Dublin Castle, October 12, 1773.

THIS Day, the Parliament having met, according to the Prorogation, his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, and being seated on the Throne, with the usual Solemnity, the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod was sent with a Message from his Excellency to the House of Commons, signifying his Pleasure, that they should immediately attend his Excellency in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, his Excellency made the following Speech to both Houses:

My Lords and Gentlemen,

IT is with the highest Satisfaction that I obey His Majesty's Commands to meet you in Parliament, and to concur with you in every Measure that may promote the real Interest of this Kingdom.

His Majesty, who has made the Happiness of all His People the constant Object of His Wishes, and the unvaried Rule of His Actions, has given it to me in particular Charge to assure His faithful Subjects of Ireland of the Continuance of His paternal Regard and Affection for them, and I am persuaded that in all your Proceedings you will continue to manifest that uniform Attention to the Publick Good, of which His Majesty's own Conduct affords the best and most illustrious Example.

As every Addition to His Majesty's Royal Family adds Strength to that happy Succession, which is the great Security of all that is valuable to us, I have a particular Pleasure in communicating to you the Birth of another Prince since your last Session of Parliament.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I have ordered the proper Officers to lay before you the Public Accounts and Estimates, from which you will be fully acquainted with the Circumstances of this Country, and may be enabled to form a true Judgment of the Provisions necessary to be made for the honourable Support of His Majesty's Government. I have His Majesty's Commands to ask the Supplies necessary for this Purpose, and I am confident you will grant them in such a Manner as will be least burthensome to His Majesty's Subjects of this Kingdom: on my Part, you may rest secure, that they shall be faithfully applied, and frugally administered.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

The Laws of your Country will naturally present themselves as the first and most important Objects of your Consideration. It is my Duty to call your particular Attention to such as respect the Religion and Morals, the Security and good Order, of the People. It is in vain that Laws are made for the Punishment of Offenders, unless their Morals can be reformed, and their Minds impressed with Principles of Virtue.

Your Protestant Charter-Schools, the Seminaries of true Religion and Industry, deserve your particular Consideration; and your Linen Manufacture, the great Source of Wealth to the Nation, is an Object of the highest Importance. You will consider whether any new Laws may be wanted to improve, regulate, and extend, this most beneficial Trade; or to support its Reputation at Foreign Markets.

I am firmly persuaded that we are met together animated with the same Intentions of maintaining, the Honor and Dignity of His Majesty's Government; and of promoting the Good of this Kingdom. Your Conduct has convinced me that I shall receive from you the fullest Proofs of your Loyalty and Attachment to the King, and of your Zeal in the Publick Service: Mine, I trust, will shew that I have nothing more sincerely at Heart than the Welfare and Prosperity of Ireland.

His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant's Answer.

I Return the House of Commons my best Thanks for their very kind and obliging Address. I shall endeavour, by an earnest Attention to my Duty to the King, and to the Prosperity and Service of this Country, to deserve the Continuance of their good Opinion.

Naples, September 28. Their Sicilian Majesties returned from the Island of Procita on Saturday last in the Afternoon, remained here that Night, and removed early the next Day to Portici. The Day of their Majesties Return to this City an Account was brought from Sicily of a Revolution at Palermo, the People having been discontented at the high Price of Provisions, (some essential Articles of which, at Times, were totally wanting) owing to Monopolizers, one of whom had loaded two Ships with Cheese for Naples, which produced a great Scarcity of that necessary Article at Palermo; which Ships, however, were stopped just without the Harbour, and the Cargoes sold at the Market Price to the People, by Order of the Prætor Prince Cassaro, who was soon after seized with the Strangury, and died on the 20th Instant. This Nobleman having been attended during his Illness by the Viceroy's (the Marquis de Fogliani's) Surgeon, a Suspicion arose amongst the Rioters, that the Viceroy wished his Death; whereupon they proceeded, to the Number of about Thirty Thousand, to the Viceroy's Palace, where the Prince Pierra-Pa-fia, Son of the Prince of Buttera, a young Sicilian Nobleman about Twenty Years of Age, happened to be with the Viceroy. This young Nobleman seeing them enter the Apartment, resolutely asked what they would have, and, upon being answered, The Life of the Viceroy, and finding they proceeded to Acts of Violence, threw his Arms round the Viceroy, and in a firm Tone demanded, in the Name of his Family, that they should forbear, saying, Spare the Life of this innocent old Man, or first take mine. This spirited Conduct checked their Fury, and they agreed to spare the Viceroy's Life on his Account, but insisted that he should instantly quit the Kingdom; upon which the Prince attended the Viceroy to the Water-side, where a Genoese Vessel was prepared to receive him. Three of the Monopolizers Goods, Furniture, Plate, &c. were thrown into the Fire, and the Rioters, having detected one of their Number secreting some of the Effects, immediately put him to Death, which was the only Life lost during the Tumult. After this the Rioters proclaimed the Archbishop for their viceroy.
