A P R O C L A M A T I O N,
For Discontinuing the Bounties offered for Seamen, and Landmen, to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War.

G E O R G E R.

WHEREAS We did, by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twenty-second Day of April last, offer certain Bounties therein mentioned to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service; and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five Years, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service, who should, on or before the Thirty-first Day of this Instant May, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy: And whereas We find it no longer necessary to continue the Armament at Sea; We have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby revoking and annulling Our said Proclamation of the Twenty-second Day of April last: And We do hereby declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That the Payment of the several Bounties thereby offered shall cease and determine, from and after the Date hereof.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Sixth Day of May, One thousand seven hundred and seventy-three, and in the Thirteenth Year of Our Reign.

G O D save the K I N G.

Yarmouth, April 14. On Monday last, between Five and Six in the Morning, we were alarmed by a very violent Shock of an Earthquake, which lasted about Two Minutes, and has destroyed Ninety-eight Houses, and shaken the Town so much, that the remaining Houses must be rebuilt. We hear of only Three Lives lost; but Numbers of the Inhabitants have been dragged from under the Ruins very much bruised. Yesterday about half an Hour after Eleven we felt another Shock, though not so violent as the former.

Petersburg, April 29. On Saturday last the Empress was pleased to admit all the Foreign Ministers to the Honour of Dining and Passing the whole Day with her, at a Building called the Hermitage; to which the Ministers of the Council were likewise invited. Two Tables were provided for the Company; the Empress presided at one, and the Great Duke at the other; and the Places were ballotted for. In the Evening, the Company being increased, there was a Ball, which her Imperial Majesty was pleased to honour with her Presence, and afterwards a Supper. During the whole of the Enter-

tainment her Imperial Majesty gave every Proof of Affability and Condescension.

The Departure of the Empress for Zarcoo Zelo is fixed for Thursday next, and that of the Great Duke for the Saturday following.
