Messina, October 26.

ON Wednesday last, the 20th Instant, the Vice-Roy made his publick Entry into this City. About Three o'Clock in the Afternoon the Senate in State, attended by the Nobility and principal Inhabitants, set out for the Convent of St. Francesco di Paolo in the Suburbs, and having informed the Vice-Roy that every Thing was ready for his Reception, his Excellency placed himself in the State Coach, and proceeded to the City, attended by one Hundred Coaches, and surrounded by a very great Croud of People, crying, *God save the King, welcome the Vice-Roy.* At his entering the City Gate, he was saluted by the Cannon of the Fortrefs, and of the Ships in the Harbour, and met there by the Prince of Villafranca, Governor of the City, the King's Lieutenant, and the Major of the Place, with several other of the King's Officers on Horseback, who conducted him to the Cathedral, the Streets through which he passed being lined with Troops, and ornamented with great Variety of Tapettry. His Excellency was received at the great Door of the Cathedral by the Archbishop at the Head of the Clergy, who ushered him to his Seat, singing Te Deum; at the Conclusion of which, the Procession passed in the same Order through the High Street leading to the Palace, the Fortefs and Ships saluting as before. On his Arrival at the Palace, his Excellency received the Compliments of the Nobility, Gentry, and Foreign Consuls; in the Evening the whole Town was illuminated, and the two following Days were kept in Gala.

By the last Accounts from Palermo, we learn, that the Populace continued very riotous, and were divided into two Parties, one of which had set up a Mechanick for Vice-Roy, which the other Party strongly opposing, a Scuffle ensued last Friday, and seven or eight lost their Lives, but the latter Party got the better; however the new Vice-Roy continues at the Head of his Faction, and has already imprisoned six Hundred Persons. Both Parties have proposed Terms of Accomodation to his Majesty. In the mean time, the Vice-Roy has Orders to prepare the Troops; and it is said several Polaccas of Burthen are failed from Naples for the Out-Ports of that Kingdom, to be in readines to embark others as Occasion may require.

Messina, November 9. His Catholick Majesty has confirmed the Vice-Roy's Residence in Messina, and given Orders for sending Troops to reduce the Revolters to Obedience.

Naples, November 16. An Order has been issued for the Embarkation of about four hundred and fifty Men from hence, who are to join near a Thousand more at Messina, and to march into the

Neighbourhood of Palermo. Count Corofa, and the Troops destined for-Sicily, are detained here by bad Weather.

The Maeftanza of Palermo (consisting of the Tradefmen of that City) feeling the Effects of a total Stagnation in their Busines, and of the Irregularities of the lowest Class of People, (who, taking Advantage of the present Confusion, commit every Enormity) shew their Zeal by acting with the utmost Severity against the Rabble, several of whom have been executed, some sent hither, and the Goals filled with others. They have likewise, it is said, requested this Government to assist them with Troops, in order to restore Tranquility to their Capital.

At the Cava, about twenty-two Miles from Naples, on Friday last, a violent Land-Flood carried away a Village, and buried about two hundred People in its Ruins.

Peterbourg, November 19. This Morning the Neva began to be frozen, which is earlier than usual; and we have Reason to expect a very severe Winter. The Snow is expected with Impatience, as the present hard Frost will greatly damage the Seeds, if the Grain remains much longer uncovered.

Berlin, December 4. The Landgravine of Hesse Darmstadt, with the Two Princesses her Daughters, came to Potzdam the End of the last Week, and are expected here To-morrow. The Landgravine proposes to proceed on her Journey the 13th.
