TConstantinople, January 3.
 HE Grand Seigneur has not been at the Mosque for these two last Fridays; it is reported that he is extremely ill with an Athma and Dropsy, attended with violent Pains of the Colick. The general Concern on this Occasion seems to absorb all other Considerations, and all Business is for the present at a Stand at the Porte.

Naples, January 18. We hear that the Consuls of the Macstranza at Palermo have petitioned his Sicilian Majesty, that the Duke of Fogliani may return to that City.

The present Eruption of Mount Vesuvius is very slight; and as the Lava issues from a Crack very near the Crater, it will probably continue long, and do little Damage, as it cools and stops before it reaches the cultivated Parts of the Mountain.

Florence, January 21. Last Week the Great Duke appointed Count Alberti, who acts as Director of the War Office, to preside likewise at the Office of Secretary of State, in the Room of the Chevalier Jeminetti, who has been promoted to the Government of Siena, with the Title of Lieutenant Governor.

Lisbon, January 22. His most faithful Majesty, having been at Salvaterra for a few Days, returned to the Ajuda on the 15th Instant, as usual, for three subsequent Days of Devotion, and went back on the 18th Instant to Salvaterra, where he will remain with the Royal Family till the Beginning of Lent.

Monf. de Scabra, the Secretary of State joined to the Marquis de Pombal, is disgraced: The Marquis delivered to him his Majesty's Decree of Dismissal and Exile into the Country on Tuesday last; Monf. de Scabra accordingly set out with his Lady early on Wednesday Morning.
