From the Marcfcbil de Crequi's Camp at Sarquemines, three Miles from Sarbrucke, on the other fide of the Saar, Nov. 8. The Lunenburg and Munfter Troops are within fix Leagues from hence, on the other fide of Deuxports, they passed the Rhine about 13 or 14000 ftrong, but having joined the detachement commanded by Major-General Dunewalt we reckon them The Marelchal Grequi has fent fome Infantry 18000. to reinforce the Garifon at Deuxponts, where the Sieur de Fast, who was the Kings Lieutenant at Philipsburg commands. The Marquis de Rencl arrived here the 4th inftant, with a detachement from Flanders.

Cologne, Nov. 11. The Ofnabrug Troops continue their march towards the Mejelle, three days fince they attacked a small place in this Diocess, called Lin, but were repulsed with the loss of 70 men, and among them five Captains killed, befides wonnded. The 2 Dutch Regiments who came from Treves, have orders to march back again, and to follow the Ofnabrugs. From Treves we have Letters inform us, that the Confederate Troops under the command of the Duke of Zell were come to Birckenfeldt two Leagues from Deuxponts ; we hear of great complaints that are made of the violenges committed by the faid Troops in their march.

Hague, Nov. 13. Though the flate of the War for the year enfuing be not yet finished, yet in the mean time it's faid that eight new Regiments will be raifed againft Spring. Yefterday the Court of Justice finished the affair of the Sieur de Groot, his Highnels having as Stadtholder perfonally affisted there from nine in the morning till nine at night, and to morrow we expect the Sentence will be pronounced. This afternoon his Highnefs is gone to his houfe at Seefldyke, and will be back in a day or two. We have the confirmation of a Peace being concluded between the Poles and the Turks.

Braffils, Nov. 10. Since the arrival of the laft Ordinary from Spein, here hath been much discourse at Court of great Levies that are to be made againft Spring, in order to the forming an Atmy of 25000 men, to be under the fole command of our Governor-General; and to this end, we are in expediation of receiving by the next Spanish Ordinary Bills of Ex-change for a Millon or two of Crowns; in the dispatch of which, the new Prefident of the Finances in Spain is as we bre told very zealous. From Cambray we hear that feveral parties have been fent abroad from thence into the French Ter-ritories to raife Contributions, one of which in a Village near Arras found fore refiftance from a fmall number of Soldiers, fent from Arras, but the Spaniards entred the Village, killed fome, and of Seldiers and Inhabitants took 200 Prifo-ners, with a good booty of Horfes and Cattel.
