ARLY this Morning His Majesty set out from hence for Portimouth.

HIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was fent to the Honourable House of Commons, by Mr. Quarme, Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that the Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the faid Commission, impowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein mentioned, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the faid Assented accordingly. Affent to the faid Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Ast for establishing certain Regulations, for the better Management of the Affairs of the East India Company, as well in India as in Europe.

An Ast to explain and amend an Ast made in the Fourth Year of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act to prevent Paper Bills of Credit, hereafter to be iffued in any of His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America, from being declared to be a legal Tender in Payments of Money; and to prevent the legal Tender of fuch Bills as are now subsisting, from being prolonged beyond the Periods limited for calling in and finking the same.

An Att for the more effectually restraining the retailing of Distilled Spirituous Liquors; and for prewenting the forging or counterfeiting any Stamp or Seal used for marking Silks, Callicoes, Linens, and Stuffs, to be printed, painted, stained, or dyed, in Great Britain.

An Act for repealing so much of an Act of the Thirty-first Year of His late Majesty, as institts Capital Pu-nishment for Frauds and Abuses in the marking or stamping of Gold or Silver Plate; and for instituting another Punishment for the said Offence.

An Act for providing Clergymen to officiate in Goals within that Part of Great Britain called Eng-

An Act to explain and amend the several Laws now in being, so far as the same relate to the Preservation of the Moor or Hill Game.

An Ast for the more effectual Preservation of the Game, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland; and for repealing and amending several of the Laws now in being relative thereto.

An Act for draining and preserving certain Lands and Grounds, in the Parishes of Tid St. Giles and Newton, in the Isle of Ely and County of Cambridge, and in Tid St. Mary's in the County of Lincoln.

An Ast for the better lighting and watching the Town of Kingston upon Thames in the County of Surrey; and for removing and preventing all Ob-structions, Encroachments, and Nusances therein.

Hamburgh, June 15. On the 7th Instant in the Morning died, in the 73d Year of his Age, Senator Burmester of this City, and Yesterday Mr. Steetz, a respectable Merchant, was elected a Member of the Senate, in his Room.

St. James's, June 19, 1773 Whereas it has been bumbly represented to the King, That on Saturday the 5th Instant, between the Hours of Ten and Twelve at Noon, Mrs. Elizabeth Congbeer, of Woodford in the Parish of Monksilver in the County of Somerfet, aged Eighty-eight Years, and her two Daughters, (the eldest aged about Forty-five, and the youngest about Forty-three Years) were found lying on the Floor in their House at Woodford aforesaid with their Throats cut in a most shocking Manner, and other-wise much bruised, the eldest Daughter having sive Blows in her Forehead, supposed to be done with the wooden Bar of the Door, and the youngest having one violent Blow in her Cheek; and the Jury upon the Coroner's Inquest having found their Verditt Wisful Murder against Persons unknown: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Per-sons cencerned in so borrid and barbarous a Murder, is bereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually committed the Murder) who shall discover his or her Ascomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof; and also a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS to any Person making such Discovery as aforesaid, (except as before excepted) to be paid by the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of any one or more of the said Offenders.
