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Riga, Sept. 27.

WE expect with some impatience to have the confirmation of what we told you formerly we were advised of from *Plesko*, viz. That all the *Moscovite* Troops were ordered to march forthwith towards the *Minaie*, to be employed against the *Turks*, though we have the less reason to doubt the truth of it, for that from *Mosco* they write the same thing; notwithstanding which, our Enemies we hear still give out, that the *Czar* of *Moscou* will take the advantage of the present posture of things to make War upon us. The last week arrived here our new Governour General Count *Christian Horne*, and was received with all the honours and respects this City was capable of. Two dayes since likewise arrived here 100 men of the Garrison of *Landsferow* in *Schonen*, and the rest are daily expected.

Dantzick, Octob. 1. The Letters we received by the last Ordinary from *Poland*, speak generally of so great appearance of a sudden Peace with the *Turks*, though what ground they have for it, we cannot learn; and on the contrary there are very fresh Letters from *Ledopol* which say, that the *Turks* had taken and burnt two considerable places, and that they were advancing with their whole Force united together. It is indeed the prayer of all people, that a speedy Peace may be concluded, which seem only able to free *Poland* from the ruines and devastations that must be expected from so formidable an Enemy, at a time, when the Forces of the Kingdom are so few, that they can hardly appear in the field; however much may be expected next to the divine assistance, from the great courage and conduct of the King, who the last Summer with a handful of men, frustrated the designs of 200 000.

Warsaw, Octob. 2. This afternoon arrives the Post from *Leopol*, which brings an account of a Victory obtained by his Majesty against the *Tartars*, with these particulars; That upon the advice the King received of the advance of the *Turks* and *Tartars*, that they had taken and burnt *Zsflowic*, and one or two other places, and that they threatened to do the like to *Trembowla*; his Majesty, after having held a Council of War (where it was resolved that the Commissioners appointed for the Treaty, should forthwith begin their journey) decamped with what Forces he had from the Neighborhood of *Leopol*, and arrived the 23rd past near *Zorawno*, where leaving all their Baggage, the Army about midnight continued its march; the Cavalry advancing before, and arriving at *Wayncelow*, which is about two Leagues from *Zorawno*, the Chevalier *Lubomirsky* marched on with a small Body of men, and about break of day fell upon the Enemies Vanguard, which he surprized, and killed many of them, and put the rest into great disorder; but the *Tartars*, who were 30 000 strong, commanded by the *Chans* Son, soon got into order again, upon which *Lubomirsky* having but a handful of men, retreated to the main Body which stood in *Batalia*; some Troops had been sent out by the King to second him, but they were not able to make head against the *Tartars*, who

about Noon came down upon the whole *Polish* Army, and the Fight, was begun which lasted till evening, when the Enemy not being able to stand against our *Hussars* and *Dragoons*, fled in the greatest confusion possible, leaving behind them several Prisoners, besides the killed upon the place, which were not, it's said, above 1000, for that by reason of the night, our Troops could not pursue them, and besides the *Tartars* upon such occasions are always too nimble for us; had our Army had its Artillery with it, which was left at *Modaine*, greater execution might have been done upon the Enemy.

Lubeck, Octob. 6. By a Vessel arrived from *Stockholm*, we have advice, that the Assembly of the States of the Kingdom was begun, and promised a happy conclusion, the several Members being very unanimous, and disposed to agree to whatever the safety and good of the Kingdom in the present conjuncture of affairs requires, without spending time in the examination of matters of less importance.

Francfort, Octob. 8. The Count *Kinski*, one of the Imperial Plenipotentiaries, is in few dayes expected here in his way to *Nimwegen*. We expect our next Letters from *Vienna* will tell us, who is to be the Imperial Bride, though when our last Letters came from thence, all the discourse at that Court was of the youngest Princess of *Newburg*. The Rebels in *Hungary* begin to appear in a considerable Body, inasmuch that the Forces the Emperor has at present there under the command of General *Smik*, are not able to make head against them, and the Emperor has found it necessary to cause several Regiments that were quartered in *Bohemia*, to march to reinforce them.

Sttburgh, Octob. 9. On Monday last the French Army passed the *Rhine* at *Brisac*, and has sent several detachments towards *Bissa* and *Staffort*, to have an eye upon the Imperialists, and to hinder their passing the *Rhine*, which, it's said, they intend to do at *Basse* or *Rhinfeldt*; and this day it is reported that Major General *Schulze* has already passed it with 4000 Horse. Yesterday the Duke of *Lorraine* was encamped about half a League on the other side of *Friburg*, and had detached three Imperial and two *Lorraine* Regiments, who, it's said, are to march by the way of *Spire*, to join the *Munster* and *Lunenburg* Troops. The detachment which the Duke of *Luxemburg* had sent towards *Lorraine*, and which was already arrived at *Savoy*, is countermanded, and accordingly marching back to the Army. To morrow the Electoral Prince of *Saxony*, who is marching with 1700 Horse to join the Imperial Army, is expected here.

From the French Camp at *Rixen* near *Mulhausen*, Oct. 10. The 6th inst, we repassed the *Rhine* at *Brisac*, and came and encamped here, our General having sent off three detachments, one under the command of the Marquis *de Boufflers*, which is at present posted at *Hegenheim* and *Hesingen* about a mile and half from *Basse*; the other under the conduct of the Count *de Pleffys*, who is quartered near *Bessort*; and the third commanded by the Count *de Rye*, who is posted about three Leagues from

from *Bulle*. These Troops have been thus order'd, the better to observe the motions of the Imperial Army, which, it's said, intends to pass the *Rhine* at *Rhinfeldt*, which hitherto continues encamped about a quarter of a mile from *Friburg*, from whence the Duke of *Lorraine* detached the 5th instant five Regiments, who are to march towards *Spire*, and to join the *Munster* and *Luxemburg* Troops who advance towards the *Saar*; and before we repass'd the *Rhine*, the Duke of *Luxemburg* sent likewise a detachment to *Lorraine*, to join the *Mareschal Crequi*. We hear that the *Imperialists* at *Philipsburg*, have had a design upon *Deux-Ponts*, but that it did not succeed. Major General *Schulz* is with 3 or 4000 *Imperialists* near *Rhinfeldt*.

