ON Thursday last, about Half an Hour after Six in the Evening, the Queen was happily delivered of a Prince. His Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury, several Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and the Ladies of Her Majesty's Bed-Chamber, were present.

This great Event was soon after made known by the Firing of the Tower Guns.
