WHEREAS His Majesty hath signified unto us His Royal Pleasure, That the Parliament of this Kingdom which now stands prorogued to Tuesday the Third Day of August next, be further prorogued to Tuesday the Twelfth Day of October next, then to sit for the Dispatch of Business: We do therefore Publish and Declare, that the said Parliament be, and the said Parliament is hereby further prorogued to Tuesday the Twelfth Day of October next, and the same shall be then held at Dublin, and sit for the Dispatch of Business; Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons in this present Parliament, are to take Notice and to give their Attendance accordingly. GOD Save the KING.

Berlin, July 24. Her Royal Highness the Princess of Orange returned Yesterday from Potsdam, and went the same Evening to Schönewalden, where she proposes staying till Thursday next the 29th Instant, when she will proceed to Rhinsberg, and after having passed a few Days there, return to London.
