Petersburg, April 5.

YESTERDAY we received the agreeable News, that the Troops under General Bibikow had attacked the principal Corps of the Rebels commanded by Pugatcheff in Person, at Soroczinska about 150 Wersts from Orembourg, and entirely routed them: Amongst the Prisoners taken was the Person in whom Pugatcheff places his chief Confidence.

Florence, April 16. The Great Duke and Dutchess have retired to a Villa near the Town, where four of the young Princes and Princesses were inoculated two Days ago by Dr. Gatti. Their Royal Highnesses admit nobody to approach them at the Villa; but the Great Duke returns frequently on Foot to the Palace in Town, to receive his Ministers. An Ecaffette was sent to Vienna a few Hours after the Inoculation was performed.
