Vienna, Nov. 5. The Emperor, as we are told, continues his resolution of parting hence the 19 instant to *Linz*, from whence he will remove to *Passaw*, to celebrate his marriage there the 9th of December; and on the 15th of January their Imperial Majesties will return thither. The last week by Letters from *Cracow*

we had an account of the conclusion of a Peace between the King of *Poland* and the *Turks*, at a time when that King was reduced to very great streights, and was beset by the *Infidels*, that the whole Kingdom seemed to be in pain for him; but it appears by the honourable Conditions obtained by the *Poles* that if their affairs were not in a very good posture, those of their Enemies were nor in a much better, and that they desired a Peace as much as the *Poles*.

*Copenhagen*, Nov. 7. The two Armies continue in the Field, the *Suedes* on the other side of *Helmstadt*, and ours on this; the former pretend to put a succor into *Malmoe*, which place hath been blocked up several months, and to that end they have a great many Wagons laden with Provisions, but our Forces will have a watchful eye upon them to prevent the said design. In the mean time our Army suffers very much, by being obliged to continue in the Field so late in the year, and the Soldiers are very desirous to come to some action which may determine the Campaign, and let them enjoy their Winter quarters in quiet. The 2d instant our King was at *Christiansstadt*, where, it is said, his Majesty means to remain, till the *Suedes* are retired so far, as not to give him any farther jealousy for this year. Here are sitting but some light Frigates, who are to Cruise this Winter upon the Coast of *Pomeren*, to hinder all communication between those parts and *Sueden*. The *Suedes*, we hear, will likewise have some of their smaller ships at *Sea*.

*Hamburg*, Nov. 13. We cannot as yet make any judgement concerning the issue of the Siege of *Strain*, though the general opinion is, that his Electoral Highness will not be able to go through with it at this season; for we are told, the Inhabitants, though they have suffered very much by the Besiegers Cannon, yet do not in the least abate in their courage and resolution to defend the place to the last extremity.

*Schaffhusen*, Nov. 7. The Imperial Army has for some time been encamped near *Rhinfelden*, and at present their Generals seem to have quitted all thoughts of passing the *Rhine*, however the Cantons keep the men, they assembled upon the first alarm still together, thinking that the best way to maintain their Neutrality, while the Armies continue in their Neighborhood. The Electoral Prince of *Saxony* arrived here 7 or 8 days since, and parted nor till this morning, being gone to the Army; during his stay here, our Magistrates presented him with several Tuns of Wine of the growth of this Countrey, and 12 Sacks of Oats for his Horses. The Boors of the *Swart Walt* kill many of the Imperial Soldiers daily, in revenge of the spoils and ravages committed by them.

*Strasbourg*, Nov. 8. The Imperial Army continues to have its quarters between *Friburg* and *Rhinfelden*, though we are assured that it will decamp the 15 or 16 instant, and march towards *Suabia* and *Franconia* in order to the going into Winter-quarters. It is thought the French will not remain in the Field long after them, yet in the mean time three Regiments are marched from *Saverne* to join the Duke of *Luxemburg*. Two parties,

ties, one of 100, and the other of 30 Horse of the *Luxemburg Troops*, have this week appeared in the *Lower Alsace*: it is said they had a design to intercept the Commissary of *Haguenaw* who was abroad.

*Cologne, Nov. 13.* The *Osnabrug Troops* having threatened to revenge the repulse they received at *Lix*, our Elector has reinforced the Garison that was there before with 50 men from *Nuis*. The two *Brandenburg Regiments* that were in this Diocess, are marched towards the Countrey of *Cleve*. From *Triers* and those parts we have advice, that the Confederate Troops under the command of the Duke of *Zell*, continued encamped near *Deuxponts*, into which place the Marechal de *Cregui* had put a very sufficient Garison, and was himself posted with the Forces under his command near *Sarbruck*, to observe the motions of the said Confederates; our Letters add, that it was believed the Duke of *Zell* would very quickly put his Troops into Winter-quarters, and that the Baggage of the Imperial detachment commanded by Major-General *Dunewalt*, had already repassed the *Rhine*; and just now we have advice that the *Osnabrug Troops*, and the two Dutch Regiments which were marching towards the *Moselle*, are coming back into this Diocess, where they are to winter.

