*Naples, December 7.*

**O**N Friday last, at Eleven o'Clock at Night, a slight Shock of an Earthquake was felt in this City.

*Florence, December 21.* On the 19th Instant, at Ten o'Clock in the Forenoon, the Great Dutchess was happily delivered of a Prince, which Event was announced to the Publick by the Discharge of the Cannon of the two Fortresses: The same Day the young Prince was baptized by the Name of Albert-Joseph-John-Fauftus; Prince Albert of Saxony was God-Father, represented by Count Thurn. Three Days Gala have been ordered at Court.

*Turin, December 25.* The Hurricane at Nice and upon the Coast of Genoa has done great Damage. It is said the Fortifications of Villa Franca have suffered considerably. An English Ship richly laden was near being lost in the Mole of Villa Franca; a French Tartane was sunk; and the King of Sardinia's Frigate had a very narrow Escape.

*Berlin, January 1.* The Queen of Prussia has had a Relapse, and the Physicians are apprehensive of the Consequences.

This Morning his Prussian Majesty received the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers on the New Year: The Princes and Princesses of the Royal Family dined at his Majesty's Table.

*Hague, January 7.* The Small Pox has made very great Ravage in this Province for several Months past, and still continues to carry off great Numbers; notwithstanding which the Faculty of Leyden are not yet cured of their antient Prejudices against Inoculation, and consequently prevent Numbers from profiting of it's happy Effects.

Our Posts are interrupted and retarded on all Sides by the great Quantities of Snow which has fallen.
