they would murder every Person belonging to the Boat, if they offered to seize the Goods; and immediately began to throw Stones, and therewith knocked down the aforesaid Lucas Reeve and Brian Nowland, and carried off all the Goods except Seven Half Ankers of Brandy, which, together with the Boat, the Officers seized, and carried to the Custom-House at Shoreham.

The Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, in order to bring the Offenders to Justice, do hereby promise a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS, to any Person who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, any one or more of the Offenders concerned in either of the said Assaults and Rescues, to be paid by the Receiver-General of His Majesty's Customs, upon Conviction.

And if any of the said Offenders shall, within three Months from the Date hereof, discover his Accomplices, so that Two of them at least may be apprehended and convicted, the Offender making such Discovery shall be entitled to the like Reward, and be discharged of such his Offence.
