. . . . India Company, and virtually transfer them to the Crown.

That the faid Bill is definitive of the effential Rights and Interests of the Petitioners in many other Respects, and is further defective as to many of the Purpoles for which it is declared to be framed.

That the Petitioners further look upon this Bill as tending to deftroy the Liberties of the Subject, from an immenfe Addition of Power it must give to the Influence of the Crown-

And the Petitioners cannot conclude without obferving, before they are deprived of their Franchifes, which are the great Security for their Property, that they have never been made acquainted with any Charge of Delinquency having been made against them in Parliament; that if any such Charge has been made, they have never been called upon to be heard against it; and that they cannot therefore suppole, that any fuch Delinquency on the Part of the Company has been voted ; which Delinquency however is made the Ground of this Bill.

The Petitioners therefore humbly pray, that they may be heard by themselves or their Council, against the faid Bill, and that the fame may not pass into a Law.
