Viennat, Nov. 5. The Emperor, as we are told, conttinues hisrefolution of parting heace the 19 inftant to Lints, from whence he will remove to Paffan, to celebrate his marriage therethe gth of December; and on the isth of funuary their Imperial Majefties will resurn bither. The lalt wesk by Letters from Cracowe
we had an account of the conclufion of a Peace betweeri the King of Poland ond the Turks, at a time when that King was reduced to very great Atreights, and was fe befet by the Inficels, that the whole Kingdom feemed to be in pain for him; but it appears by the honourable Conditions obrained by the Poles that if their affairs were not in a very good polture, thufe of their Enemies were not in a much better, and that they defired a Peace as much as the Poles.

Copenbagen, Nov. 7. The two Armies continue in the Ficld, the Suedes on the other fide of Helmftadr, and ours on this; the former pretend to put a fuccor in? to Malmoe, which place hath been blocked up feveral months, and to that end chey have a grear many Wagons laden with Provifions, but our Forces will have a watchful eye upon them to prevent the faid defign. In the mean time our Army fuffers very much, by being ob iged to continue in the Field folate in the year, and the Soldiers are very defirous to come tofome action which may determine the Campagne, and ler them enjoy their Winter quarters in quies, The 2dinltant our King was it Chrijfinmftadt, where, it's faid, his Majeftymaeans to temaing, till the Suedes are retired fo far, as not to give himany farther jealoufie tar this year. Here are fitring but fome light Frigats, who are to Cruife this Winter upon the Coatt of Pomeyen, to hinder all communication between thofe parts and Sueden. The Suedes, we bear, will likenife have tome of thir fmaller foips 25 Sef.

Hamburg, Nov. 13. We cannot as yer make any judgerment concerning the iffue of the Siege of Stetin, though the general opinion is, that his Electoral Highnels. will nor be able togo through with it at this feafon; for we are told, the Inhabitants, though they have fuffered very much by the Befiegers Gannon, yet do not in the lealt abate in their courage and refolution to defend the place to the laft extremity.
Schafhuyfen, Nov. 7. The Imperial Army has for fone time been encamped near Kbinfelden, and ar prefene their Generals feem to have quitred all thoughts of paffing the Rbire, however the Gantons kcep the neen, they affembled upon the frit alarm till together, thinking thar che beft way to maineain their Neutraliry, while the Armies continue in their Neighborhood. The EleCtoral Prince of Saxony arpined bers 7 or $\&$ days fince, and partednor rill this morning, being gone to the Army ; during his ftay here, our Magittrates prefinted him withfeveral Tuns of Wine of the grownh of chis Countrey, and 12 Sacks of Oata for his Horles, I The Boors of the Spoayt wait kill many of the Imperin Saldiess daity, in sevenge of the foils and ravages comqigted by them.

Sitrasburg, Nav. 8. The Imperixd Army continues to have its quarters between Friburg and Rhinfelfern, though we areafiured that it will decamp the 15 or 16 inftant, and march towards suabid and Franconia in order to the going into Wincer-quartersee Tris thoughe the French will nor remain in the Field long after them, yet in the thean tinte three Regiments are marched fom Saverne to join the Iuke of Luxemburg. Two par-
ties ofne of 100 and the other of jo Horfe of the Lur thenburg Troops, thave this week appeared in the Lower Alface: it is faid they had a defignl to intercept the Commidary of Haguener who was abroad.

Cologne, Nov. 13. The Opabrug Trö́ps having threatned ro revenge the repulfe they received at $L i R_{3}$ our Elector has reinforced the Garifon that was there before with go men from Nais. The two Brandenburg Regiments that were in this Diocefs, are matched towards the Counarey of cleve. From Triers and thofe parts we have advice, thar the Confederate Troops under the command of the Duke of Zell, continued enEamped near Deaxponts, into which place the Marefchal de Crequi had put a very fufficient Garifon, and was bimfelf polled with the Forces under his command near sarbrack, to obferve the motions of the faid Confederates; our Leters add, that it was believed the Duke bf Zell would very quickly put his Troops into Wiaterquarters, and that the Baggage of the Imperial detachement commanded by Mijor-General Dunewalt, hadalready repaffed the Khine; and juft now we have advice that the ofnabrug Troops, and the two Durch Regiments which were marching towards the Mofelle, are coming back into this Diocels, where theyare to winter.

Liege, N 0 v.13. The French are at work at Verviers,to demolihitif as they mean to do to Stauclat, Malmedi, Spa, theux and Hoye. If is fill faid that a Canvoy of Idooo men is expected ar Meeftricbs from Charley ay, und that they will taketheir march through Condrots; it's faid their chief bufinefs is to convoy a confiderable Train of Artillery, which is more thian what they have wre fot at Maefiricht to Cbarleray. Some will fay that the Freach intend to quic Limburg towards Spring.

Hegue, Nov. 17: As yet the Court of Jultice hath not pronounced any Sentence againft the Sieur de Grooz, and many are of opinion there will be nose, and that he will be acquitted without that formalicy: The States of 'Holland will not be affembled till the 24 inftane, when we may expect to hear that fomething will be refoved as well concerning the work of the Peace, as she continuing the War, if that be not made this winter. We have Letters from Nimeguen of the 14 inftanf, which fay, that the Mediators laboured very much with the Ambaffadors upon the place, in order to the giving the Treaty a beginning, but that there wanted aill the Ambaffadors of fome of the principal parties. There is Indeed fome difcourfe in Town that the Prince of 0 range inteads to pafs inco Zealand to fettle the matter in difference abour Dr. Mommx, but the certainty we as yet know not. It is faid that the States have within thefe few days received Letters from the Duke of Zell, in which he acquaints them, that he was artived with the Confederate Troops under his command near Deutponts, and that it had been refolved to make an attempt upon that place, which is of no great Arength, but fupplyedat prefent with a very ftrong Garifon. All our Letters fiom Strasburg inform us, that the Duke of Lorritin intended to dscamp from dchlingent the 15 inflant, in order to his putting his Troops into Winterquaters whith were afligned them by the Emperor in Suabia and Franconiad chough fome Letters add, that a confiderable part of the Impexial Troops, would go and winter in the Emperors Herediary Countrys. Yelterday bis Excellency the Lord Berkely, Ambaffador and. Pledi'porentiary of his Majelty of GreatBritain for the Treaty of Peace at Nimeguen, parted hence for Amferdam, from wheace he intended to proceed to Nimeguex. Yeflerday was his Highneffes birth day, when he was 26 years old.

Bruffels, Nov. 1\%: We expet with fome impatience the arrival of the Spanifh Ordinary, which we promife ouf felves will bring Bills of Exchange fora Million of Crowns ae lealt, yo be employed for the malling the necefary preparations againit the next Campagne. Our Guvernor General has appointed in the mean while a review to be made of all the Forces at prefenc in the fervice of thefe Provinces; and we are told that fome Troops will be reformed to make up orhers. From Germany they write, that the Dule of Deuxpontshad fupplyed the Duke of Zclls Forees yith 1 yooo Meafures of Corn ; which the Spaniards areto repay at Treves. and that all parties were preparing to go inco their Win-ter-quarters.
Wbitelal, Noü. 1o. His Majefty having left it to the Queen to nominate Her pew Lord Chamlerlain, Her Majefty was pleafed to make choiee of the Righe Hnnourable the Earl of offory For that Ulfice, and aecordingly this day gave him the Key; and His Mjacfly to lhew hisapprobation of she faid Choice, hath declared that his Lordhip thall alfo continue in the place he had before of Ocstlemian of His Majefties Eedchamber.
