*Messina, June 15.*

**T**HIS Year's Harvest in Sicily promises the greatest Abundance in Corn, Oil, Silk, and Wine; and the Prohibition on the Exportation of the two first Articles is very soon expected to be taken off.

*Petersburg, June 25.* The Princesses of Hesse Darmstadt were detained longer at Revel than they originally intended, and did not arrive at Zarco Zelo on Tuesday last, but are expected there Tomorrow. The Birth-day of the eldest Princefs happening during their Stay at Revel, it was celebrated there by a masked Ball, and all the Magnificence the Town would admit of.

*Dresden, July 7.* The Price of Corn in this Part of Germany is kept up higher than it would otherwise be, by the Demand for Bohemia; where the late Storms of Hail and the Quantity of Field Mice have destroyed great Part of the growing Grain. In the Upper Lusatia and near Leipzick the Field Vermin have also done considerable Damage. But it is still to be hoped, should the Months of July and August prove fine, that, after a Scarcity of Three Years, the Poor, by a more plentiful Harvest this Summer, may be supplied with better Bread, and at a more reasonable Price.

*Berlin, July 10.* The Weather continues still favourable, and unless we should have Rain during the Time of the Harvest, there is every Reason to expect a plentiful Crop.
