E expect with some impatience to have the confirmation of what we told you formerly we were advised of from Plestro, viz. That all the Moscovite Troops were ordered to march forthwith to-

wards the Uknaine, to be employed against the Turks, though we have the less reason to doubt the truth of it, for that from Mosco they write the same thing; nor withstanding which, our Enemies we hear fill give out, that the Czar of Moscovy will take the advantage of the present posture of things to make War upon us. The last week arrived here our new Governor General Count Christian Horne, and was received with all the hohours and respects this Ci y was capable of. Two dayes since likewise arrived here 100 men of the Garison of Landforown in Schonen, and the restare daily expecteds

Dantzith, Octob. 1. The Letters we received by the last Ordinary from Poland, speak generally of so great appearance of a sudden Poace with the Turks, though what ground they have for it, we cannot learn; and on the contrary there are very fresh Letters from Leopol which say, that the Turks stad taken and burnt two considerable places, and that they were advancing with their twhole force united together, It is indeed the prayer of all peoples, that a speedy Reacamay be concluded, which seem, and able to free Poland from the ruines and devaltations that must be expected from so formidable an Enemy, at a time, when the Eures of the Kingdom are so see that they can hardly appear in the Field; however much may be expected next to the divine assistance, from the great courage and conduct of the King; who the last Summer with a standful of men, frustrased the designs of 200 000.

Warfam, Odob. z. This afternoon arrives the Polt from Leopol, which brings an account of a Victory pb-sained by his Majefly against the Tartars, with these particulars; That upon the advice the King received of the advance of the Tucks and Tarties, that they had gaken and burnt Jaflowie, and one or two other places, Ind that they threatned to do the like to Trembowin 3 his Majesty, after having held a Council of War. (where it was resolved that the Commissioners appointed for the Treaty, should for thwith begin their journey) decamped with what Forces he had from the Neighborhood of Leopof, and arrived the 23 past near Zorawno, where leaving all their Baggage, the Army about, midnight continued its march; the Cavalry advancing before, and arriving at Wayncelow, which is about two Leagues from Zurawno, the Chevalier Libonirsky marched on with a small Body of men, and about break of day fell upon the Enemies Vanguard, which he furprized, and killed many of them, and purple reft into great diforder; but the Tarters, who were 30 000 strong, commanded by the Chams Son, foon got into order again, upon which Lubomirsky having but a handful of night terreated to the muin Body which stood in Bastalia'; some Troups had been seneout by the King to second him, but they were not able to make head against the Tartars, who

about Noon came down upon the whole Polifb Army, and the Fight, was begun which lasted till evening, when the Enemy not being able to stand against our Hussara and Dragoons, sted in the greatest confusion possible, leaving behind them several Prisoners, befides the killed upf on the place, which were not, it's said, above roop, for that by selfont of the right, our Truops could not pure such them, and befides the Tarturs upon such occasions are alwayes too himble for us; had durarmy had it? Artillery with it, which was lest at Modhame, greatest execution might have been done upon the Enemy.

Lubeck, Offob. 6. By a Vessel arrived from stock-holme, we have advice, that the Assembly of the States of the Kingdom was begun, and promised a happy conclusion, the several Members being very unanimous, and disposed to agree to whatever the safety and good of the Kingdom in the present conjuncture of affairs requires, without spending time in the examination of matters of less importance.

Francfors, Octob. 8. The Count Kinski, one of the Imperial Plenipotentiaries, is in few dayes expected here in his way to Nimeguen. We expect our next Letters from Viehha will tell us, who is to be the Imperial Bride, though when our last Letters came from thence, all the discourse at that Court was of the youngest Princess of Newburg. The Rebuts in Hungary begin to appear in a torkiderable Body, infomucit that the Forces the Emperor has so present their under the command of General smit, are not able to make head against them, and the Empletor has found it necessary to cause several Regiments; that were quartered in Boh. min, to march to reinforce them.

Stimburgh, Octob. 9. IOn Monday last the French Army passed the Rhino at Brisae, and has seen several detachments towards Bisla and Staffort, to have an eye upon the Imperialitis, and to hinder their passing the Rhine, which, it's said, every intend to do at Baste of Rhinfeldt; and this day it is reported that Major General Schultz has already passed it with 4000 Horse. Yesterday the Duke of Lorrein was encamped about half a League on the other side of Friburg, and had detached three Imperial and two Estrain Regiments, who, it's said, are to mirch by the way of Spire, to join the Munfter and Lunenburg Troops. The detachment which the Duke of Luxemburg had sent towards Lorrain, and which was already arrived at Savernesis countermanded, and accordingly marching hack to the Army. To mortow the Blectoral Prince of Saxony, who is marching with 1700 Horse to join the Imperial Army, is expected here.

From the French Camp at Risen near Mulhaylen, Oct.

10. The 6 inft, we reputted the Rhine at Brilac, and came and enchmped here, our General having fehr off three detachements, one under the command of the Marquis de Bouflers, which is at present polted at Hegenheim and Hesingenabout a mile and balf from Base, the other under the conduct of the Count da Plessor who is quartered near Bestor; and the shird commanded by the Count de Roye, who is posted about three Leagues

from

from Baste. These Troops have been thus order dithe better to observe the motions of the Imperial Army, which, it's faid, intends to pals the Rhine at Rhinfeldt, which hitherto continues encamped about a quarter of a mile from Friburg, from whence the Duke of Lorrain detached the 8th instant five Regiments, who are to march towards Spire, and to join the Munster and Lunenburg Troops who advance towards the Saar 3 and before we repassed the Rhine, the Duke of Luxemburg sent likewife a detachement to Lorrain, to join the Mareschal Crequi. We heat that the Interialists at Philipsburg, have had a defign upon Deux-Ponts, but that it did not fucceed. Major General Schultz is with 3 or 4000 Imperialifta near Rhinfeldt.

