St. James's, March 26.

ON Thursday Evening the Ceremony of the Christening of the young Prince was performed in the Great Council Chamber by his Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury. His Royal Highness was named Adolphus Frederick.

The Sponsors were, his Serene Highness Prince John Adolphus of Saxe-Gotha, represented by the Earl of Hertford, Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household; his Serene Highness Prince Charles of Hesse Cassel, represented by the Earl of Jersey, Lord of His Majesty's Bed-Chamber in Waiting; and her Royal Highness the Princess of Orange, represented by the Countess of Effingham, Lady of Her Majesty's Bed-Chamber in Waiting.

The following Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens, of the City of Dublin, having been transmitted by his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland to the Earl of Rochford, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, to be laid before the King, has by his Lordship been presented to His Majesty: which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens, of the City of Dublin, beg Leave to approach your Majesty with our sincere Congratulations on the safe Delivery of our amiable Queen, and the Birth of a Prince.

Every Addition to your Royal Family enlarges the Prospect of our Happiness, as we hope to find the Virtues of your Majesty in your Royal Descendants.

In Testimony whereof we have caused the Common Seal of the said City to be hereunto affixed this Eighteenth Day of March, 1774.

Monmouth, March 23. The Alarm occasioned by the Fever in our Goal begins to subside: The late Goaler and two other Persons in the Goal died of it; there are now four or five Persons ill, but they are thought to be in a fair Way of Recovery. As to the Town, it never was more healthy.

Petersburg, March 1. The Insurgents have never been near so numerous as they were from time to time reported to be. Nothing decisive has yet happened; but the last Letters received here from General Bibikow, mention his Intention of marching immediately against the Rebels.

Madrid, March 7. This Morning his Royal Highness Charles, Infant of Spain, died at the Pardo after some Days Illness, aged Two Years and Six Months.

His Catholick Majesty, the Prince and Princess of Asturias, and all the Royal Family, are most deeply affected at this melancholy Event. Their Royal Highnesses have not appeared this Day in Publick. The Remains of the Infant are to be privately deposited, on Wednesday next, in the Convent of St. Lorenzo at the Escorial.
