Munich, November 18.

N the 14th Instant died at Ratisbon, Baron Karg, Minister Plenipotentiary from the Elector of Cologne. He was also charged with the Vote of the Elector Palatine at the Diet; and often by Proxy with that of Bavaria; together with those of the Grand Matter of the Teutonick Order, the Bishops of Strafbourg, Hildesheim, Paderborn, Trent,

Brixon and Munster; the Princes Abbots of Stablo, and of Corvey, and the Prince of Hohenzollern. Hamburgh, November 19: We are informed, by Letters from Keil, that on the 15th Instant, about Noon, Monfieur de Saldern, the Principal Commissary from the Grand Duke of Russia, went to the Council Chamber, where the Members of the Regency were previously assembled, and declared to them, that their Functions were now to ceafe, and that the next Day (Tuefday the 16th Instant) was fixed for the Transferring the Dutchy of Holstein to his Danish Majesty: In consequence of which Declaration, a Meffage was fent to the Officers of the Council Board, and also to those of the other Colleges, to attend at the Council Chamber; and when they were all come together, Monfieur de Wolff, Prefident of the Council, informed them of Monfieur de Saldern's Notification; at the fame Time fignifying to them, that they were to meet again at their refpective Apartments about Seven o'Clock next Morning, in order to be prefent at the Act of Ceffion. Orders were likewife given for difpatching of all fuch Decrees and Refolutions as were necel fary on the Occafion, and allow for defacing the Council Seals.

The Prelates, the Deputies of the Nobility, the Officers of the Bailiwicks, the Magistrates of the Towns, and other Officers, who are to take the Oath of Allegiance to the King of Denmark, arrived at Keil on the 13th.

On the 16th, about Eight o'Clock in the Morn-ing, the Members of the Regency, the Officers of the Council Board and of the other Colleges, being affembled, his Excellency Monfieur de Saldern opened the Business in a Speech, shewing his Authority from the Empress of Russia, and the Grand Duke, to deliver up the Dutchy of Holffein to his Danish Majesty's Principal Commission, Count Re-ventiau; adding, that it was his Imperial Highness's Will and Intention, that, with the faid Dutchy, all the Rights, Prerogatives, and Territorial Sove-reignty, thereputo belonging, fhould alfo be transferred to the King of Denmark, according to Treaty. Monsieur de Saldern then proceeded to make the Ceffion, which was performed by delivering to Count Reventlau the Keys of the City of Keil, to-gether with a Piece of Earth, it being the ufual Ceremony on fuch Occasions. After which Count Reventlau administered the Oaths of Allegiance and Homage to the Military, Prelates, &c. who affured them of his Danish Majesty's Protection, and of the uninterrapted Enjoyment of their Rights and Pri-vileges. The Ceremony latted till Noon.

The Grand Duke's Arms, which were fixed over the Door of the Holftein Post-house in this City, were taken down last Tuesday, in confequence of Orders which the Post-Master had previously re-ceired for that Purpose.