Cologne, Octob. 12. The *Munster* and *Luxemburg* Troops continue in the same quarters we advised you in our last, expecting, as is said, farther orders concerning their passing the *Rhine*. From *Neuremberg* they write, that there was arrived Prince *Adolph*, Uncle to the present King of *Sweden*, on his way to *Vienna*, whither he goes about matters relating to his succession to the Ducy of *Deux-Ponts*.

Charleville, Octob. 12. Yesterday arrived near this place a detachment from the *Mareschal de Schomburgs* Army, consisting in five Battalions of Guards, and 30 Squadrons of Horse, under the command of the *Marquis de Renel* Lieutenant General; to morrow they will continue their march towards *Lorraine*, to join the *Mareschal de Crequi*, who is at present on the *Saar*. The *Mareschal de Schomburg* marches, we hear, with his Army towards *Cambresis*.

Hagu, Octob. 16. Yesterday the Envoy of the Bishop of *Munster* parted hence with the Ratifications of the Treaty concluded some time since between *Spain*, this State, and that Bishop. The Court of Justice assembles every day forenoon and afternoon, to determine the affair of the *Sieur de Groot*, which is still depending. It seems there is some difference in *Oost-Frisland* between the Princes and the States of that Countrey, on the subject of the 1200 *Munsterians* which remain there, and have taken an Oath of Fidelity to the Princes, pursuant to an agreement made between her and the Bishop, at which those States are said to be dissatisfied, and that they are sending Deputies hither to represent the matter to this State. The *Sieur Odyke*, Ambassador for the Treaty at *Nimeguen*, before he begins his journey thither, will make a stop to *Zealand*, and it's said the Prince of *Orange* intends likewise to be there at the opening the Assembly of the States of that Province on the 22 instant. Our Letters from *Hamburg* of the 13 instant inform us, that the *Danes* were gone into Winter-quarters, and that in *Pomeren*, *Denmin* continued to make a brave defence, and that in a late attack 300 of the Besiegers, with several Officers of Note, had been killed.

Brussels, Octob. 16. Though the Duke of *Villa Hermosa* continues still his quarters at *Tikemont*, yet the Troops march off daily to their Winter quarters: those designed for *Namur* and *Luxemburg*, marched 3 or 4 dayes since under the command of the Prince of *Coninay*, Governor of *Luxemburg*; and the 14 instant, a Spanish Regiment of Foot marched towards *Cambray*, Convoied by a considerable Body of Horse and Dragoons, which latter will be divided into *Cambray*, *Valenciennes* and *Mons*. We are told that ten Dutch Regiments of Foot and four of Horse are to Winter in these Provinces, and 6000 more at *Hassel* in the Countrey of *Lige*, where they are already arrived, but a party of *Maschick* had the day before taken out of the Neighborhood most of the Cattel belonging to those Inhabitants, by which they will suffer very much this Winter. The *Osnabrug* Troops will remain likewise in these Provinces this Winter; and though we do not certainly hear that their quarters are assigned, yet the general belief is, that they will be very suddenly in the Countrey of *Luxemburg*, and the Duke

himself will, it's said, pass the Winter here, where our General-Governor the Duke of *Villa Hermosa* is expected about the latter end of the next week. The *Mareschal de Schomburg* having sent off a detachment of 4000 Horse towards *Lorraine*, is at present encamped near *Chastan Cambresis*, which, as likewise *Chasteler*, he is fortifying, and by means of them, and *Bouchain* on the other side *Cambray*, will in all appearance be block'd up this Winter. Two dayes since the French made another incursion into the Countrey of *Waes*, and carried away a very great number of Cattel and Horses, for default of payment of Contributions. From *Ipres* we hear, that several parties of the Garison of *Aine* have lately been abroad, and that they have taken Prisoners most of the Gentlemen that lived about *Ipres*, who must ransom themselves; and on the other hand, the Spaniards of *Nimpois*, of *St Omers* and *Ipres*, ravage the French Territories, and likewise take Prisoners all they can meet with. Don *Pedro de Ronquillo*, one of the Plenipotentiaries of *Spain* for the Treaty at *Nimeguen*, is at present at *Antwerp*.

Paris, Octob. 17. From *Brst* they write, that the 5th instant sailed from thence the Men of War equipped there for the *West Indies*, under the command of the Count d' *Arles*, Vice-admiral of *France*. From *Flanders* our Letters give us an account that the *Mareschal de Schomburg* was encamped with his Army near *Chastan Cambresis*, from whence it's thought he will remove his Forces into Winter-quarters, after having fortified several Posts about *Cambray*, in order to the blocking it up this Winter. In our former we have given you an account that the Duke of *Luxemburg* had passed the *Rhine* at *Brisac*, since we have advice, that the 10 instant, he was encamped near *Mulsbanfen* in the Countrey of *Santogow*, from whence he had sent several detachments to observe the Imperial Army which was encamped between *Friburg* and *Rhinfeldt*, at a which latter place the Duke of *Lorraine* pretended to pass the *Rhine*, and accordingly had caused a Bridge to be prepared. And this day it is said, that Letters are arrived of the 11 instant from the Duke of *Luxemburgs* Camp, which say that the *Imperialists* had actually pass'd the *Rhine* at *Rhinfeldt*.