The Munster and Lunenburgh Cologne, Ollob. 13. Troops continue in the same quarters we advised you in our last, expecting, as is said, farther orders concerning cheir passing the Khine. From Neuremberg they write, shat there was arrived Prince Adolph, Uncle to the prefent King of Sueden, on his way to Vienna, whither he goes about matters relating to his fuccession to the Dut-

city of Deux-Ponis.

Cherleville, Offob. 13. Yesterday arrived near this place a detachement from the Mareschal de Schembergs Army, confishing in five Battalions of Guards, and 30 Squadrons of Horse, under the command of the Marquis de Renel Lieutenant General; to morrow they will continue their march towards Lorrain, to join the Mareschal de Crequi, who is at present on the Sair. The Mareschal de Schomberg marches, we hear, with his Ar-

my towards Cambrefis.

Hagu , Ottob. 16. Yesterday the Envoy of the Bishop of Munfter parted hence with the Ratifications of the Treaty concluded some time since between Spain, this State, and that Bishop. The Court of Justice assembles every day forenoon and afternoon, to determine the affair of the Sieur de Groot, which is fill depending. It seems there is some difference in Ooft-Friseland between the Princess and the States of that Countrey, on the subject of the 1200 Munsterians which remain there, and have taken an Oath of Fidelity to the Princels, pursuant to an agreement made between her and the Bishop, at which those States are said to be distatished, and that they are fending Deputies hither to repre-fent the matter to this S are. The Sieur Odyke, Ambafsador for the Treaty at Nimeguen, before he begins his journey thicker, will make a step to Zealand, and it's faid the Prince of Orange intends likewise to be there at the opening the Affembly of the States of that Province on the 22 instant. Our Letters from Hamburg of the 13 instant inform us, that the Danes were gone into Winter-quarters, and that in Pomeren, Demmin continued to make a brave defence, and that in a late attack 300 of the Besiegers, with several Officers of Note, had been

Bruffels, Offob. 16. Though the Duke de Villa Hermifa continues still his quarters at Tillemont, yet the Troops march off daily to their Winter quarters: those designed for Namus and Luxemburg b, marched 3 or 4 dayes fince under the command of the Prince of Chimay, Governor of Luxemburgh; and the 14 instant, a Spanish Regiment of Footmarched towards Camhear, Convoyed by a confiderable Body of Horse and Dragoons, which latter will be divided into Cambray, Valenciams and Mons, We are told that ten Dutch Regiments of Foot and Jone of Horse are to Winter in these Provinces, and 6000 more Jour of Horleare to Winter the Provinces, and 6000 more at Haffel in the Countrey of Lieg., where they are already arnived, but a party of Ma & high had the day before taken out of the Neighborhood most of the Cattel belonging to those Inhabitants, by which they will suffer very much this Winter. The Ofnabrug Troops will remain likewise in these Provinces this Winter; and though we do not certainly hear that their gratters are assigned, yet the general belief is, that they will be very suchtimize in the Countrey of Laxemburgh, and the Duke

himfelf will, it's faid, pale the Winter bere, where our General-Governor the Duke de Villa Hermafa is expected about the latter end of the next week. The Marefehal de Schombergh having fent off a detachement of 4000 Horse towards Lorrain, is at prefent encamped near Chaft on Chmbrifts, which, as like-wife Chaftelet, he is fortifying, and by means of them, and Bouchain on the other fide Cambray, will in all appearance be blocked up this Winter. Two dayes fince the French made another incu fion into the Countrey of Weet, and carried away a very Two dayes fince the French made another reat number of Cattel and Horfes, for default of payment of Contributions. From Ipres we hear, that several parties of the Garifon of Ane have lately been abroad, and that they have taken Prisoners most of the Gentlemen that lived about Ipres, who must ransom themselves; and on the other hand, the Spaniards of Nimpoit, of St Omirs and Ipres, ravage the French Territories, and likewife take Prifoners all they can meet with. Dan Pedro de Ronquillo, one of the Plenipotentiaries of Spain for

the Treaty at Nimeguen, is at present at Animery.

Ponis, Ottob. 17. From Brift they write, that the 5th instant sailed from theore the Men of War equipped there for the Wift In ties, under the command of the Count d' firees, Viceadmiral of France. From Flanders our Letters give us an account that the Mareschal de Schumberg was encamped with his Army near chafted Cambiefis, from whence it's thought he will remove his Forces into Winter-quarters, after having fortified several Posts about Cambray, in order to the blocking it up this Winter. In our former we have given you an account that the Duke of Luxemburg had passed the Rhine at Brisae, since we have advice, that the 10 instant, he was encamped near Mul-Winter, banfen in the Countrey of Santgow, from whence he had fent feveral detachements to observe the imperial Army which was encamped between Friburg and Rhinfelds, at which latter place the Duke of Lorsain pretended to pass the Rhins, and accorda-ingly had caused a Bridge to be prepared. And this day it is said, that Letters are arrived of the 11 instant from the Duke of Luxemburgs Camp, which fay that the Imperialists had actu-ally passed the Rbine at Rbinfilds
