The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty having been pleased, by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of Great-Britain, to constitute Sir Stanier Porten, Knight, Keeper and Register of His Majesty's Papers and Records for the Business of State established at His Majesty's Palace of Whitehall, in the room of Andrew Stone, Esquire, deceased, he this Day in Council took the Oaths appointed to be taken, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy; and likewise the Oath of Keeper and Register of the said Papers and Records.

St. James's, May 14.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint William Burton, John Wyndham Bowyer, David Papillon, George Lewis Scott, Thomas Bowlby, George Quarne, Anthony Lucas, and William Lowndes, Esqrs. together with William Burrell, Doctor of Laws, to be Commissioners for the Management and Receipt of His Majesty's Revenue of Excise and other Duties, within England, Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed.

Petersburg, April 19. A Messenger arrived Yesterday in the Evening from General Bibikow, with the agreeable Account of the Rebellion being entirely extinguished, by the total Defeat and Dispersion of the Rebel Army, in an Action which happened on the 25th of March, O. S. at Tatisczewa, 36 Wersts from Oremberg; in which Two Thousand of the Rebels were killed, and Three Thousand taken Prisoners. Their Chief, Pugatcheff, found Means to escape. The Detachment of Troops, that performed this Service, was commanded by Major General Galtzin, Brother to the Vice Chancellor. Four Russian Officers and Two Hundred private Soldiers were killed, and between Five and Six Hundred wounded.

THIS Day his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, with the usual Solemnity, and the Commons being sent for, gave the Royal Assent to the following Bills:

An Act for continuing and amending three several Acts, one passed in the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, and the other two in His present Majesty's Reign, for making the River Lagan navigable, and opening a Communication by Water between Loughneagh and the Town of Belfast; and for enabling the Commissioners therein named, to raise Money by Assigment of said Duties, for the more expeditious and effectual carrying on said Work.

An Act for continuing and amending several Laws now in Force relating to His Majesty's Revenue; and for the more effectually preventing Frauds therein.

An Act for the more effectual preventing the forging or altering the Acceptance or Indorsement of Bills of Exchange, on the Numbers or Principal Sums of accountable Receipts for Notes, Bills, or other Securities for Payment of Money, or Warrants or Orders for Payment of Money on Delivery of Goods.

An Act for making perpetual an Act, intituled, An Act to regulate the Trials of controverted Elections, on Returns of Members to serve in Parliament.

An Act for licensing Hawkers and Pedlars; and for the Encouragement of English Protestant Schools.

An Act for allowing further Time for Persons in Offices or Employments to qualify themselves, pursuant to an Act, intituled, An Act to prevent the further Growth of Popery.

An Act to explain and amend an Act made in the Third Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, An Act for the better keeping Churches in Repair.

An Act for amending an Act passed in the 29th Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, An Act for the further Encouragement of Tillage.

An Act for the more effectual proceeding against Persons standing mute on their Arraignment for Murder, Felony, or Piracy.