*Liege, Nov. 13.* The French are at work at *Veruiers*, to demolish it; as they mean to do to *Stauclat*, *Malmédy*, *Spi*, *Theux* and *Hoye*. It is still said that a Convoy of 3000 men is expected at *Maeffricht* from *Charleroy*, and that they will take their march through *Condrot*; it is said their chief business is to convoy a considerable Train of Artillery, which is more than what they have use for at *Maeffricht* to *Charleroy*. Some will say that the French intend to quit *Limburg* towards Spring.

*Hague, Nov. 17.* As yet the Court of Justice hath not pronounced any Sentence against the *Sieur de Groot*, and many are of opinion there will be none, and that he will be acquitted without that formality. The States of *Holland* will not be assembled till the 24 instant, when we may expect to hear that something will be resolved as well concerning the work of the Peace, as the continuing the War, if that be not made this winter. We have Letters from *Nimeguen* of the 14 instant, which say, that the Mediators laboured very much with the Ambassadors upon the place, in order to the giving the Treaty a beginning, but that there wanted still the Ambassadors of some of the principal parties. There is indeed some discourse in Town that the Prince of *Orange* intends to pass into *Zealand* to settle the matter in difference about *Dr. Momms*, but the certainty we as yet know not. It is said that the States have within these few days received Letters from the Duke of *Zell*, in which he acquaints them, that he was arrived with the Confederate Troops under his command near *Deuxponts*, and that it had been resolved to make an attempt upon that place, which is of no great strength, but supplied at present with a very strong Garison. All our Letters from *Strasbourg* inform us, that the Duke of *Lorraine* intended to decamp from *Schlingen* the 15 instant, in order to his putting his Troops into Winter-quarters which were assigned them by the Emperor in *Suabia* and *Franconia*; though some Letters add, that a considerable part of the Imperial Troops, would go and winter in the Emperors Hereditary Countrys. Yesterday his Excellency the Lord *Berkely*, Ambassador and Plenipotentiary of his Majesty of *Great Britain* for the Treaty of Peace at *Nimeguen*, parted hence for *Amsterdam*, from whence he intended to proceed to *Nimeguen*. Yesterday was his Highnesses birth-day, when he was 26 years old.

*Brussels, Nov. 17.* We expect with some impatience the arrival of the Spanish Ordinary, which we promise our selves will bring Bills of Exchange for a Million of Crowns at least, to be employed for the making the necessary preparations against the next Campaign. Our Governor General has appointed in the mean while a review to be made of all the Forces at present in the service of these Provinces; and we are told that some Troops will be reformed to make up others. From *Germany* they write, that the Duke of *Deuxponts* had supplied the Duke of *Zells* Forces with 15000 Measures of Corn; which the Spaniards are to repay at *Treves*, and that all parties were preparing to go into their Winter-quarters.

*Whitehal, Nov. 10.* His Majesty having left it to the Queen to nominate Her new Lord Chamberlain, Her Majesty was pleased to make choice of the Right Honourable the Earl of *Offory* for that Office, and accordingly this day gave him the Key; and His Majesty to shew his approbation of the said Choice, hath declared that his Lordship shall also continue in the place he had before of Gentleman of His Majesties Bed-chamber.

*Ditto, Nov. 12.* His Majesty having been graciously pleased to translate the Right Reverend Father in God Doctor *Sparrow* late Bishop of *Exeter* to the See of *Norwich*, and to make choice of the Reverend Doctor *Thomas Lamplugh* Dean of *Rochester* to succeed in the Bishoprick of *Exeter*, this day was performed the Solemnity of his Consecration in the Chappel of *Lambeth*, by the Right Reverend Father in God *Henry* Lord Bishop of *London*, his Grace of *Canterbury*'s Commissioner for that purpose assisted by several other Bishops, in the presence of many of the chiefest of the Nobility, and other persons of Quality, who were afterwards entertained at a noble Dinner.
